## Ginnings Near 4000 Bale Mark

Ginning of Foard County cotton almost reached the 4,000-bale mark late last week as the latest report from the USDA cotton division classing office at Altus listed the total thus far for the county as 3,974 bales, including the 415 bales classed last week.

The year's total compares to the 6,496 bales at the same time last year.

## Front Has High Winds

A fast-moving front pushed through this area early Sunday morning on winds of 60 miles per hour and more. The front hit about 4 a.m. Sunday and the high winds continued most of Sunday. The mercury dipped to an early-morning low of 26 degrees Monday.

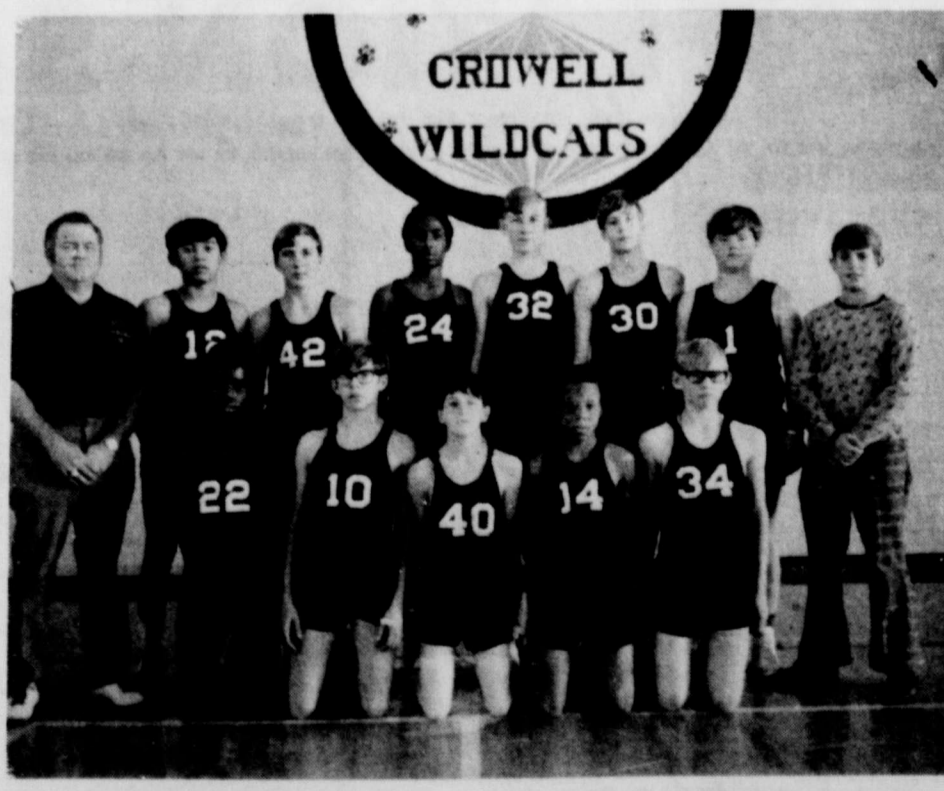
## O. J. Menefee Died Dec. 23 in Oklahoma

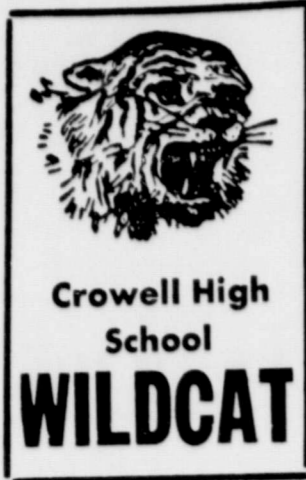
Funeral services were held December 28. When he lived in Crowell, Mr. Menefee was employed by Magee Toggery

## Hints for Homemaker

Don't let the cost of more tender cuts of meat keep you from enjoying this high protein source.

Less tender cuts of meat such as chuck, rump, round, and brisket cuts are equally as nutritious as more tender cuts of meat such as loin and rib cuts. To obtain a more tender texture from a less

tender cut of meat, use moist heat cookery. Moist heat cookery is cooking meat with liquid like tomato juice or vinegar. Methods of moist heat cooking include pot roasting, braising, and stewing.

Generally a constant, low heat improves flavor and appearance. The browning of meat before adding liquid develops flavor and color—exceptions are corned beef and cured meats. Always use a tight fitting lid to hold in the steam.

Here's a tasty recipe using a ground meat that is easy to prepare and serves 12 people. Brown 1 lb. of ground meat and drain the extra fat. Add one package spaghetti sauce mix, 1 8-oz. can tomato sauce, 1 No. 2 can stewed tomatoes, dash salt and pepper, 1 c. water. Cook this slowly while preparing 1 pkg. lasagna noodles. Follow direction on noodle package. Drain noodles. Grease large casserole dish. Layer the following: Noodles, 2 carton cottage cheese, meat sauce, 3 slices Mozzarella cheese, repeat these 4 layers again ending with the Mozzarella cheese. Sprinkle Parmesan cheese; cover and bake at 350 degrees for 30-45 minutes.

