Mrs. Haney, born as Sallie Anne Drake and daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. P. M. Drake, was born October 3, 1874 in Tennessee. The family moved to West Texas when she was a child. She married the late T. M. Haney of Plainview in August, 1892, at the home of her parents in the old Haney community, located on the Foard-Wilbarger county line southwest of the Five-in-One community. Mrs. Haney recalls difficulties with Indians even in the years after her marriage and after she and her husband began living east of Thalia.

Mr. and Mrs. Haney moved to Vernon in 1938 and Mr. Haney died in 1940. E. M. (Epp) Haney lived with his mother for many years until his death in 1972 when his mother was 98. At this time, she moved into the local rest home. She attended Sunday school and church until she was 94 years old, and has been a member of the First Baptist Church of Vernon for 36

# **ASCS** Committee

Foard County farmers are asked to nominate candidates of their choice to be on the ASC committee ballot, says Mrs. Thelma Borchardt, acting executive director of the Foard County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office. The ASC committee election will be conducted from November 22 to December 2, by mail ballot. Petition forms were mailed out to all known eligible voters on September 30. The forms can be returned to the local ASCS office anytime between now and October 29.

A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulating petitions. Mrs. Borchardt said. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected, must be signed by three eligible voters, and received in the ASCS office no later than Oct. 29. A farmer may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as he

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



#### COTTON PEST MANAGEMENT PAYS

An economic study of the 1973 cotton pest management program conducted by the Texas Agricultura Extension Service shows that the program is a paying proposition. The pilot program, in its second year, showed an increase in net profits of \$1,203,529, or an average net return of \$35 for every dollar invested by farmers. Total yields were up 4,300 bales. The program covered 36,000 acres of cotton in four of the state's major producing areas-Cameron. Willacy and Hidalgo counties in South Texas, Frio County in Southwest Texas, Pecos and Reeves counties in Far West Texas, and Hill and Ellis counties in North Central Texas.

#### DAIRYING SITUATION Dairymen are caught between

a rock and a hard place, and the

future offers little encouragement, says an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Feed costs continue to jump while the price they receive for milk is dropping. The uniform price per 100 pounds of milk has decreased more than \$1.30 since May. Texas dairymen have cut their herds by more than 6,000 cows from 1973 levels. However, overall production continues steady due to per cow production increases. Some people are blaming heavy imports of dairy products as well as a weakened consumer demand for the low prices dairymen are receiving. Did you know that the annual
