Easter Spell Brings Snow and Sleet


Mother Nature's annual Easter spell hit Foard County with all its fury last week, and from the low temperatures of the 20's probably did away with most of the county's fruit crop.

Urges New -egislation

H. L. Ayers, Jr. of Crowell, president of the Foard County Farm Bureau, has requested Congressman Jack Hightower to introduce legislation in the U.S. Congress to increase federal estate tax exemptions. H. R. 1793, a bill which

would accomplish this, has been introduced by Texas Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson. A number of other Congressmen have introduced bills similar to, or identical to, the Burleson bill Mr. Ayers said in a letter

to the Congressman that the federal estate tax has now become an unreasonable burden on those who wish to keep the family farm or ranch in the family. He noted that back in

1942, when the \$60,000 estate tax exemption was adopted, farm and ranch values were so low that not many people had to worry about the tax problem. Today, because of inflation and assessments based on subdivision or other development potential, even an average-size farm or ranch may have an assessed value of several hundred

thousand dollars, he said. The county FB leader said H.R. 1793 would: (1) Increase the present

\$60,000 primary exemption to \$200,000. (2) Raise the marital

deduction from 50 percent of the adjusted gross estate to \$100,000 plus 50 percent of the total value of the adjusted gross estate.

(3) Establish a procedure whereby farm estates could elect to be assessed at their value for farming purposes rather than at fair market

Homeowner's Fruit and Nut Spray Schedule

Unfortunately the recent cold weather has damaged many fruit trees here in Foard County. Hopefully, however, some may have escaped this damage and others may recover.

Homeowners and producers must also remember that throughout the growing seasons, insects and diseases reduce the quality and quanity of fruits and nuts harvested each year. A few carefully timed applications of fungicides and insecticides used in combination with certain cultural practices can reduce insects and diseases.

Healthy plants are less susceptible to insect and disease attack. Follow a well-balanced fertility program; select well-adapted varieties and practice proper pruning to obtain optimum tree growth.
