Crowell-Seagraves Regional Game Is Friday in Snyder

The Crowell Wildcats, bi-district class A football champion of this area, and the Seagraves Eagles, bi-district champs of far West Texas, meet at Snyder Friday night in a football game to determine which team will be entering the quarterfinals action of Texas Class A football.

The Wildcats will be facing opposition when they go up against the Eagles, who have been rated the No. 1 class A team most of the season. They have averaged giving up only 2.9 points per game in their 11 games this season. Seagraves is undefeated and in bi-district play last week defeated Iran 22-0.

Bryan Hawkins is the Eagle quarterback. Their big fullback is Mike Hoover and Kerry Jackson is the speedy scatback for Seagraves. Defensively, Seagraves has a fine nose guard, Danny Billings; Julian Flores is an outstanding defensive inside linebacker, and Bobby Welch a defensive end.

Crowell's Wildcats, coached by Printiss Gidney and Randall Ryan, are a sound, basic football team, and are coming off one of their finest games of the season in which they defeated Rotan 25-7.

Guided by Quarterback Tommy Tamplen, the Cats have two big running backs, David Bell and Rocky Glasscock, both of whom gained over 100 yards each, in the bi-district battle with Rotan.

They are joined in the backfield by Ronnie Swan, a fine blocker and another threat when he gets the ball. He intercepted a Yellowhammer pass last Friday night.

Defensively, the Wildcats have numerous outstanding players such as Myron Halencak, William Backman, Melvin Westover, Norman Hopper, Gilbert Torres and Duane Daniel, Bell, Glasscock and Swan.

The game set for 7:30 Friday night in Snyder, was finalized at a meeting between representatives of the two schools in Floydada Saturday. Representing Crowell were Gidney, L. H. Wall, Larry Jones and Mike Bird.

Crowell will be the visitor at the game and will be wearing their white uniforms. Officials for the contest will be coming from Fort Worth, as were the officials for the Crowell-Rotan contest.

The route to be taken by the team and band will be to Hamlin, then on FM 47 south from Hamlin to U. S. 180 and then west to Snyder. It is 143 miles from Crowell to Snyder and 120 from Seagraves to Snyder. The band will be eating before the game at the American Restaurant in Snyder and the football team will eat at the same restaurant following the contest.

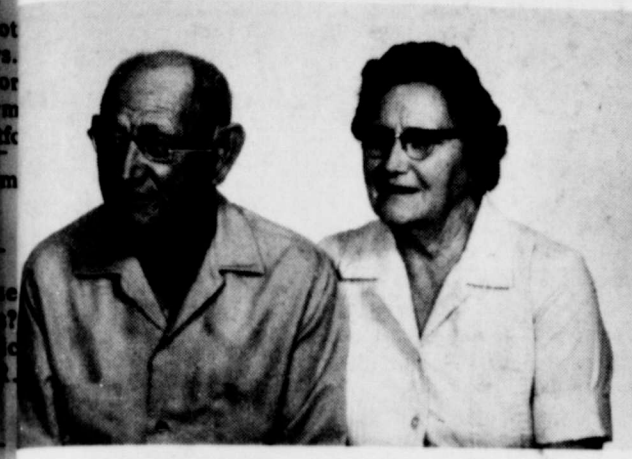

Wildcats Roll on; Defeat Rotan 25-7 in Bi-District

Crowell Wildcats rolled in their best game of the season Friday night at Stamford when they blasted the Rotan Yellowhammers 25-7 in a tight contest. Both teams entered the contest into the district play with Crowell being the 7-A champion and Rotan the champion of District 8-A.

Crowell's two "super stars" David Bell and Rocky Glasscock, were the men going into the game but it didn't matter how much they gained over 100 yards rushing and Bell

scored all the points. He kicked two field goals early in the ball game, then ran for a long touchdown, later two more TDs and kicked for one PAT.

