Considerable confusion has arisen concerning the new voter registration law. Details as to what precisely members of the Legislature had in mind when they decided to make changes in voter registration are not

It is agreed that a new type of registration is desired, giving certain information never before required. Every voter is expected to comply.

If these facts are kept in mind, most of the confusion about parts of the new law will be dispelled.

January has been set aside as a registration period. Clearly it is desired that all persons of voting age register this month. But county tax collectors are required to mail notices beginning February 1 to all who fail to register in

The wise course is to forget everything about the new law except to register in January. Those who do this have nothing to worry about. There is no other way to be absolutely sure you are qualified to vote in 1976





Freeze Damages Some Area Wheat

District Extension Agent Ed Garnett in his weekly crop report says very cold, dry weather with temperatures reaching a low of six to ten degrees in most of the twentyone counties in Extension District 3 resulted in some freeze damage and delayed growth of small grain.

Moisture is reported short in one-third of the counties and adequate in the remainder. Greenbug damage was reported in several counties although extreme cold weather also slowed insect activity.

Cotton harvest is nearing completion with an average of ninety per cent completed.

Ranges in below to average condition are supplying some grazing in addition to limited small grain grazing and some supplemental feeding. Livestock are in fair to good condition, with cattle showing some shrinkage due to freezing weather and high winds.

General farming activities include feeding and caring for livestock, harvesting cotton, and preparing cotton land.

Current market prices indicate that incentive payments will be made for wool for 1975. Payments will be made on bona fide sales of wool and unshorn lambs for 1975 if the average price received is below the support level. Producers that have any wool or unshorn lambs must file an application by January 31, 1976

Cotton producers, be sure to return your production cards (ASCS-503) as soon as possible after harvest.

Cotton which was damaged by a natural disaster (rain. wind, etc.) may be eligible for a disaster payment. Application for low yield

Recent Bomb Scare

Fred R. Vecera of Crowell, who is a patient in the Administration Hospital in Oklahoma City has written the news about a bomb scare in the big VA hospital.

Vecera said in his letter that he was on one of the floors where patients were relocated on higher floors of the 9 story structure following the scare.

hung up. Also, a suspicious looking briefcase was removed by the bomb squad of the Oklahoma City police.

The briefcase and suitcase were both treated as potential bombs but neither the newspaper clipping or Vecera stated what the contents of the cases were.


