



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

Moisture is mostly adequate throughout Extension District 3. Showers to two inches rain was received in four counties.

Cotton is fruiting well and making good growth. Moderate to heavy boll weevil, bollworm damage was reported in twelve counties, with some spraying

Early sorghum harvest continues. Other sorghum is in blooming to heading stages and maturing rapidly. Midge and greenbug damage was reported in several counties, but lessening with control measures applied. Sunflowers are being

harvested, with good yields. Pastures and ranges are furnishing excellent grazing, but weeds continue to be a problem. Livestock are in good to excellent condition. Screwworms have been confirmed in a few counties

Farming activities included baling hay, harvesting sorghum, wheat land preparation, and insect control on cotton, pecans, sorghums, and guar.
