Construction Total Here Tops \$875,000

The year 1975 will probably go down in history as the biggest year for construction in Crowell, with the possible exception of 1942 following the rebuilding of the town after the disastrous tornado.

Goodwin Buys Auto Dealership

Glen Goodwin, a partner in Borchardt-Goodwin Chevrolet Oldsmobile dealership in Crowell for many years, is announcing this week his purchase of the business. Mr. Goodwin and the late Henry Borchardt were partners in the local auto dealership for many years before Mr. Borchardt's death earlier this year.

Goodwin Chevrolet-Oldsmobile will be the new name of the firm. Mr. Borchardt began his association with the Chevrolet dealership in Crowell in 1934. In January 1938, Mr. Goodwin joined the firm as bookkeeper and parts man. He later became a partner in the business.

ONE NEW VEHICLE

One new vehicle was registered here last week: Sept. 25, C. O. Johnson, 1976 Ford pickup.

Earlier in the year, the congregation of the First Baptist Church completed and moved into the new \$300,000 facility on the highway in the north part of town. About two weeks ago, the \$500,000 80-bed Crowell Nursing Center was opened to the public.

Now, the contract has been awarded to a Wichita Falls firm for a new \$75,000 post office in Crowell. Construction is expected to get underway within a short time.

With the three buildings, construction in Crowell has reached the \$875,000 mark for the year.

This total does not include at least one new home and many different remodeling and improving projects at residences in Crowell during the year.

Soil, Water Conservation District Sets Director Election

An election to name a director for Zone 2 of the Foard County Soil and Water Conservation District has been set for 10 a. m. Thursday, October 9, it was announced here this week.

Zone 2 encompasses an area bounded on the south by Highway 70, west to the Cottle County line, north to the Hardeman County line and the east boundary of Highway 283 North. Any landowner who owns land in Zone 2 and their spouses are eligible to vote in the election.

Johnny Marr is presently the director from Zone 2. Directors serve for 5-year terms.

Group Votes to Pave Street at New Rest Home

The Foard County Development Corporation, in a meeting Friday morning, voted to spend the money left in the rest home fund to pave the streets around the new

rest home. A few years ago, a drive for funds was made among area residents with the hopeful goal of getting a rest home for Crowell. Some of the money donated was used in clearing up title to the property where the new home is now located, and buying of some lots. Part of the money went to providing water and sewer lines to the home, and it was voted Friday to spend the remainder on a paving program around the home.

Speaker Talks on Beef Cattle Outlook

Norman Brints of the extension service, in a talk at the Rotary Club Wednesday of last week, said it will probably be 1977 before the cow-and-calf cattleman can see a turning around in prices. He added that the current rate of slaughter must continue through 1976 before the turn-around in prices can begin.

He said there was a smaller percent of increase in the number of cattle and calves last year, and more forage-fed cattle are being slaughtered. He said that in 1975 the number of cattle slaughtered is up 16% and tonnage of slaughtered cattle is up 5 percent. He added that overall production of red meat is down in the U. S. this year.

Crowell Wildcats Romp Over Chillicothe Eagles

Crowell Wildcats led their winning ways Friday night as they defeated the Chillicothe Eagles in a district clash which ended in a 30-0 score.

Tommy Bell rushed for 120 yards and scored two touchdowns for Crowell. Tamplen on a one-yard blast went in for six points, and Swan on a 10-yard run also got a Wildcat TD. A safety by Duane Daniel added 2 more points and Bell added the point-after following each of the four Crowell scores. In the first drive, a quick pass to Dee Finley netted 1 yard. Two option plays followed with Bell gaining 10 and Glasscock 25. Swan carried for 6 which took the ball to the Eagle 1 where Tamplen on a keeper went in for the score.

Myron Halencak saved a touchdown for Chillicothe when he knocked the Eagle fullback out of bounds after an exciting 62-yard gallop. However, the next play, Chillicothe fumbled, and from that point it took the Cats 8 plays to score with Swan getting the honors.

