## **Bids Asked** for New Post Office

The U.S. Postal Service is seeking construction bids for a new post office building in Crowell. The new building will be located on the same site as the present post office. Foard County Development Corporation is owner of the tract which contains 21,000 square feet of land. The Oklahoma City Postal

District, which includes postal operations in all of Oklahoma and a large portion of the Texas Panhandle, will receive and open bids for the Crowell office at 2 p.m., Friday, July 25, at the district office, 4545 Lincoln Blvd., Oklahoma City, 73105.

The new building will contain 1,856 square feet of interior floor space. The bids are based on the controlled site on which the Postal Service already holds an option to purchase.

The building will be leased by the Postal Service for ten years, with renewal options of 20 additional years.

## Possible **Record Bass**

Fried

TYLER-"'lf 'ifs' and 'buts' were candy and nuts we would all have a Merry Christmas," is an appropriate saying when it comes to fish records which might have been.

The Texas state record for largemouth bass has been on the books since 1943, when a 13-pound eight-ounce lunker was pulled from Lake Medina near San Antonio.

Back on May 14, a 70-yearold resident of Caddo Mills in Northeast Texas landed a huge bass from a local farm pond where he had fished for years.

He took the fish home and weighed it on a small set of scales which only went to 12 pounds. The scale indicator zoomed past the 12-pound mark and he scratched a line opposite the place where the indicator came to rest.

He then cleaned the fish and ate it.

When other residents of Caddo Mills learned of the fish, they retreived its huge head from the garbage pail and put weights on the scales to get the pointer back to the marked spot.

It took 14 pounds 12 ounces of lead weight to reach the mark.



## J. B. Harlan **Retires from** S. C. S.


