A. V. McCombs Re-Elected SCS District Director

A. V. (Mack) McCombs was re-elected director of zone 1 of the Foard County Soil and Water Conservation District last Thursday, October 10. Mr. McCombs was re-elected by landowners in zone 1 to a five-year term, the local Soil Conservation Service office announced Monday.

Zone 1 is bounded on the west and south by the Foard County line, on the north by Highway 70 and on the east by Highway 283. Mr. McCombs has served as director of zone 1 since the local district was organized a few years ago. He has also served as secretary-treasurer of the district. Other members of the board of directors are Eldon Whitman, Jack Welch, Melvin Moore and J. A. Marr.

Herb Wells Buys Local Flying Service

Herb Wells announced Tuesday that he has purchased the airplane equipment of the late Richard Vecera of Crowell, and is now operating a spraying service out of the Foard County airport. Mr. Wells is a retired Air Force veteran.

Contract Awarded for Repair of Court House

The Commissioners Court in a meeting Monday morning voted to award the contract for repairing the Foard County court house to the E. A. Young Waterproofing Co. of Tyler. The

court received two bids and the Young bid which was accepted was for \$16,100.

Included in the work to be done is sandblast cleaning of the outside of the structure, repairing defective mortar joints, silicone waterproofing, plaster repaired under all porch landings and cleaning and waterproofing of the walls. Windows are to be caulked, scraped, sanded, primed, reglazed and finished with No. 1 quality paint.

This work will be done with revenue-sharing funds the county has received.

School Board Has Meeting Monday Night

The Crowell school board in a meeting Monday night approved the payment of some \$23,149.20 in bills, which included \$4882 for a new bus, \$1600 for a vacuum pump for the boiler system, \$2000 in insurance premiums and \$1414 to the firm which makes oil valuations for the district. Cafeteria costs for the period total \$3502.77.

Fifty-eight aluminum windows were received Monday, and they will be used in the final phase of replacing all the windows in the elementary school. Installation of the windows is set for next summer.

The board members approved and signed the insolvent and delinquent tax rolls. Laying of concrete blocks at the stadium restroom and storage addition is beginning this week. Joe Smith has done the preliminary plumbing work, and the foundation was poured awhile back. Enough lumber to build the roof of the addition will be taken from the Thalia High School building.

The board voted to sell three used vehicles—1959 Chevrolet panel, 1964 Ford Falcon panel and 1964 48 passenger Chevrolet bus, with bids to be opened at the December meeting.

About 1.5 inches fell in sections south of town, 1.1 inch fell north of Crowell and about an inch to the west of town. The rain fell slowly all day Monday, it cleared late Monday and it was sunny and warmer Tuesday after an early morning low of 40 degrees.

With continued sunny weather, the wheat sowing will resume in a few days.

Revenue Sharing Payments in Foard County Total \$113,270

Congressman Bob Price reports that local community and county governments in the 13th Congressional District

received \$2,021,830 in recent payments issued October 4 by the Treasury Department under the federal revenue sharing

program. Since the initial revenue sharing paying in December 1972, local governments in the 13th district have received a total of \$22,401,260, Price reports.

October payments in Foard County, as reported by Price, were \$8,360 to the county of Foard and \$1,727 to the City of Crowell. Total payments received to date for both governments are \$113,270. Prior payments are \$85,108 to the county and \$18,075 to the City.

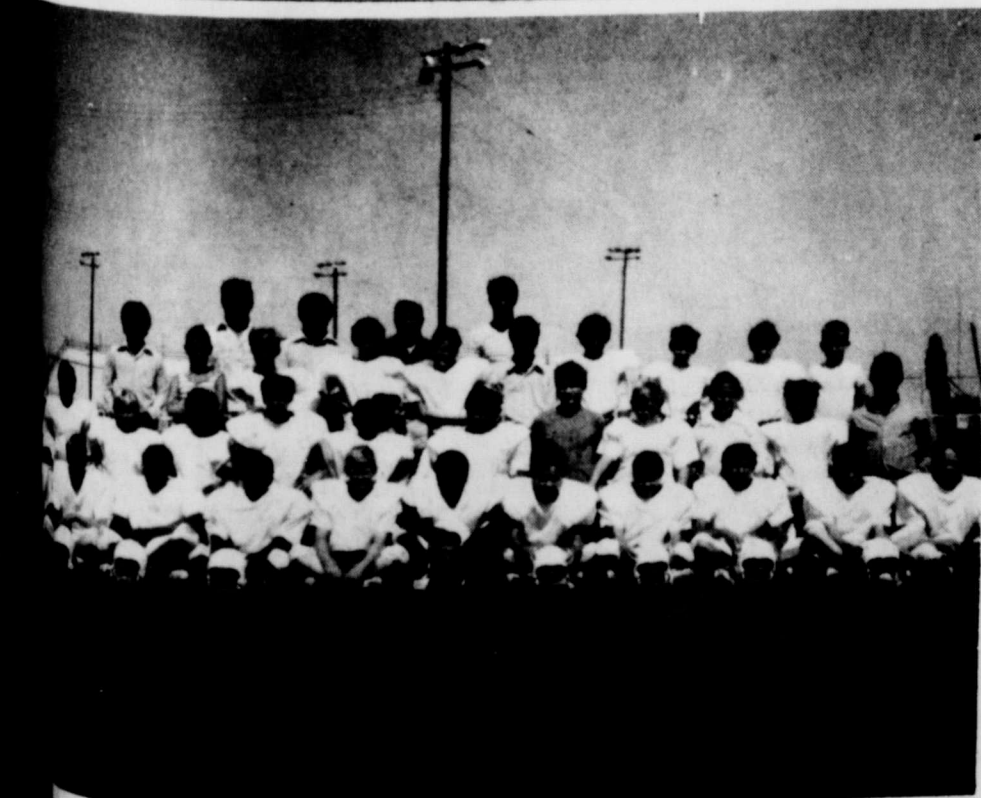
Coach Printiss Gidney said Monday that the Cats came through the Electra contest with no serious injuries and should be in top condition for the district opener.