Rotan won the toss and on the first play from scrimmage they gained 11 yards. But, on the very next play, Willie Bachman introduced himself to the Rotan back carrying the ball and along with the introduction separated the ball carrier and the ball. Gilbert Torres alertly recovered the pignide for Crowell. The Cats failed to gain and Glasscock punted

out of bounds on the Rotan 20. Then, on the next play, another fumble by Rotan with Melvin Westover recovering.

The Cats took over first and ten on the Yellowhammer 20. A five yard penalty and three plays later, Bell boomed his first points of the evening from 27 yards out, and the Cats led 3-0. Bell kicked deep following the field goal, and Rotan took over at their own 17. Rotan QB Frank Lopes put the ball in the air on the first play, and the pass was complete to Crowell's Ronnie Swan who raced back to the Rotan 24,

ASCS Newsletter Gives Information to Landowners

The November newsletter from the Foard County ASCS, Joe Sabbe, executive director, had the following information for Foard County farmers:

Low Yield Cotton or Feed Grain

Upland cotton or feed grain that is damaged by a natural disaster (high wind, excessive rain, insects, etc.) may be eligible for a disaster payment. If the damaged crop is not going to be harvested for lint or grain, it must be inspected by someone from this office before the crop is destroyed (plowed, baled, grazed, etc.) If the damaged crop is harvested, and the yield is low, an application for low yield payment must be made within 15 days after completion of harvest.

Wheat

1970 through 1974 is the base period for proving wheat yields. To establish a proven yield on a farm, you must furnish production evidence on all your farms for that period. If you wish to prove your wheat yield, you must submit the required production to this office by December 1, 1975.

Wool and Mohair

Producers who have sold unshorn lambs, marketed wool or mohair during the 1975 marketing year are urged to bring the original sales documents to the county ASCS office, and file an application for incentive payment. In order to be eligible for payment, should payments be due this year, your application must be filed by January 31, 1976. Incentive level on wool is 72 cents per pound.

Crop and Livestock Reports

During the last half of November and in December,

some 75,000 farmers and ranchers will receive either a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Accurate estimates have always been of great importance to producers, and are even more important in light of the supply-demand situation facing agriculture today. Data collected in this survey will provide an accurate picture of agricul-

ture for each county, and for the state of Texas. Each farmer receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully, and return it promptly to the agricultural statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential, and used only for state and county estimates.

