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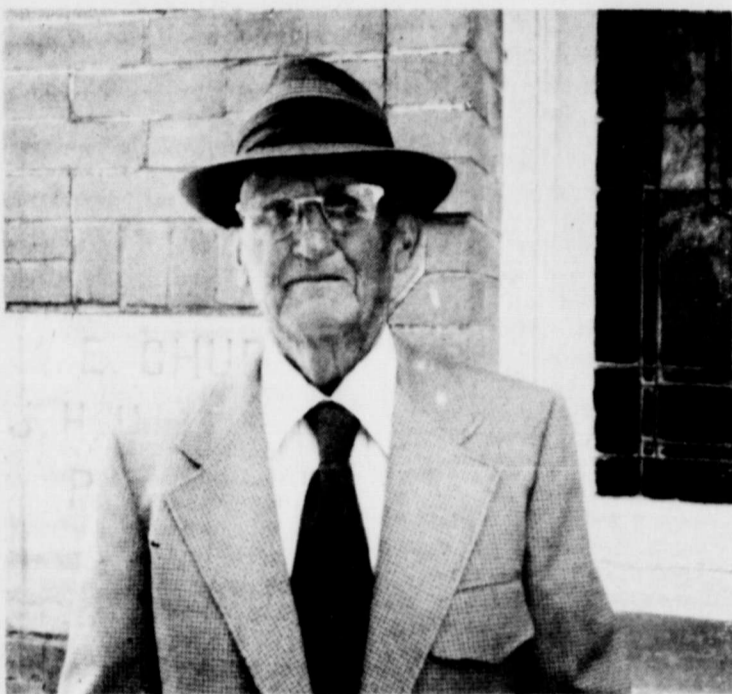
Richard Ballard Died

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Saturday at the Womack Funeral Home in Crowell for Richard (Dick) Ballard, 76, long-time resident of Foard County. Mr. Ballard died in the Foard County Hospital Thursday afternoon after a long illness.

Rev. Joe Ainsworth, pastor of First Baptist Church, and Rev. Warren Everson, pastor of Bethel Church, officiated. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home directing. Serving as pall bearers and conducting graveside rites were members of the IOOF Lodge of Crowell.

Dick Ballard was born in St. Clair, Mo., April 25, 1898, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Ballard. He moved to Foard County in 1910 with his parents and had lived here since that time. He had operated a feed store in Crowell for many years. He and the former Gladys Sparks were married in 1929.

He is survived by his wife; one son, Dr. R. L. Ballard of McAllen and three grandchildren.



COMPLETES 38 YEARS AS CHURCH TREASURER—J. W. The pastor's salary was \$1350 per year when he began serving as treasurer, and he has seen three name changes during the years. First it was the Methodist Episcopal Church South, then the Methodist Church and now the United Methodist Church. Ike Everson has replaced Mr. Bruce as secretary.

One-Car Mishap Claims Man's Life

A 28-year-old Amarillo salesman was killed when he apparently lost control of his late-model car while traveling north six miles south of Crowell about 4:42 a.m. Saturday.

According to Ted Poling, Department of Public Safety investigating officer, James Karroll Higgins apparently was killed instantly as his car plowed into a guard rail on the South Bever Creek bridge and burst into flames. Foard County

Sheriff Edward Howard said over 100 feet of rail passed through the interior of the vehicle. Wrecker crews had to cut the rail before turning the car over.

Higgins' body was identified by a class ring from Oklahoma State University, a distinctive gold money clip and dental information.

He was a salesman for Commodity Feeds of Amarillo, Sheriff Howard said.

Phase V of the Rural Water System Okayed

Authorization to continue with Phase V of the rural water program has been received by Chester Sinclair, Administrator of the Childress County Farmers Home Administration.

"We received a call Friday

from Claude Moore of Clarendon, District Director, with the go ahead," Sinclair said.

Phases III and IV are expected to be completed by July 1.

Phase V will cover 12 counties and will be much larger than previous phases, Sinclair reported.

Estimated development costs for Phase V has been set at \$2,851,000, will have pipelines of 350 miles and 819 meters.