Later in the second quarter from the Wildcat 38, Tamplen pitched out to Bell who rambled the distance after breaking several tackles en route to the end zone. It was in the third period when Daniel caught the Eagle quarterback in the end zone and with just under 6 minutes left in the third period Bell blasted into the end zone from 8 yards out.

On defense, it was Melvin Westover, William Bachman, Daniel, Richard Naylor and Delbert Glover who were outstanding for the Wildcats. The Wildcats have an open date this week end and will get back in action Friday night of next week when they go to Electra to take on the AA Tigers.

Truscott Planning Big Amboree Saturday Night

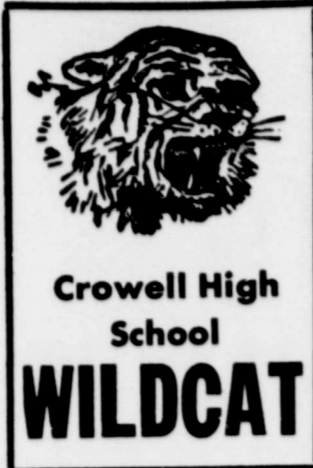
Residents of Truscott have added two new members to their big country amboree Saturday. The amboree begins at 7 p. m. Saturday, October 4.

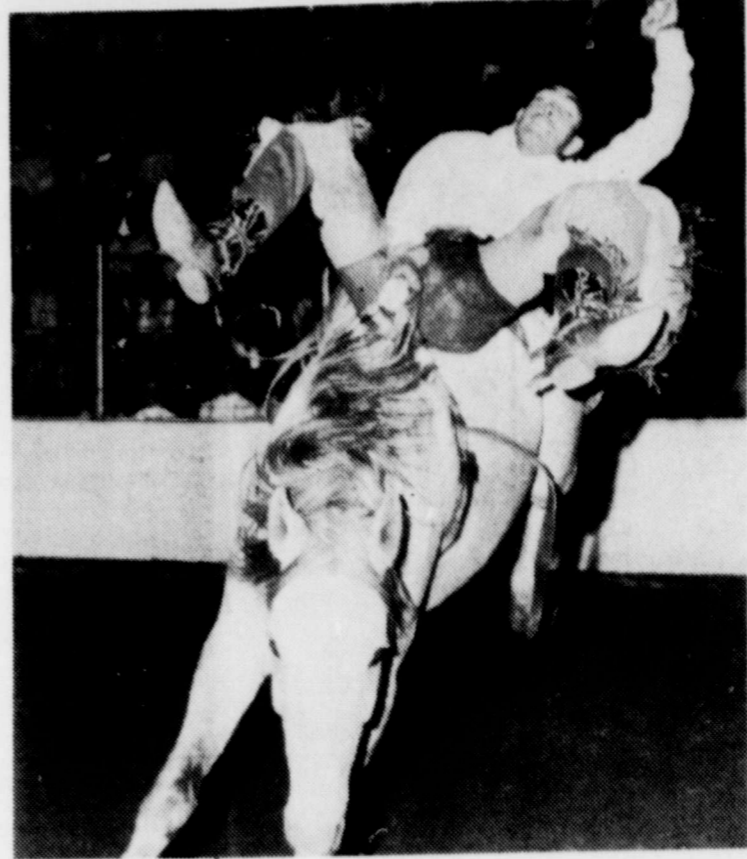

Crowell Native Killed

Funeral services for Joe Edward Meharg, 39, a native of Crowell, were held in Wichita Falls Tuesday conducted by Rev. Don McFarland, pastor of Mt. Zion Baptist Church in Dallas. Burial was in Crestview Memorial Park with Masonic graveside rites conducted by Faith Masonic Lodge.

