

## New Child Care Act Is Explained

The new child care act, Senate Bill 965, states that it is unlawful for a person to operate a child care facility without a license or registration through the State Department of Public Welfare. This includes those persons who are caring or babysitting for six (6) or fewer children in their homes, either full-time or The Vernon welfare office

## Information Given on Social Security

People who plan to apply for supplemental security income payments can save time by first getting together some information about themselves, according to Carl Beisner, Social Security Claims Representative from

The supplemental Security income program makes monthly payments to people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 or over or blind or disabled. People can get information about applying for the payments by calling or writing any social security office.

"When applying," Beisner said, "it's a good idea to have with you as many of the following as possible: A checkbook, if you have one, to show how much you have in the bank, any savings account books, stocks and bonds, life insurance policies, automobile registration cards, latest real estate tax statements if you own a home or any land, last year's income tax return, W-2 forms, and evidence of all other income.'

In an informal discussion, members told interesting facts they had heard about the difficulty in making the move across Pease River and the establishment of the county seat in the new loca-

Dr. Mark Francis, for whom the award was named. was born in 1863, and was the first dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University. In 1903, Dr. Francis and a few of his colleagues founded the Texas Veterinary Medical Association and Dr. Francis served as the organization's first president.

It was Dr. Francis who fought and won the battle against Texas (tick) Fever in cattle, a disease that was communicable to humans as well as animals.

Dr. Francis was still serving his student's, his university, and the health of on the A&M campus where he had built a monument of veterinary medical learning for generations to come.

The veterinary medicine giant received his training at Ohio State University and on the 75th anniversary of the university, school president W. O. Thompson said of Dr. Francis

## The County Agent Says...

**Home Gardening Calendar** For the home gardener who wants a "day-to-day" plan to follow throughout the year, the extension service has the answer-a new garden calendar.

The calendar has just been published and is available from the extention service for 25 cents a copy.

The new calendar is a daily guide that lets the gardener know when to do what for a successful garden and features a list of recommended vegetable varieties for this area of the state along with a guide which provides information as row and crop spacings, time required for crops to mature, and expected yields. The calendar deals primarily with vegetable gardening, but also includes hints of growing fruit and nuts, shrubs, flowers and lawn grasses.

**Transplant Trees Properly** For successful transplanting of trees, shrubs, and vines, particular attention should be given to a few

In transplanting any woody plant, the planting hole and backfill used are extremely important. The hole should be just deep enough to allow the tree or shrub to be set at the same depth it was in the container or at the nursery.

The poorer the soil, the backfill, it should be enriched with at least one part peatmoss or compost to 2 parts soil. Build a dam about

8 to 12 inches beyond the edge of the hole as an aid in

water and slows root growth. Fertilize only after the

plant is well established. Improper pruning of trees can be just as bad or worse than not pruning them at all. Onthe other hand, proper pruning can turn a tree or shrub into a beautiful plant specimen

Here are ten pointers to consider as far as the pruning operation is concerned:

Do not top trees. Topped trees often die because the topped branches cannot heal, thus letting in decay fungi and bacteria. Also, side branches below topped stubs are usually weaker and are subject to wind damage

Prune at the right Prune deciduous trees and shrubs, vines, ground covers, and evergreens during the winter. However, an exception is that spring flowering shrubs such as azaleas, forsythia, bridal wreath and gardenias should be pruned after flow-

3. Use proper tools. Hand shears can handle twigs under one-half inch in diameter. Long handled lopping shears are needed for timber one-half to one inch in diameter. Branches larger than one inch in diameter should be cut with a pruning

4. Make all cuts flush with the trunk. Stubs don't heal properly and the decay and deterioration spreads down the trunk of the tree until wind topples it. Seal big cuts with

pruning paint. Use pruning paint on cuts larger than one inch in diameter to ward off insects and diseases. 6. Repair damaged plants at

once. Plants should be kept healthy year-round. Use common sense

when pruning. Watch for limbs that may fall over power lines or damage other property.

8. Always prune after transplanting. Pruning is

especially important for balled and burlapped plants; this compensates for roots lost during digging.

9. Beware of the door-to door pruner. If you can't handle the pruning job yourself, hire someone with an established operation and years of reputation.

10. Have a reason for pruning. Don't prune just to pass the time of day.

Late winter and early spring is the season to apply dormant oils for controlling some of the hard-to-kill insect pests on trees and shrubs.

Dormant oils are especially refined petroleum oils that contain emulsifying agents which allow mixing with water. They are effective for controlling pests such as scale insects, mites, pecan phylloxera, insect eggs and hibernating caterpillars. These oils kill the egg as well as immature and adult stages of insects and mites by enveloping them in a continuous film of oil, thereby smothering and ultimately killing them.

Dormant oils have several advantages over most other insecticides, such as being less expensive, giving good covering action, leaving residues on fruit and nut trees that are exempt from tolerance, and being safe to handle. However, oils are toxic to leaves, have low toxicity to some insects, and are relatively unstable in water solutions.

A dormant oil can be used on any trees and shrubs that are in the dormant stage. However, better insect control will be obtained if used in late winter or early spring just before new plant growth begins. Apply the oil when temperatures are between 40 and 65 degrees F. Do not make an application if freezing weather is expected within 48 hours after treatment.

When mixing and applying dormant oils, use only the amounts recommended by the manufacturer. Some trees tolerant to normal application rates of oil may be damaged if excessive amounts are used. Even normal applications of oil have been noted to damage beech, sugar and Japanese maple, walmut, butternut and some spruces. Cover tree trunks and limbs thoroughly with the spray but avoid excessive application of the oils.

Re-upholstering a chair or sofa may extend its life-but there's more to selecting appropriate upholstery fabric than meets the eye.

Some of the prettiest fabrics may be the worst performers, and it's no "cost cutter" to use fabrics designed for garments or draperies either.

Turning to positive points for fabric selection, select sturdy fabrics-those that are tightly woven. Pull on the

fabric to be sure yarns don't slip. All yarns used in the weave should be about the same size to reduce abrasion.

Beware of fabrics with heavy latex or acrylic backings. Only a thin coating for reinforcement and stabilizing of yarns is necessary. A heavy backing may be a substitute for better fabrics.

Also, check the label for fiber content-the blends using a greater percentage of man-made fibers will usually be stronger. Nylon and olefin fibers are also highly stain

Even in easy-care, stainrepellent fabrics, light colors and solids will show soil faster and require more care. So, select tweeds, stripes, plaids, or other patterns in deeper colors for better wearing.

And don't forget plastics -they're a good choice in a room that gets a lot of living. Plastics are available in many design varieties and colors. Some of the newer ones "breathe" making them cooler and more comfortable.

But avoid plastics that aren't fabric-backed-they won't wear well. Also plastics aren't indestructiblethey can tear and some household cleaners, polishes, and nail polish remover will "eat through" them.



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