It will also include four miles of sewer lines, with 230 connections.

A total of 3,671 people will be served in Collingsworth, Childress, Donley, Foard, Motley, Hall, Hardeman, Cottle, Knox, Wilbarger, Montague and Grayson counties.

Mike (Mike) Leija, 10, was drowned Thursday in Lake Pauline near Crowell. Officials said Leija was in the lake at 1:40 p.m. while

boating alone on the lake. He apparently fell from the boat and was trying to swim back when he disappeared from the surface. A companion, Vernon McNeese of Quanah, who was on shore, witnessed the accident and summoned help when Leija did not surface.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Sunday at the Crowell Assembly of God Church with Rev. Bobby Argo, pastor, officiating. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge.

He is survived by his parents; two daughters, Laura Chrystella Leija and Marcy Leija of Crowell; two brothers, Martin Leija Jr. of Quanah and Larry Dean Leija of Crowell; five sisters, Mary Gallegos of Quanah, Margaret Leija, Nellie Anguiano, Betty Leija and Bertha Leija, all of Crowell.

Work Underway on Dam at State Park

Construction on a \$340,000 earth and concrete dam on Devil's Creek began at Copper Breaks State Park last week, as the Cooper Woodruff Construction Company of Amarillo, Texas moved in heavy machinery to clear the site of shrubs and trees.

The dam, to create a 60 surface acre recreation lake named Lake Copper Breaks, is to be constructed of earth and concrete with the target completion date set at October 1.

The dam will create a lake up to 30 feet deep in the area of Devil's Creek which wanders through the 1933 acre State Park before emptying into the Pease River less than a mile from the dam.

A boat launching ramp and a sand swimming beach have already been constructed at the state park, along with many other improvements in the park's first phase of development which was completed January 1 of 1974.

According to Park Superintendent Bob Martin, the lake will be stocked by the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife after an evaluation by park biologists of the type environment and water the lake will have.

The lake will be used for recreational purposes and will feature swimming, fishing, and boating, although skiing will not

be allowed at the lake.

Construction is also underway on a Park Headquarters and Interpretive Center building by the Weaver Adair Construction Company of Quanah.

That building will house a special exhibit on the Indian heritage of the area, the early settlers and the geographical characteristics of the area to be prepared by Interpretive Center specialists with the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife.

The building will also include a drive up window where camping and entrance permits may be purchased, offices for the Park Superintendent and Park Rangers, and storage space for park equipment and supplies in addition to the special exhibit rooms.

Fishing, camping, picnicking, horseback riding, bicycling, hiking and swimming are allowed at the park while there are special facilities for fishing, camping and picnicking.

Horseback riding, bicycling, and swimming are allowed only in limited areas of the park and persons wishing to use the park for these purposes should ask a ranger about these facilities.

Historical Survey Committee Sets Monthly Meeting

The Foard County Historical Survey Committee meets the last Tuesday of each month at the home of Mrs. N. J. Roberts. This group continues to collect county historical material and funds for a county museum.

A few antiques and heirlooms are on display in the county court house and much more could be collected if there was more desirable housing space, Mrs. Roberts says. She added that the Foard County histories continue to sell.

Bill Griffen of Memphis, Tenn., will be the evangelist, and Gordon Ogelsby of Clarendon will be in charge of the song services.

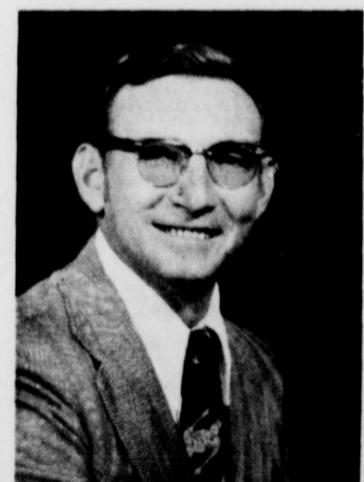
Services will be held at 7:30 each night.