Bonds Sales Still Lag

Series E and H United States Savings Bond sales in Foard County during the month of August totaled \$665., according to County Bond Chairman George Self. Sales for the eight-month period were \$7,214 for 10% of the 1974 sales goal of \$70,000.

Texans purchased \$18,667.52 in Savings Bonds during the month, while sales for the same period last year totaled \$17,913,390—an increase of 4.2%. Year-to-date sales amounted to \$154,751,211 for 65% of the sales goal of \$236.8 million.



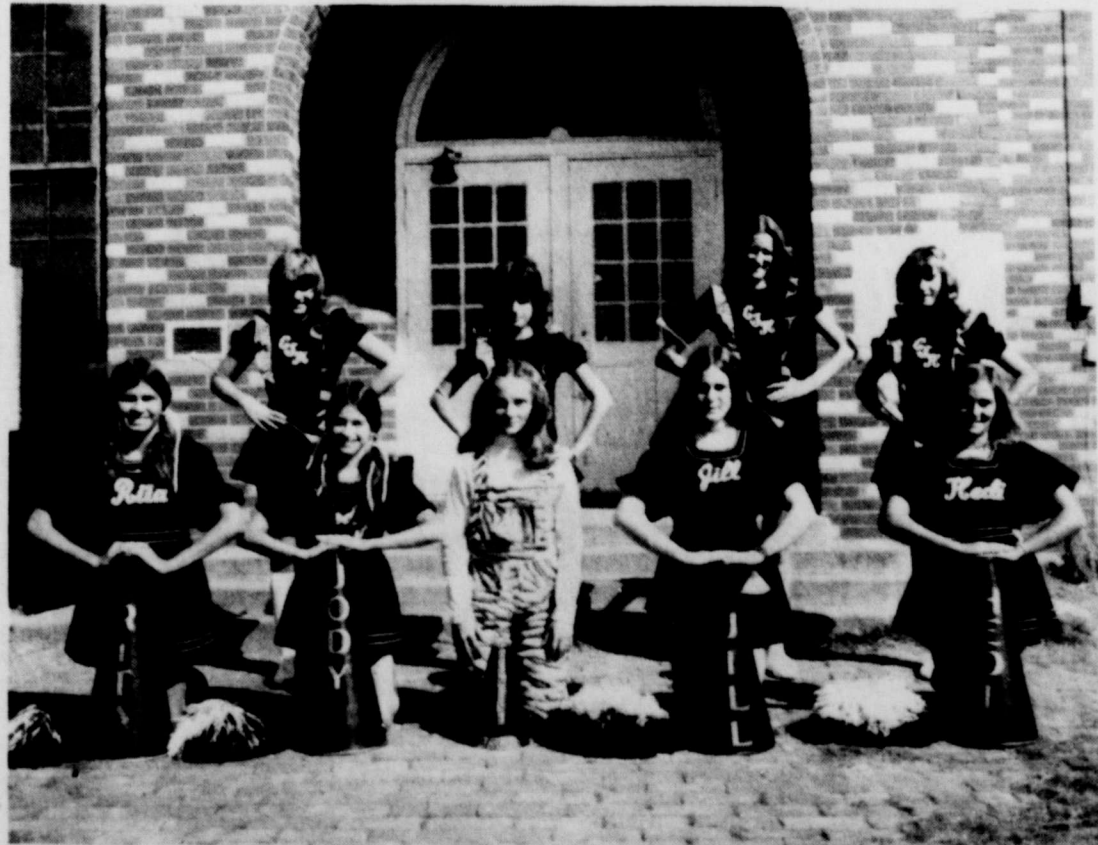

School pep squad who lead the cheering when the grade school teams play on Thursday night.



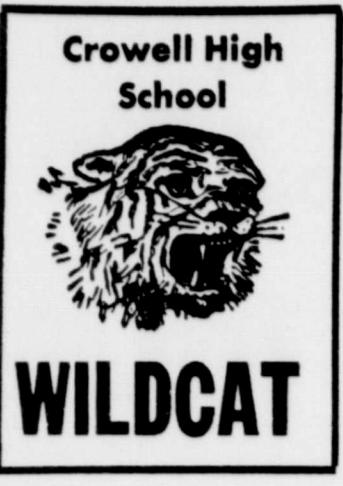

Hints for Homemaker

Foard County "do-it-yourselfers" will have "their own" television series with the start of a new program of KFDX-TV Channel 3 at 1:00 p.m. Saturday, October 19.

"You Can Do It!" is a 13-part, educational series on home care and repairs. It is designed to teach viewers simple, money-saving care and maintenance techniques.

Created and produced by home economics specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, through a special United States Department of Agriculture grant, "You Can Do It!" is being aired statewide on an alternating basis.
