

#### Velox Ward painting to ap on Mobil Oil Companyas and always we

#### Bicentennial Calenda

Velox Ward is a walking, talking, smiling legend in East Texas. His national and international honors are almost as numerous as his friends and admirers. Still another major honor has come to the pleasant, soft-spoken artist. The Mobil Oil Company commissioned him to create a painting for their Bi-Centennial Calendar. The painting will be reproduced in a limited print edition of 200 pieces which will be sold to galleries and museums. It will then be reproduced for the calendars and posters distributed by the company.

Velox Ward's success story has been remarkable. He started to paint in 1960 when his three grown children suggested that he paint a picture for each of them. These were to be given as Christmas gifts. They turned out to produce a far greater gift than any of them would have expected. He bought the minimum of supplies, four 10 x 12 canvas boards and a few brushes. He explains that he bought four because "I knew none of them would want the

In describing his first few paintings he said, "While I was painting one day I drew off this little old house on the Jefferson Highway and this salesman fella' from Dallas saw it and wanted to know if I could paint his mother's old home from a photograph. I said I could try and I did it and he liked it and paid \$35 for it. I thought that was pretty good. Then this lady saw that one and she wanted me to do her old home for her so I did that commission for her. Folks kept commissioning me to do houses and things like that

Ward said he was surprised when one prospective buyer offered as much as \$200 for a painting. He decided that he needed some help. ". them to Mrs. Bourdon. She was the only person around here then that knew that much about art I thought."

Dick and Kela Bourdon exhibited paintings in Longview then. He was encouraged by the Bourdons. "I got 12 paintings together and the Longview Bank and Trust put them on display and I let the Bourdons price them and everybody came along by and by to see them and brag on them. One really famous artist saw them and he advised me not to take lessons or I would ruin what I had.

A painting was accepted for the Dallas Museum of Fine Arts Texas Exhibit. Don Vogel, director of the Valley House Gallery in Dallas, saw the painting in that show and immediately signed Ward as a member of his gallery group. A one-man show followed. Velox Ward's paintings gained immediate acceptance and popularity in Dallas. Today Velox Ward is listed in "Who's

Who in American Art." His paintings sell for \$2,000 to \$5,000. His work is included in the permanent collection of the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, the Texas Bank and Trust Company of Dallas, Amon Carter Museum of Western Art, Fort Worth to name only a few of his honors. Three of his paintings were reproduced in a Mc-Graw Hill 7th Grade American History textbook and thousands will be seen in the Mobil Oil Company's calendars and

In describing his paintings the artist called them "Memory Scenes." He feels that, "There is always a good story in old homes when they are enjoyable and people were living in them. I wouldn't like to paint these empty old places you see crumbling. That would depress me. I like to paint the happy times." He said, "Those were the happy times. People were a lot happier than they are

One of his good old homes is "The Red House," owned by Mrs. Bruner Smith. "It was one of my first things,"





#### The County Agent Says...

Lawn Mowing Safety

If you haven't already, you will probably soon get the lawn mower, fill it with gasoline and mow your yard. A lawn mower can turn into a hazardous machine if used carelessly

To protect yourself and others a few points to keep in mind for safe operation of a lawn mower include: always wear leather shoes and long pants while mowing the yard; remove any rocks, sticks, toys or other objects in the yard before mowing; keep children and pets out of the yard while it is being mowed and don't mow grass if it's wet as it can damage the grass and clog the mower blade and discharge chute. Some additional points are: always mow slopes sideways; turn off the engine and

disconnect the spark plug coarse lint fibers and is not wire when working on the mower or refueling; never leave a running mower unattended; and keep the mower in good working shape. Finally remember to always "push" don't "pull" the mower and don't refuel the mower while the engine

**Boll Weevil Resistance** Cotton producers will probably be interested in a new particular strain of cotton called "Pilose". This strain of cotton has been found to be resistant to the boll weevil. The key behind this is that this cotton's fibers form "locked" bracts which interfere with the egg laying of the boll weevil. The Pilose strain also shows more resistance to thrips and fleahoppers than the blabrous cotton. However, Pilose cotton has short,


