Crowell water consump-Authority was up over 11/2 million gallons in December. 1974, over a year ago. December '74 purchases totaled 5,811,000 while the same month a year before purchases totaled 4,154,000 gallons. Biggest December for Crowell water purchases was in 1972 when a total of 7,144,000 gallons were used. December '70 purchasesfirst year of the Greenbelt-Crowell bought 2,018,000 gallons and in 1971 purchases were 2,727,000 gallons for Crowell.

Childress continues to be the biggest user of Greenbelt water, followed more closely each month by the Red River Authority which furnishes water to rural areas of this section. In December 1974, Childress bought 14,923,000 gallons; Red River bought 10,453,000 gallons; Clarendon used 9,366,000; Quanah 8,808,000; Bestwall 3,910,000; Hedley 1,331,000 and Copper Breaks was listed as having used 13 gallons of Greenbelt water during December.

She emphasized that persons already have the right to equal jobs and pay without regard to race or sex. If an employee feels he is being discriminated, he may sue at the expense of the federal government. The ERA makes no attempt to change

However, the ERA states "equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex." The federal government has approved the ERA and when 38 states ratify it becomes law within two years. To date some 31 states-including Texashave approved. If the ERA becomes law it will be enforced by the federal government.

Miss McPherson feels that many citizens do not realize that this would require both sexes using the same facilities in public restrooms, public schools, college dormitories, prisons and hospital rooms.




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