An Open Letter to Foard County Residents

In recent months there has been some changes made in the "Red Cross Blood Program." First of all, if you give blood, you, your family or your spouse's family (parents, grandparents, etc.) will be entitled to the corresponding number of units for twelve months without being asked to have it replaced. You might call it a "Family Reserve Blood Supply." This DOES NOT mean that if you do not give you will not receive blood when you or your family needs it.

Second; no eligible donor will be refused if they come before the cut off time. The blood mobile will accept donors from 3:30 until 7:00 p.m. regardless. Anyone from the ages of 18 to 66 is considered a prospective donor. Some of the past restrictions have been lifted or revised to help out.

Third: THE QUESTION OF "Quota" has come into light. A quota is set because this is a projected usage for our area. If this quota (63) is not met we face the possibility of being cut off from transfers out of our region or possibly, if it gets bad enough, even being cut out of the program completely. I personally do not wish to see either one of these instances happen. We are a part of a program that presently provides all blood and blood products for 35 participating hospitals serving over 350,000 people in a 20,000 square mile area of Texas and Oklahoma. As long as we participate in the program, the Red Cross will replace blood used by you anywhere in the United States (provided the hospital will accept replacement by Red Cross).

A great deal of people have a gross misunderstanding about the charges they receive when they have to have blood. This is not a charge for the blood itself, but a blood service charge. A private blood bank charges for the blood it distributes because they have to pay to obtain it. Since the Red Cross receives blood voluntarily, only a fraction of the operational costs is charged. The balance of the cost of operating this program is obtained by Red Cross through your Red Cross and/or United Fund campaigns. Some places charge as high as \$100.00 for a

Seller of Tiny Toy Poodles Is Speaker

Mrs. Mary Durham, who raises and sells tiny toy poodles, was the speaker at the Wednesday, June 12, meeting of the Rotary Club of Crowell. In a very interesting talk, Mrs. Durham told about the poodle business and said she sells her dogs in as far distant places as Florida and Georgia.

In Florida, she sells the tiny dogs, which weigh from 3 to 4 pounds when grown, to pet shops in Pompano Beach, Fort Lauderdale and West Palm Beach. The first time she sold dogs in Florida, she said she got \$50 each for them, and later learned that the pet shop which bought them had in turn sold them for \$275 each.

Mrs. Durham said the raising of the poodles began when she bought a dog for her daughter, a 1974 CHS graduate, when she was in the third grade. It has grown until now she has 23 females in a fine modern kennel 10x60 feet in size, with individual stalls for each dog and a concrete runway for each animal. Each female produces

about two litters each year. In a brief history of the poodle, she said they originally were bred in Europe as hunters weighing up to 90 pounds. Because of their fine coats and intelligence, they were changed from hunters to show dogs. Gradually the different colors and sizes of poodles have been developed from these original European stock. She said all her dogs are registered and papers are furnished with each animal. She says the poodle doesn't shed hair, and with proper care does not have an odor, which makes them ideal for house pets. Mrs. Durham begins training the puppies when they are three weeks old and they are sold at the age of 8 weeks.

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.

It is estimated that all of the present crop that has sold has averaged \$1.40 per bushel. Average yield is around 20 bushels per acre.

A contract for \$104,000 was signed by the City of Crowell and the Panhandle Construction Co. for the laying of a six-inch pipe line from water wells to be developed in the Pease River Valley in the Margaret community northeast of Crowell to the city, a distance of 45,000 feet.

Entomologist Issues First Report of Season

Emory P. Boring of Vernon, area entomologist, has issued his first insect report for the current year. In the report, he mentions some boll weevil and thrip activity in several counties, but did not mention them as being in Foard County

Only mention of Foard County in the report was that heavy infestations of mesquite cutworms are causing the defoliation of mesquite in parts of Clay, Wichita, Foard and Hardeman counties. In some cases mesquite have been defoliated.

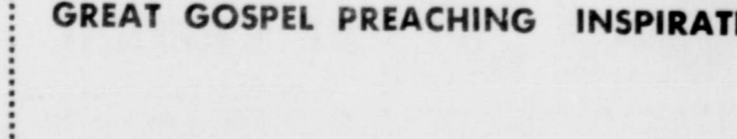