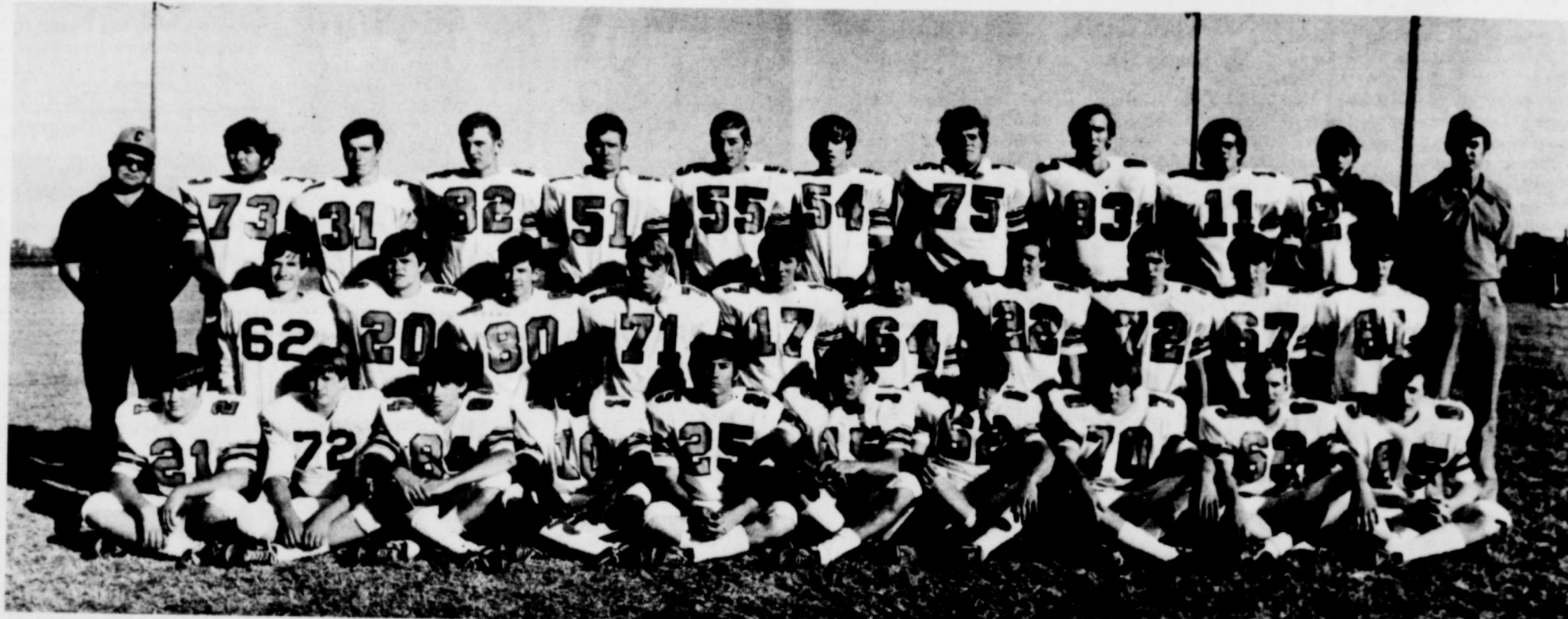

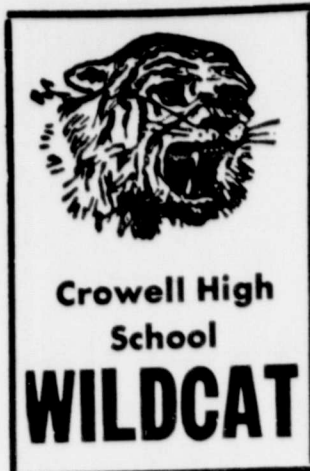

School Board Accepts Bid on New Agriculture Pavilion

In a called meeting Monday night, the Crowell School Board opened and examined the four bids received for the construction of a 70 x 100 foot agriculture pavilion. The board voted to accept the bid of Boyd Built Buildings of Boyd, Texas, at a contract price of \$14,010. The board decided to put a concrete floor in the structure and this is expected to cost an additional \$4,000. Plans are to rough in the plumbing and finish at a later date.

The board expressed a desire to transfer operation of the Greenbelt Licensed Vocational Nursing School to Vernon Regional Junior College after hearing Dr. Loyd Hughes, dean of instruction at VRJC, say that if the school operation is transferred to VRJC, the school will remain in Crowell. Supt. Larry Jones told the board that if the Vernon college would take over the operation of the LVN school, it would relieve him of considerable time-consuming work. The Greenbelt school, now in its eighth year, has been under the supervision of the local school since its inception.

Dr. Hughes said if the proposal is approved by the Vernon college board and the Texas Education Agency, the transfer would take place at the beginning of the next class in about a year. Funding of the local school

has been more of a problem each year, and Dr. Hughes and the board determined that funding will be easier if the school is operated by the junior college. Hughes said that once the nursing school becomes a part of the college program, funding will be accomplished as the college receives its operation money. Dr. Hughes said enrollment in the school would also be open to any person willing to pay the tuition along with those eligible to attend under the federal CETA program.

The board in other action accepted the resignation of Carl Brock from the coaching staff effective Nov. 30. Mr.

Brock will continue his classroom teaching duties. He requested that the \$100 per month extra he had received for coaching be discontinued. The board agreed.

The board approved the audit of last year's operation of school monies, and also approved the payment of some \$5,252.38 in current bills. Also approved was the purchase of a new electric typewriter to be used in the superintendent's office.

It was announced that Sheriff Emmitt Howard will escort the band and pep squad buses to and from Snyder Friday afternoon and night.