He was killed in a two-car crash near Wichita Falls Saturday. Born August 16, 1936, in Crowell, he resided in Wichita Falls for ten years before moving to Dallas in 1964. He was an automobile salesman and a member of James Burges Lodge 1305, AF&AM, and Hella Temple Shrine, both in Dallas.

Last Insect Report Is Issued

In his last rolling plains insect report for the season, Emory P. Boring, area entomologist says that heavy boll weevil infestations can be found throughout the Rolling Plains area. He added that bollworm infestations have decreased during the past week.

Boring added that during the past week, seven new screwworm cases were confirmed on cattle in Kent County. Since August 3, twenty-six screwworm cases have been confirmed in that county.

Four Mishaps Reported Here

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Foard County during the month of August, 1975, according to Sergeant Billy Dean, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1975 shows a total of 12 accidents resulting in no persons killed and nine persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August, 1975, shows a total of 596 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 292 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August, 1975, shows a total of 596 accidents resulting in

16 persons killed and 292 persons injured as compared to August, 1974 with 542 accidents resulting in 30 persons killed and 314 persons injured. This was 54 more accidents, 14 less killed, and 22 less injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The traffic deaths for the month of August, 1975, occurred in the following counties: three in Castro; two each in Potter, Wheeler, Hale, and Palo Pinto; and one each in Archer, Parker, Yoakum, Hardeman and Wilbarger.

"First, any creed containing more than the Bible is objectionable, because it does contain more than the Bible.

"Third, any creed differing from the Bible is objectionable, because it differs from the Bible.

"Fourth, any creed precisely like the Bible is useless, because we have the Bible.

"This covers the whole ground. There can be no other thought. A creed must contain more than the Bible, less than the Bible, differ from it, or be precisely like it. No man defends his creed on the ground that it contains more than the Bible, less than the Bible, or that it is different from the Bible, or precisely like it. If a creed be not defended on some of these grounds, on what ground can it be defended? Certainly on no ground conceivable to mortal man."

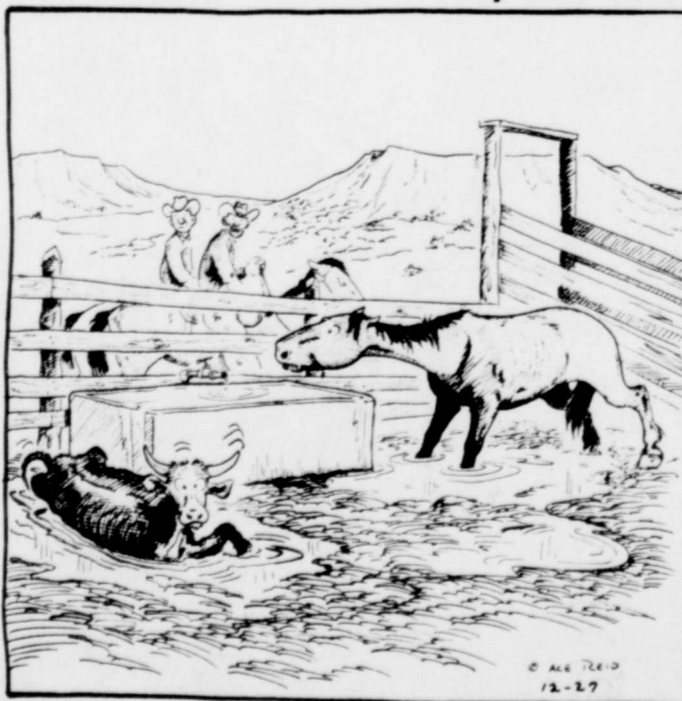

There is no distinction in eligibility for, or in the manner providing, any patient service provided by the nursing home. All facilities the nursing home are available without distinction to all patients and visitors regardless of race, color or national origin. All persons and organizations that have occasions either to refer patients for admissions or recommend Crowell Nursing Center are advised to do so without regard to the patient's race, color, or national origin.