## Big Crop of Oranges Goes to Market

A record crop of oranges is coming to market, Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt reported this week.

The consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, also predicted attractive prices on oranges.

"Grapefruit also is plentiful, and quality is excellent," The Texas A&M University System specialist added.

"Apples, bananas, and avocados are other good fruit choices, pricewise."

Mrs. Clyatt said economical vegetable choices are broccoli, cabbage, carrots, potatoes, dry yellow onions, turnips, rutabagas and hard shell squash.

At meat counters, retail beef prices haven't changed much in the past week, the specialist noted.

"In general, look for best beef values on chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, ground beef and liver. Pork values include Boston butt roasts, shoulder roasts, smoked hams and picnics. Fryer chickens are good values, and supplies are adequate for the demand, Mrs. Clyatt concluded.

## J. M. Hill to Speak Here Thursday

J. M. Hill of Vernon, former Crowell resident, will present the program at the Women's Service League luncheon, Thursday (today) at the community center. Persons desiring to hear the program only are advised it will begin shortly before 12:30 p.m.

At last week's meeting Norma McPherson explained the many drawbacks that she sees in the Equal Rights Amendment now being considered by the states. She emphasized that persons already have the right to equal jobs and pay without regard to race or sex. If an employee feels he is being discriminated, he may sue at the expense of the federal government. The ERA makes no attempt to change this.

However, the ERA states "equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex." The federal government has approved the ERA and when 38 states ratify it becomes law within two years. To date some 31 states—including Texas—have approved. If the ERA becomes law it will be enforced by the federal government.

Miss McPherson feels that many citizens do not realize that this would require both sexes using the same facilities in public restrooms, public schools, college dormitories, prisons and hospital rooms.

Child care centers could be established for 24-hour care and women forced to work against their desire. Girls

would be required to register for military service and used in combat. Joint military facilities including barracks would exist.

Under the ERA the wife and children need not use the name of the husband. In some instances, the wife could lose her children and still be forced to pay child support.

It is quite apparent that states would lose many of their rights to the federal government. The ERA also insists that child-bearing leave be the same for both sexes. Thus a company that grants maternity leave for women must give paternity leave to men. Miss McPherson also noted the many ways the economy could be affected.

The guest speaker feels that neither the federal government or Texas realized the many bad features of ERA when they ratified it. A movement is presently underway in Texas to rescind the amendment. This legislation should come up around February. Miss McPherson asked residents to write Rep. W. S. Heatly and Senator Ray Farabee; State Capitol; Austin, Texas 78711 if they wanted the ERA annulled.

She urged all citizens to write Senator Ray Farabee and ask him to vote to repeal the Federal Rights Amendment and urge him to attend the legislative committee hearings on the ERA.

At the Tuesday senior citizen meeting there were 32 members present along with eight visitors: Mr. and Mrs. Don Crafton, Sally Sowell, Ricky Hammonds, Karen Statter, Rita Hodges, Mrs. Jack Webb, Donna Webb and Miss McPherson.

Senator Farabee's work on the Jurisprudence committee



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# Baylor Bears Impress Nation with Cotton Bowl Performance

WACO—The impact of the Baylor University Bears' recent performance in the Cotton Bowl is being felt across the nation in ways no football scoreboard could record.

An editorial entitled "Prayer and Football"

The World War II GI Bill, signed into law June 22, 1944, is said to have had more impact on the American way of life than any law since passage of the Homestead Act more than a century ago.

printed in the Jan. 4 issue of the Manchester, N.H., Union Leader commended Baylor, not for its football prowess, but for its "witness to the Christian faith (at the Cotton Bowl) before millions on millions of television viewers across the entire land."

In terms of disposable income, the average income of farm people lags seven percent behind that of non-farm people, said Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

In the editorial, William Loeb, publisher of the paper, wrote that "never before had such a large audience seen a football game open with prayer, including the Lord's Prayer, and with almost everyone participating."

This act of devotion and affirmation and belief, Loeb wrote, "was quite usual for the Baptists at Baylor, but it is not something that one generally sees on the football field or in the bowl games. As such, it must have been quite an eye-opener to a great many Americans to see that there are still people who believe in the Almighty and who are not ashamed to stand up before millions and to affirm their faith."

"Equally interesting and equally dramatic," Loeb continued, "was the fact that after the game, the defeated Baylor team knelt in prayer and interestingly enough, was joined by a number of light uniforms of the Penn State players."

"These football players gave an example to the rest of the nation that might well be imitated. If followed, it is very possible that some of the problems now facing the United States would be more easily solved."

"This newspaper," concluded the editorial, "pays its respects to Baylor and thanks the students, the football team, and the administration at Waco, Texas, for giving the nation a great example."
