Agricultural prod as a "food weapon" may be aiding the United States in charting a new international course, according to the dean of agriculture at Texas A&M University. Government is becoming more involved in international marketing, and food and fiber production is now a matter as much on the minds of national policy makers as is military balance among world powers. Agricultural exports contribute to the entire economy of the U. S., including employment for 1.2 million people and \$22 billion to our balance of here on Dec. 22. concerned, 1977 looks like the year when prices will improve once again. If cow slaughter continues heavy through 1976 and if replacement heifers are kept at low levels, there should be a much smaller calf crop in 1977. This, along with an expanded demand for feeder calves by feedlots, should lead to improved cattle markets, contends a livestock marketing specialist for the extension service. In the meantime, cattlemen must figure every possible way to

Wildcats Close 1975 Season; **Lose Regional Game 6-3 Friday**

The Crowell High School Wildcat football team, coached by Printiss Gidney and Randall Ryan, closed out the 1975 season at Snyder last Friday night when the Cats lost a close one 6-3 to the Seagraves Eagles, the No. 1 rated class A team in the state. The Wildcats the week before had won bi-district honors by defeating the Rotan Yellowhammers and this regional game with Seagraves was the first time since 1961 that a Crowell football team had advanced as far as the regional play-offs. That year, the Wildcats dropped the regional contest to Albany.

Although the Wildcats lost the game, they never gave up - and up until the final play of the game were fighting to get into field goal

The Wildcats had a great team this year. One veteran Crowell football fan called it the "best Wildcat team ever." Myron Halencak and

The Wildcats gained 249 yards rushing with Rocky Glasscock accounting for 124 on 23 carries. David Bell gained 71 yards on 21 The Wildcats' lone points

came in the second quarter when Bell kicked a 47-yard field goal to give Crowell the go-ahead after a scoreless first quarter. The second half started


with Crowell kicking off, and following a good return coupled with three first downs, Seagraves moved to the Wildcat 22. From that point, the Seagraves quarterback Bryan Hawkins hit end Brad Woods in the end zone for the lone Seagraves score. The try for point-after was no good as Rocky Marlow got a piece of the ball to send it astray.

That was the scoring for the night, but there were numerous other drives by both teams which were halted by either pass

interceptions or running out of downs. Early in the game, a Wildcat drive was halted on the Seagraves 18, when the Cats failed to gain on fourth down. Following the Eagle TD, the Wildcats marched from their own 30 down to the Seagraves 21 where a fourth down try failed to gain the first down by only inches. In the fourth quarter also, another Wildcat drive stalled when a fourth and 1 failed to gain. Two Seagraves drives were halted by Halencak's and Swan's pass interceptions. The awesome Crowell defense kept the Seagraves 11 from crossing the midfield stripe all the first half except for one time.

Eleven Wildcats completed their high school football career with the game at Snyder. They are Glasscock, Swan, Dee Finley, Bell, Myron Halencak, Ernie Myers, Billy Halencak, Delbert Glover, Richard Navlor. Duane Daniel and Melvin Westover.

Coach Gidney will have a number of juniors back for next year, along with a fine crop of sophomores and the Cats hope to be in the thick of the District 7-A race come next fall.

How much we need to take a spiritual lesson from our physical life. No man hopes to grow a wheat crop until he has planted the seed and cared for the land. This principal can be applied to our spiritual life.

CHANGES IN OPEN **BURNING LAW**

The Texas Air Control Board is putting into effect new outdoor burning regulations on December 5 which are designed to make sure that atmospheric conditions are suitable for pollutant dispersal. The regulations outline specific information relating to wind direction and speed, the minimum distance from residential, commercial and industrial areas where open burning can take place, and hours when burning should be conducted to allow maximum dispersion. The new regulations also affect the burning of salt marsh grass along the Texas Gulf Coast and the burning of municipal solid waste. points out an agricultural engineer for the extension service.

Holiday Jobs Can Affect S. S. Checks

Earnings from holiday jobs can affect the monthly payments of students, housewives, and other people getting social security benefits, according to Carl R. Beisner, social security Claims Representative in Vernon.

The amount people earn from holiday jobs will cause a reduction in their social security checks if their total earnings for 1975 are over \$2,520.

"For every \$2 you earn over \$2,520, \$1 in social security benefits is withheld," Carl Beisner said. "But no matter how much you earn for the year, you can get your full social security payment for any month in which you neither earn over \$210 nor do substantial work in your own business.

People planning to take holiday jobs should notify social security as soon as possible if they know their earnings for this year will go over \$2,520, according to Carl Beisner.

'Refunding overpayments to social security could cause hardship," he said.

People can get information about earnings and social security benefits by calling or writing any social security office. The Vernon social security office is at 1701 Cumberland (on the corner of Cumberland and Pease). The phone number is 817-552-9346.

LETTER TO EDITOR

We would like to request your help in protecting Texas residents from unscrupulous salesmen for proprietary schools not licensed to do business in Texas.

From time to time, we learn of salesmen who run an ad in a local newspaper for a few days, usually implying the offer of a job, enroll as many people as possible in a sometimes worthless course of study, get a down payment, and then leave the State. The student learns he has been gypped, but really has no one to turn to for help because the salesman cannot be located, and the school is in another state.

The most prevalent of these abuses usually involves what appears to be a job offer in the field of cattle buying. When the ad is answered, however, the salesman will enroll the person in a correspondence course with the promise of a job upon completion. The course material is usually badly out of date and, of course, the

job never materializes.
