The animal is put on wheat pasture and receives no special care during the contest period. At the time of the show, the animal making the most net profit for its owner is named winner of the contest. Market price of steers on the day of the show is the basic priced used to determine the selling price.

In this year's show, Brian Whitman won first with a \$64.79 net profit on his animal. Jerry Ayers with a \$60.77 net profit, took second. Pat Norman with a \$57.72 net profit on his animal won third while William Bachman netted \$17.01 on his animal for fourth place. 

Texas Moves Up in Teacher Salaries

Texas has moved up this year from 35th to 24th place among the 50 states in average annual pay for public teachers, a national survey shows.

Average classroom teacher pay in Texas in 1975-76 is \$11,373, according to a survey of the National Education Association titled 'Estimates of School Statistics, 1975-76."

This still leaves Texas \$1,151 below the national teacher pay average of \$12,524, as quoted in the NEA report. These are preliminary estimates, based on figures supplied by the 50 state education agencies, including the Texas Education Agency. Revised estimates will be compiled after the end of the school

The revised figures for the preceding year showed Texas in 35th place among the 50 states with average annual teacher pay of \$9,807, which was \$1,843 below the national average of \$11,650 for 1974-75.



The vast scope of the federal bureaucracy is no more graphically illustrated than in the number of different federal agencies which send out mailings to weekly newspapers across the nation.


During the past 11 days, the Foard County News has received a total of 54 different letters and news releases from federal agencies or politicians in the nation's capitol.
