





Hints for Homemaker

Indoor gardening is booming. In fact, if growing plants indoors isn't currently the most popular thing in America, it comes awfully close. Growing plants indoors isn't a fad or a passing fancy. The trend has been continuously growing over the past few decades. Architects, designers, and interior decorators have increased their use of indoor plants, evaluating varieties by form, texture, and structure. In the home the foliage plants blend nature with the decor

Most indoor foliage plants have the same cultural requirements. They want ample natural light, as available from a location near a north or east window. And, the plants need a light, well drained soil which duplicates their native growing habitat.

Here is a listing of plants that are fairly easy to grow in the home with their light requirements. Remember, no plant is fool-proof, but these should perform well under average indoor conditions.

Rubber plant-widely known.

and used as house plant. Needs good light. but can exist in a poorly lighted situation for a short time.

Fiddle leaf fig-Most sweettempered of all house plants. Love it, hate it, ignore it, still it thrives. Needs good light. Dracaena-many varieties and types, and most do well indoors. Prefer indirect light of high intensity.

Ferns-well adapted for growth at low light intensities and will be damaged if illumination is too strong.

Philodendron-will survive where illumination is dim, but does better in higher light intensities.

Jade plant-nearly indestructible. Tolerates poor growing conditions, but does like plenty of light. Aralia-lovely airy plant with

slim ribbonlike leaves of dark green. Likes plenty of light and water.



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

EMERGENCY LIVESTOCK LOANS

Livestock producers can now get credit assistance from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), says an economist for Texas Agricultural the Extension Service. FmHA now guarantees up to 80 per cent of osses on loans made by private lending institutions to farmers and ranchers who breed, raise, fatten or market beef and dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, chickens, and turkeys. The maximum guaranteed loan is \$250,000 to any single borrower,

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News arm-facts **Compiled From Sources** Of The Texas Department of Agriculture John C. White, Commissioner Crop Prices Down . . . 1973 Was Good Year . . . Rain

Slows Harvest . . . Many Honored Families

TEXAS FARMERS and ranchers don't have to be told that 1973 was a good year, but this year is another matter. The 1973 prices just haven't held up. Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service says that all farm products price index on August 15 was 13 per cent below last year although three per cent above the same time the previous month. Prices on livestock and livestock products were 35 per cent below last year and seven per cent above the previous month. That means that a beef animal that brought 34.90 cents a pound in August would have brought 54.20 at the same time in 1973. Hogs that brought \$36.20 a hundred (up \$3.80 over July 15 prices) would have brought \$55.80 on August 15, 1973. On the other hand, the price index on all field crops was 21 per cent higher than a year ago. Sorghum at \$5.03 a hundred was \$1.50 higher than a year ago. Upland cotton that brought 44.2 cents a pound was 9.2 cents above last year. But wheat was 19 cents a bushel--at \$4.05--below last year; and \$9.80 rice was \$1.20 below last year. Corn that brought \$2.75 a bushel on August 15, 1973 brought \$3.16 on August 15 this year. Corn was only \$2.74 a bushel a month earlier.

COMMISSIONER JOHN C. WHITE earlier released figures showing that Texas cash receipts for all crops and livestock in 1973 totaled \$6,467,923,000 (that's billions), which has to be a record. Production was better than in 1972, except in rice, pecans and fruits, and possibly a few other minor crops. Livestock cash receipts in 1973 in this State amounted to half of the total, \$3,673,825,000, which was an increase of a billion over 1972. Texas, as usual, was first of all the states in the production of cotton, grain sorghum, wool, mohair, watermelon, cabbage, spinach.

MORE RAIN over the State delayed harvesting, and Hurricane Carmen threw a scare into Texans and accounted for a part of the rain. Cotton harvest was judged 16 per cent completed, much farther along than the four per cent harvested at the same time in 1973. Fall plowing of cotton land is well along in the Valley and Gulf Coast, Rain across the Northern High Plains delayed wheat planting, but Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service estimated that four per cent of the planting was complete. Oat planting was not that far along. More than half the grain sorghum has been combined in the State, and peanut harvest is about a quarter complete and also delayed by rain. Most of the first 1973 rice crop has gone to market. The first oranges and grapefruit from the 1974-75 crop in the Valley have gone to market. Yield is expected to be below the 1973-74 cron

WTSU Prexy Is Speaker

Setting "educational significance for the goal of West Texas State University," President Lloyd I. Watkins gave his first "State-of-the-University" address to WTSU faculty and staff Sept. 18 in the Activities Center.

"I have been here a year, and it is time that I set forth for the people interested in our University-those who work here and those who support it-the goals and dreams I have for the University," Watkins said.

Shunning the idea of a "Quixotic dream," Watkins stated that the "Quest for a reputation for significance obviously requires, however, extraordinary commitment and dedication.

"Each time a faculty member spends additional time teaching a student or adds to his or her field of knowledge; each time an administrator dries harder to provide the essentials for excellence; each time an employee of the university provides a service to the region; each time WTSU excels-we will have taken another step along the road to significance.' he said.

When asked whether student enrollment growth will be a fair meansure of rising significance, Watkins stated that "a university can grow in a variety of ways. Certainly the most obvious type of growth is growth in size, and I hope we do grow in enrollment.


