Mrs. Wilma Cates, city secretary, said Monday that there have been no further developments in the natural gas hassle between the City of Crowell and owners of the wells in the Thalia field.

A story by staff writer Jerry Reed in the Saturday, Dec.27, issue of the Abilene Reporter-News concerning the Crowell gas situation quoted E. R. Culbertson of Fort Worth, a major stockholder in the Texas Natural Gas Co., owners and

operators of the local gas distribution system, as saying that the gas owners do have contractual obligation to provide his firm with gas. The story went on to say that "Culbertson said the company was against a drastic increase in price because Crowell is 'a poor town' and cannot afford it. They (the well owners) think they have us over a barrel, but they don't."

He (Culbertson) explained that Texas Natural is one of the well owners and that if the other owners become intransigent, his company may drill its own wells to take care of needed production.

Also, he noted, Lone Star Gas Co. has a pipeline through the field near Thalia. Texas Natural thus has the possibility of buying its gas from Lone Star, he said.

Culbertson said the gas produced at Thalia is "dry" and has a low BTU (heat) rating. "Dry" gas, he noted, has no byproducts, such as kerosene, propane and butane, to increase its value.

And the low BTU rating, he said, means that more of the gas must be burned to achieve the same heating effect of normal gas. (The field produces gas with a 700 to 740 BTU rating, compared to a standard 1,000 BTU, he

The Reporter-News story's last paragraph stated, "So, as matters stood Friday, Crowell residents were still turning on their gas and getting warmth. Producers had not shut in their wells.'

Jefferson, the new booklet pays tribute to men like John Muir, Aldo Leopold, and Hugh Bennett, whose writings, teachings, and actions did so much to lead America from the policies of land exploitation to those of modern day soil and water conservation.

Like the other booklets in the series, "Pioneers of Conservation in America" is designed as an aid to teach young Americans about the wise use of our natural resources. The new booklet offers several project ideas to get youngster involved in natural resource problems while learning about conservation leaders. A teachers guide is also available to complement the booklet.

The Society has sold over 15 million of the conservation cartoon booklets in the series since the publication of the first, "The Story of Land", in 1955. Single copies of the new booklet are available for 30 cents. The teacher's guides are 25 cents. Discounts on quantity purchases are available.



Quarantine Is Delayed

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced Jan. 2, that it is delaying the effective date of its federal brucellosis quarantine on Texas from Jan. 5 until Jan.9.

According to officials of

USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), the quarantine is being postponed because of a temporary 10-day restraining order issued Dec. 30 by Judge J. T. Boyd of the state's 64th Judicial District Court in Castro County, restraining order requires the Texas Animal Health Commission to bring the Texas brucellosis program into compliance with the

brucellosis program. A hearing on the state court action is scheduled for Jan.8 in Dimmitt, Texas.





Last Year Is Wettest in Almost 20 Years



GALVESTON: Sotera Pena, the well known restauranteur, has returned from Philadelphia where he has rented a good location for the victualizing of Texas visitors to the Centennial Exposition.

ELLIS COUNTY: The Ellis County Democratic Convention convened at Waxahachie. All the different precincts were fully represented. A resolution was adopted indorsing (sic) the administration of Governor Coke.

January 1 - 7, 1876

FORT WORTH - Happy New Year - this is the first day of January, 1876. Quite a number of drunks and downs were reported for Christmas Week, but not a single fight, as far as we have learned. Truly Fort Worth is a peaceable town.

WACO - Marshall & Early's block was burned on New Year's Eve with the entire stock of goods lost. Loss totalled \$20,000; insurance on block \$6,000; on stock \$5,000. Cause unknown.

HOUSTON - The meeting of the opponents to the new constitution called at Perkin's Theater at noon today was a complete failure. The Houston reporter of the Galveston News, the commercial editor of the Telegraph and one of the publishers of the Age were the only persons present. Two of those favor the instrument and the other is on the fence.

GALVESTON - This week, month and year closed simultaneously upon a dull cotton market.

BRENHAM - There are 14 prisoners in our county jail, and nine of the number are charged with hog stealing. This amusement costs the taxpayers a dear price.

GALVESTON — Two dead bodies have been discovered in a cesspool in the rear of, and on the outside of the City Hospital grounds. Although the bodies were too far decomposed to ascertain their identities, it was obvious from the state of the corpses that they had been used as subjects in the dissecting room. An investigation has been ordered in the "shocking affair."






