

#### SCREWWORMS WERE WIDELY SPREAD ACROSS TEXAS IN AUGUST

Screwworms were widely spread across Texas, from Cameron County on the south to Wichita on the north; from Hudspeth on the west to Brazoria, Walker and Houston counties on the east, during August. More than half the 2,549

August cases came from southernmost counties where an unusually wet summer has led to great numbers of Gulf Coast ear ticks. As many as 60% of currently reported cases are coming from ears of cattle in this region.

The 5,676 Texas screwworn cases confirmed by laboratory identification by the end of August is second only to 54,769 in 1972 by this date in history of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradications for the program administered by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS).





### determine vield data. Soil Testing Important

Proper rates of fertilization should be a major concern of producers who intend to plant small grains, winter pastures, or other fall crops. High crop vields or successful grazing cannot be placed to help those realized without adequate soil fertility and most soils in

#### Foard County are low in one or more nutrients. In most cases nitrogen and phosphorous. Soil tests are the most accurate indicator of what nutrients are available and which ones are in short supply and should be the basis for developing fertilizer

### **PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is

Provide that the powers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three distinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly attached to either of the others.

lature, is amended to: Continue the present structure of the legislature consisting of a senate with 31 members and a house of representatives with 150 members. The present organization and procedure of the legislature are continued except that the provision allowing closed executive sessions of the senate is omitted. Provisions on the conflict of interest of members of the legislature are continued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in appropriation bills. The article provides for single-member senatorial, representative, and congressional districts. A compensation commission is created to recommend the compensation and allowances to be received by members of the legislature. The legislative compensation, set by law, may not exceed this recommendation and does not take effect until after an intervening general election. The article provides for annual sessions of 140 days in odd-numbered years and 90 days in evennumbered years, and a veto session of 15 days upon request of threefifths of the membership of each house. The legislature may meet in organizational sessions prior to the convening of the legislature in regular sessions Article IV, The Executive, is amended to: Continue the present status of the governor and all other statewide officers, and include the commissioner of agriculture as an executive department officer. The governor is limited to two the Texas Constitution. consecutive terms. The governor is authorized to designate chairmen of state boards, and to remove gubernatorial appointees to state agencies for cause unless the removal is vetoed by the senate. The article mandates the legislature to provide a new governorelect an appropriation so the governor-elect may organize an office prior to inauguration, and permits the legislature to grant powers of fiscal control to the governor. All governmental agencies, with several exceptions, have a life of not more than ten years unless extended by the legislature, and, at the regular session held in odd-numbered years, the governor shall submit to the legislature a report on the organization and

efficiency of the executive branch.

ment program. 4-H'ers will be aided this year by "Spotlight on Management," a new 32page member manual in 'lights, camera, action' format. The manual was developed jointly by the Cooperative Extension Service, the National 4-H Service Committee, and Tupperware Home Parties. It focuses on the four steps to effective management: setting a goal, planning how to reach it, acting to put the plan in motion, and checking up on the results.

4-H'ers learn that decision making is what management is all about. They might tackle family food bills and come up with cost-cutting techniques. Or organize personal work schedules that set realistic goals and conserve time and energy.

Whatever projects they choose, 4H'ers are awarded national college scholarships of \$1,000. One top program member from each state receives an expense-paid trip to the 54th National 4-H Congress, Nov. 30-Dec 4 in Chicago. And four mambers per county are eligible for medals of honor.

All winners are selected on the basis of their records of accomplishment by the Extension Service, which conducts the 4-H program. Additional information is available from county extension agents.




