Rest Home Construction Underway

Work is underway in the southwest part of Crowell on the construction of a new 80-bed rest home for Foard County and this area.

Final papers are expected to be completed within the next few days and in the meantime ditches are being dug and plumbing is being installed preparatory to the pouring of the floor.

Ray McDonald of Abilene is the man who is building the new rest home here. Basically a T shaped building, wings will extend from the basic T design.

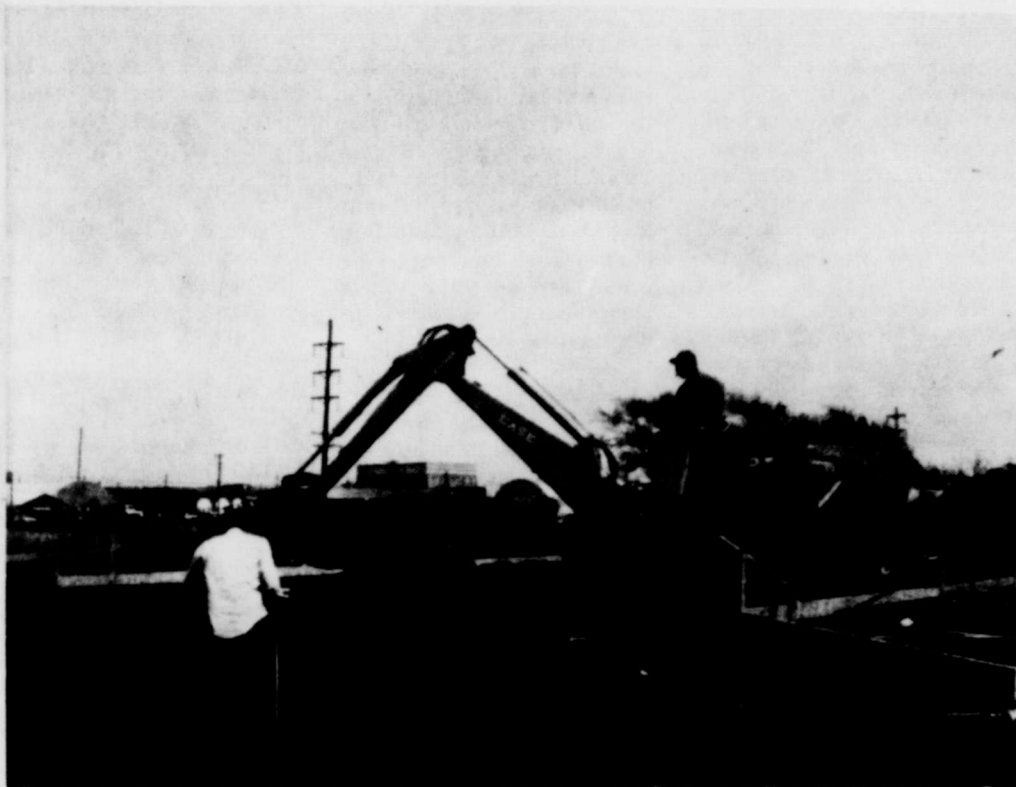
The new building is located on the block just west of the city park, and will face west. Ample room for parking will be located on the east side of the building.

Construction of a rest home in Crowell has been one of the prime projects of civic leaders for the past several years, and local residents are elated over the fact that the project is at long-last underway.

Money given by residents last year to help with the project will be used to help defray the many expenses incurred in securing the land for the builder, and in moving and improving utilities on the property.

Foard Hospital Approved for Medicare Patients

It was announced at a meeting last Thursday night of the board of directors of the Foard County Hospital that the local facility had been approved again for treatment of Medicare patients.

County Judge Seth Halbert said the announcement of the okaying of Foard County Hospital by Medicare came at the same time that Medicare had declared some 40 hospitals in Oklahoma unsuitable for care of Medicare patients.

At last week's meeting a discussion was held concerning a new computerized EKG

monitoring system for rapid reading of EKG tests on heart attack victims. Halbert said the new system would be more economical than the present method of taking or mailing an EKG to Wichita Falls to study and then telephone calls telling the results of the reading. He said Dr. Walter Stapp, local doctor, was studying the several different brands of computerized EKG monitoring systems with the board to study his recommendation with final action coming at a later board meeting. Judge Halbert says the

hospital, which takes about \$20,000 per month to operate, is in sound financial condition and is presently paying its way.

Soil Conservation Service to Observe 40th Anniversary

Forty years ago, the country faced tremendous problems brought about by erosion, floods, land damage, and violent dust storms.

In 1937, President Roosevelt recommended that each state legislature enact laws permitting landowners and land occupiers to form units to be called Soil Conservation Districts.

On April 27, 1935, a new agency, the Soil Conservation Service, was created to combat the forces that threatened to lay waste to millions of acres of cropland.

Soil and Water Conservation Districts set out to focus attention on land and water problems on all privately-owned land, develop annual and long-range programs designed to solve the problems, and to enlist all the appropriate help available from public and private sources.

Texans to Ballot Again on Legislative Pay Raise

For the seventh time since 1965, Texas voters will go to the polls to vote on whether or not Texas legislators should receive a raise in wages. Balloting is set for Tuesday, April 22, across Texas to vote on proposed pay raises for legislators and also another proposal to consolidate and revise state and local retirement systems.

The proposal for legislators' pay would set the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and a per diem of \$30 during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees. Present salary is \$400 per month and \$12 per diem.

The students will compete as three member teams in 11 separate judging events. Livestock, dairy cattle, milk and dairy foods, poultry, meats and agricultural mechanics judging events will serve as elimination contests for Areas I and II of the State Future Farmers of America (FFA) Judging Contests. Five contests, cotton, wool, crops, land, and range and pasture plant judging, are known as Texas Tech Contests and are held because of their importance in the South Plains region.

30 Years Ago in The News

News items below were taken from the Thursday, April 12, 1945, issue of The Foard County News:
A good rain, which was not general over the county, fell Tuesday afternoon, measuring .72 inch by the rain gauge at the Crowell State Bank.

Lt. Jim A. Hart, son of Mrs. A. S. Hart of Crowell, has been cited for the award of the Bronze Star for outstanding bravery in action in Germany in December 1944. In military operations Lt. Hart single-handedly killed 3 Germans and captured the remaining seven of the squad who were advancing on a house which commanded Company A's flank. Lt. Hart has also been awarded the Combat Infantry Badge and the Purple Heart, which was made for wounds received Dec. 6.

Verne Walden was elected president of the Crowell Rotary Club and Grady Halbert vice president at the Wednesday meeting of the club held at the DeLuxe cafe. John Ray, charter member of the club, was present at the meeting after being absent for several weeks on account of illness.