Local Residents Hear Report on Proposed Lake Project

Nine Foard County residents were in Quanah for a luncheon meeting last Thursday to hear the head of the Tulsa District Corps of U. S. Army Engineers say that a proposed fresh water lake on Pease River north of Crowell was not feasible at the present time. They also heard U. S. Representative Jack Hightower tell the Tulsa engineer that he would be in close contact with the Corps

of Engineers in requesting that they re-evaluate the feasibility from time to time. He also promised to visit the Corps of Engineers in Tulsa at a later date.

Col. A. A. Smith, district engineer of the U. S. Corps of Engineers of Tulsa said that if agricultural and recreational considerations were made, the initial project would cost about \$45 million, then follow with annual costs of \$3 million while providing benefits of only \$870,000 a year. He said if the water was used for municipal and industrial purposes benefits would rise to \$1.9 million annually.

About 75 people attended the meeting in Quanah which was also attended by Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, Rep. W. S. Heatly of Paducah, and representatives of the Texas Water

Quality Board in Austin.

Col. Smith, introduced by chairman Ed Lehman, traced the brine control project on rivers in the area and said that construction is scheduled to start on brine control on the Wichita River this coming year in the event funds are approved by Congress. He said the project as envisioned would improve quality of Lake Kemp water to the point that it could be used for domestic consumption 98 per cent of the time.

Col. Smith said that the use of low flow dams to stop salt water is the first of its kind in the U. S. and probably the world.

Col. Smith said that presently the Middle Pease River daily yields 1620 tons of salt and the Wichita River daily produces 1360 tons of salt. The proposed project of the Corps of Engineers is to pump all this salt water to the Crowell Brine Dam, northwest of Crowell, which will be designed to hold a 100 year supply of salt water.

Quail Season Gets Started Mon., Dec. 1

Quail season gets underway in Foard County next Monday, December 1. The season will continue through January 31, 1976 with a limit of 12 birds per day and 36 in possession.

Also opening on December 1 and continuing through January 16 is chachalaca season with a 5 per day limit and 10 in possession.

Reports are that there is a good crop of quail this year, but the wet summer and resultant heavy growth of broom weeds will make the finding of dead birds and cripples extremely difficult without a dog.

Two seasons opened in Foard County on November 16. They were the black bear season with a 1 bear limit and the javeline season with a limit of 2. These two seasons both close Dec. 31. On November 30, turkey season will open in the county and will continue through Dec. 15 with a limit of 3 gobblers.

There is a split season on squirrel hunting in Foard County. The fall season opened Oct. 1 and will run through Dec. 31 with 10 per day limit and 20 in possession. The other half of the season is from May 1 through July 31.

Duck and goose season is also open in Foard County at the present time.

Heatly will be one of nine members of the important committee which will study alternatives to ad valorem taxation in financing public schools and distribution of state funds to schools.

Joe Sabbe Is Rotary Club Speaker

Joe Sabbe, executive director of the Foard County ASCS, was the speaker at the Rotary Club on Wednesday, November 19, and talked about the Freedom of Information Act.

He told his listeners that his office by law must now give anyone asking for it information as to number of acres, program yields, and show maps of any farm in the county. However his office is not permitted to tell the actual yield of a particular farm without written permission of the owner of the farm. They also cannot give addresses of owners of farms or program payment amount received by any landowner or farm operator. He added that a ledger is kept on everyone seeking information about someone else's farm, and that information recorded in the ledger is available to the public.

He added that in former years, the ASCS used a person's social security number on every check the farmer received from the ASCS office. By the use of the social security number, information was also sent to Internal Revenue Service of the amount paid. However, a new law recently passed forbids the use of the farmer's social security number unless he gives permission, and now payment information does not automatically go to IRS.

Mr. Sabbe was introduced by Rotarian Ike Everson. Other visitors were student guests Ronnie Swan, Duane Daniel and Richard Naylor, and Rotarians Norman Whitsell of Harrisonburg, Va., and Howard Bartley of Quanah.
