### SELECT CATTLE ON GROWTH PATTERNS

An animal scientist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station says to consider lifetime growth patterns for weight and other factors in beef cattle selection programs. Such measures as weight at weaning, post-weaning average daily gain and yearling weight are commonly used.

Since selection for weight at one age will affect weights at other ages, cattlemen should consider the lifetime growth pattern in deciding upon a specific selection program. Once the best growth patterns are identified, breeds should be chosen and combined, breeding stock selected, and the cattle managed to correspond to the optimal growth patterns.

Of local interest is the run-off in the race for sheriff, tax assessor-collector of Foard County which has Roy M. [Ace] Whitley and Larry Paul Glover as the candidates. These two men were high in a 3-man race for the office in the first primary.

Also on the ballot are the names of Jerry Sadler and Jon Newton, run-off candidates for railroad commissioner.

Carl Dally and W. T. Phillips are the candidates listed in the run off for judge, court of criminal appeals.

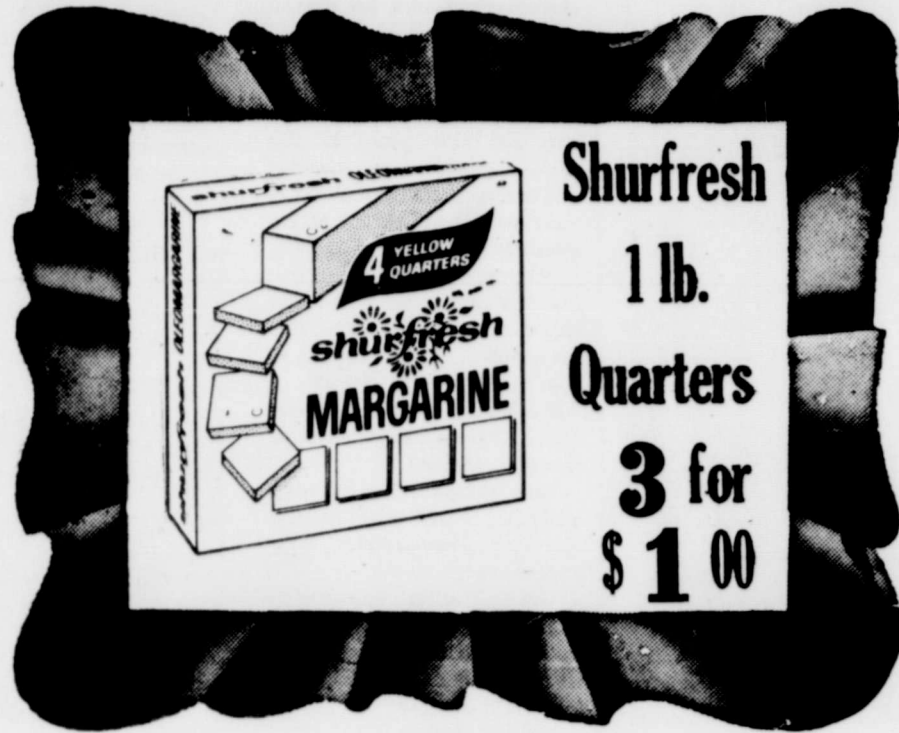

## 30 Years Ago in The News

News items below were taken from the Thursday, May 30, 1946, issue of The Foard County News:

Arrangements have been completed by The Foard County News for publishing a pictorial World War II Service Book for Foard County. It is planned to have the book include a picture of every service man and woman who served in the armed forces in World War II, and there will be no cost whatsoever for placing the picture in the book. This newspaper earnestly solicits a picture of every service man and woman.

### ASCS Issues Newsletter

James O. Sabbe, executive director of the Foard County ASCS, has issued the following newsletter for the month of June to Foard County land owners:

Wheat  
If you have any wheat that will not be harvested, I will need to look at it before it is plowed or grazed. You might be plowing up your disaster payment. If your wheat was damaged by the hail storm, but there is enough left to harvest, bring in your weight tickets within 15 days after harvest to see if you will qualify for a disaster payment.

Cotton  
All cotton producers will need to report their planted acres. These reports need to be accurate, so it would help if you would bring in some type of measurement (chains, feet, rows, etc.) of each field reported. If the total acreage in a field is planted in cotton, measurement would not be necessary.

New Cropland  
All new cropland that has been broken out in the last few years should be reported to this office. This land will be measured free of charge and plotted on our maps. This will help keep our maps up to date and help you when reporting your acreage.

ACP  
All conservation practices should be reported as soon as possible after completion. We have had quite a few inquiries about mesquite spraying. At this time, we are out of funds for this year. If we should have released or receive any additional funds, I will notify every eligible producer.

ECM  
September 1, 1976 is the final date for repairing conservation structures that were damaged by last summer's heavy rains. Be sure to report completion of the repairs so you will be eligible for payment.
