# Re-Hired by School Board per year raises and will now draw \$2,600 above state

**Coaches and Band Director** 

The Crowell school board, in the regular March meeting Monday night, rehired the two members of the coaching staff and the band director. Athletic director Printiss Gidney and band director James Streit were given \$500

scale up from the \$2,100 above received this year. Basketball Coach Randall Ryan received a \$400 raise bringing his salary to \$2,200 above state scale. Last year

he received \$1,800 above. The board is now receiving applications for two more coaching jobs in the local system and tentatively agreed that a total of \$3,100 above state schedule will be divided between the two additional coaches to be employed.

The board discussed a physical education program for the elementary grades and also the possibility of additional music for the younger students, but no action was taken along this

Also discussed was the proposed 7-period day for the local school, instead of the present 6-period day. A decision is expected to be made at the April meeting. Supt. Larry Jones reported

to the board that he had employed Mrs. Barbara Tucker as a custodian in the grade school and the board authorized Jones to employ a replacement in the custodian department to replace Willie Rodriquez who recently resigned.

The board accepted the

resignation of Mrs. June McLain as third grade teacher. Mrs. McLain, who has taught in the local system for four years, will resign at the end of the current school year. The board approved the

payment of \$24,789 in bills including \$17,854 spent thus far on the ag pavilion and \$3.604 for cafeteria ex-

Jones told the board that a meeting has been set here Thursday to discuss with a representative of the Texas Education Agency the possibility of adding vocational agriculture courses in the local high school.

The board voted to take out insurance on the new ag pavilion with W. F. Statser of the Farmers Union and set a few basic guidelines for use of the new building.

They are: no alcoholic beverages in the building, no private storage overnight. school activities to have priority on use of the building and a \$25 charge be made for the use of the building by non-student-related organizations. This charge will be for utilities and cleaning expenses.

Preceding the meeting, board members and their wives were guests of honor at a dinner by Mrs. Mary Brown and the CHS homemaking girls.

class A Champion for 1976. The Wildcats ended a fine season by being presented a trophy as the No. 2 Class A team in Texas. Incidentally, there are 206 class A basketball teams in the state this year, with 4,367 boys participating. Presentation of the trophy was made by Dr. Lynn McCraw, professor of physical and health education and a member of the State Executive Commit-

This squad of Wildcats, by reaching the finals, accomplished what no other Crowell team in history had been able to accomplish.

In addition to being a fine team, the CHS boys were guided by excellent leadership in Coach Randall Ryan, who is in his second year

The Wildcots got into the finals the hard way--after an overtime hard-fought win over Coppell 82 to 74. Coppell had defeated Archer City in the regional tournament at Denton the same week end that Crowell had won over Seagraves at Lubbock. The game was close all the way and was 69-all at the end of regulation play. In the overtime period, Crowell outscored Coppell 13 to 5 to take the win. David Bell led the Crowell scoring with 25 points, Ricky Coleman had 24, Dee Finley 17. Melvin Westover 14, and

Marvin Coleman 2. In the final game, Crowell lost to a fine Broaddus team

with lots of height, speed and stamina. Broaddus is located east of Lufkin. It has a high school enrollment of 130 students and the school does not have football in its athletic program. Wheat and Barley Certifications

Producers that have any intention of proving their wheat or barley yields in the future should report their planted acres before May 1st. In order to prove yields we must have production records and planted acres for five consecutive years. If you do not report your wheat or barley planted acres this year, it would be 1983 before you could prove your yield.

**Final Grazing Date** The Texas State ASC committee has set March 29, 1976, as the final grazing date for wheat and barley in Foard County.

If you plan to graze any wheat off, these acres should be reported before March 20th, so they will not be counted against your disaster allotment.

Failed Wheat

Wheat that has been damaged by a natural disaster must be reported to this office and appraised before it is destroyed in order to be eligible for a disaster payment.

Cotton Transfers, Released, or Reapportionment

The final date for releasing or requesting reapportioned cotton allotments is May 1, 1976. The sale or lease of cotton allotments within Foard County must also be

completed by May 1st. If you are not planning to use your cotton allotment, releasing it to the county committee will protect the vield and history for one

**Allotment Notices** 

Last month we mailed the 1976 allotment and yield notices. Since then I have had quite a few complaints about wheat yields being cut. The wheat allotments and

yields are set for the nation at Washington, D. C., this office has no control over what allotment or yields individual farms receive.

# Handicapped Children Are Sought

The Texas Education Agency is beginning a statewide effort to locate and identify every handicapped child of school age not now in

State Board of Education Chairman Joe Kelly Butler of Houston announced the beginning of project "Child Find" at a Capitol news conference in Austin.

"Child Find," he said, "is designed to search out young people between the ages of 3. and 21 who are blind, deaf, handicapped, physically emotionally disturbed, or mentlally retarded, and those with learning disabilities."

The program will be implemented by education service centers in 20 regions throughout Texas, with the cooperation of the state's 1,121 independent school districts. In each region, door-to-door contacts will be made in one specific community served by a school district with an average daily attendance of approximately 3,000 stu-

Kelly said through the news media and through door-to-door canvasses. handicapped children not in school will be contacted, their families will receive counseling services, and the children will begin receiving the education they need.

# Gene Heatly Is Rotary Speaker

He spoke of Article 3 of the Constitution which deals with the nation's judicial system. It declares that there will be a Supreme Court and as many inferior courts as Congress may desire. At present there are 9 justices

on the Supreme Court and this number can be changed at any time by the Congress. He added there are 9 circuit courts of civil appeals across the country. 



For physical fitness, nutrition is as important in the middle and later years as it was when you were under 40. one or two, you'll feel better if well nourished.

A person needs fewer calories after age 40, but the need for vitamins, minerals and protein stays high throughout life. Choose adequate amounts of these nutrients from the basic four food groups each day.

The basic four groups include milk, meat, fruits and vegetables and breads and cereals.

Citrus fruits provide vitamin C. Select butter or margarine, eggs and dark green leafy vegetables for vitamn A. Include fruits, eggs, en-

riched breads and cereals as sources of iron. Make every dish you

prepare as tasty and attractive as possible. Use fruit and vegetable garnishes even though they take time to prepare.

Make a meal plan that's easy to follow. Such a plan helps the homemaker include all the necessary foods in daily meals.

With fewer to cook for, you may find it more economical to buy foods in smaller units than you once did. If half a giant box of cereal goes to waste, it's food money lost.

Consult cookbooks to know what ingredients to buy for making smaller amounts of food than before. For best nutrition, use

leftovers in creative ways. Toss strips of ham or chicken with greens to make an attractive chef's salad. Or combine meats with sauces, canned soups or vegetables to make new one-dish meals. Remember to reheat

leftover vegetables in the oven to have a delicious additon to your meal with less watching than when you reheat leftover on the range

The varn is imported from Pakistan and is distributed nationwide. One shipment of the yarn has a label which says "Tahki Imports, Ltd., imported from Pakistan." The other is sold by Creative Handweavers, Inc. of Los Angeles, Ca., and bears no

Consumers who own this yarn should seal the yarn or products made from it in an airtight double plastic bag and call Dr. Stapp for disposal instructions. Consumers should not attempt to sterilize the yarn, incinerate it, or throw it away because of the risk of further contamination.


