Wheat Sowing Is Going Full Blast

With lots of moisture in the ground from recent rains, Foard County farmers have been busy the past few days

sowing wheat. The television weatherman Tuesday morning was predicting showers and cooler temperatures for Wednesday. However, another week of clear weather would

probably see most of the 1976 wheat crop sowed in this area.

Many falls during the past years, farmers have had to 'dust' in their wheat seed, but such is not the case this year. September rainfall was over three inches in most sections of the county, and moisture-wise, the area is in terms excellent condition

The year 1975 will probably go down in history as the biggest year for construction in Crowell, with the possible exception of 1942 following the rebuilding of the town after the disastrous tornado.

Earlier in the year, the congregation of the First Baptist Church completed and moved into the new \$300,000 facility on the highway in the north part of town. About two weeks ago, the \$500,000 80-bed Crowell Nursing Center was opened to the public.

Now, the contract has been awarded to a Wichita Falls firm for a new \$75,000 post office in Crowell. Construction is expected to get underway within a short

With the three buildings. construction in Crowell has reached the \$875,000 mark for the year.

This total does not include at least one new home and many different remodeling and improving projects at residences in Crowell during the year.

Soil, Water Conservation District Sets Director Election

An election to name a director for Zone 2 of the Foard County Soil and Water Conservation District has been set for 10 a. m. Thursday, October 9, it was announced here this week.

Zone 2 encompasses an area bounded on the south by Highway 70, west to the Cottle County line, north to the Hardeman County line and the east boundary of Highway 283 North. Any landowner who owns land in Zone 2 and their spouses are eligible to vote in the election.

Four Mishaps Reported Here

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Foard County during the month of August, 1975, according to Sergeant Billy Dean, Highway Patrol supervisor of

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1975 shows a total of 12 accidents resulting in no persons killed and nine persons injured.

The traffic deaths for the month of August, 1975, occurred in the following counties: three in Castro; two each in Potter, Wheeler, Hale, and Palo Pinto; and one each in Archer, Parker, Yoakum, Hardemen and Wilbarger.



Rules and Regulations Set for 1976 FFA,4-H Project Show

1. All bonafide members of 4-H Club or FFA are eligible to participate in this

program. 2. The club members may purchase any breed of cattle or crossbreed and must weigh from 400 to 500 lbs. This will include a steer or

3. Calves must be purchased at public auction sale or any public market, between Nov. 1 and Dec. 1 and weight tickets turned in to the county agent or vocational agriculture teacher not later than Dec. 10. At this time the club member will be handed a record book.

4. Ownership by any member of immediate family prior to the date calves fair market price on all calves purchased at auction is and the records will be closed strictly prohibited.

5. All conditions pertaining to purchase of calves public shall be subject to review by the stocker-feeder committee and any participant found violating the rules shall be home.

FFA or 4-H. 3. All exhibits shown must be owned and cared for by the exhibitor.

4. To be eligible for the show, steers must weigh at least 800 lbs.; sheep must weigh at least 80 lbs., and not over 120 lbs. Hogs must weigh not less than 210 lbs., and not over 240 lbs.

5. Each exhibitor must fit and groom his animal for the show. Lambs MUST be slick sheared by Saturday, Febru-

6. Deadline for putting animals on feed and registering them with the county agent or vocational agriculture teacher is as follows: steers, Oct. 13, 1975; sheep and hogs, Dec. . 1975. No animal will be eligible for the show unless put on feed on or before the above dates, and registered with the county agent or vocational agriculture teacher on or before the above dates. All animals will be subject to spot check by a committee at any time.

7. All exhibits must be brought in by 2:00 p. m. Friday, March 12th. A veterinarian will be there to issue health certificates before any animal can be unloaded. A 3 % shrink will be assessed to each steer.

8. Each boy or girl is responsible to see that his name and the breed and and class his exhibit is to be judged in is on his exhibit, and is expected to be with his exhibit when it is judged. Judging will begin Saturday, March 13, at 8:30 a. m.

9. Prize money will be given as follows: steers, grand champion \$50, reserve \$25; hogs, grand champion \$35, reserve \$15; lambs, grand champion \$25, reserve

10. Auction of fat steers. lambs and hogs will begin at 1:30 p. m. Saturday, March

11. Each boy and girl who sells animals through the auction sale will be expected to write a thank you letter to the buyer.

12. All exhibits must be removed from the show place Saturday, March 13, immediately following the auction

Each exhibitor will be allowed to sell only one animal in a division through the auction sale.

Screwworm cases continue to increase in Kent County with seven new cases this week. Diapause bollweevil program continues in counties along the Caprock.

Weed infestations have restricted the production of grass in native pastures. Cattle are in good condition with stronger prices at all area markets.
