





rich, they will probably crumble or turn rancid. Moist sheet cookies cut into bars, and flat, moist individual cookies are the best travel selections. Cookies flavored with honey and fruit improve with age.

Other food items suitable for mailing are fruit cakes, candies, pies, canned meats, pickles and relishes.

Before wrapping, allow cookies to cool then wrap several flat ones together in a piece of cellophane or foil. Bar cookies should be wrapped individually.

After wrapping, pack cookies snugly in a heavy box or tin, stuffing crumpled tissue or newspaper into all corners and spaces and separating the layers with more paper. If any space remains between the top layer of cookies and the box lid, fill with paper.

Fit the box lid down snugly and seal with cellophane tape around the edges. Take larger pieces of moisture-proof cellophane and over-wrap the entire carton, sealing the edges with a warm iron or with tape.

Encase the wrapped box in corrugated paper, then wrap again in heavy brown wrapping paper. Make sure the name and address is written plainly. Tie the package securely with several rounds of sturdy twine. Mark the package "This side up" or "Fragile.



### 30 Years Ago in The News

News items below were taken from the Thursday, December 7. 1944, issue of the Foard County News:

The government Census Bureau is preparing to take the usual five-year agricultural census beginning immediately after Jan. 1, 1945, and census takers will be needed for the work in Foard County.

During the rainy period which began last Saturday and extended through Tuesday. Foard County received 1.13 inches of rain.

The meeting of the Crowell Rotary Club was held Wednesday at noon in the dining room of the Premier Hotel, the meal being served by M. A. Wilkins. owner and manager of the DeLuxe Cafe, and his regular employees. The DeLuxe Cafe was destroyed by fire last Wednesday morning.

The Seymour Panthers. football champions of District 11-A, defeated the Crowell Wildcats, champions of District 12-A, by a score of 20 to 0 here last Thursday afternoon to become bi-district winner.

A second election, this one without parties, speeches and tourchlight parades and limited to the farmers of the nation, will be held between December 11 and 16. Every farmer taking part in AAA programs will have an opportunity to vote for community committeemen.

The Foard County committee of Sheppard Field Camp and Hospital Council received a call for 38 additional Christmas packages to be sent to the coast for servicemen who will be on board ship on Christmas day.

Randall Ryan coaches the boys varsity and girls. Carl Brock is JV coach.


