Sherman McBeath, a Foard County native who became a Liquor Control Board agent back in July 1957 after resigning as Foard County Sheriff, last week was named top man in that state agency. McBeath is the new administrator of the Alcoholic Beverage Commission, the successor to the old Liquor Control Board.

McBeath's climb in the department has been steady. After serving as an agent, he headed the regional office in Paris before moving to Austin to become assistant chief of enforcement. In 1974, he was named chief of enforcement for the department.

McBeath, son of Mrs. J. L. McBeath Sr. of Vernon and the late Mr. McBeath, graduated from Thalia High School in 1942. A veteran of Marine Corps service in World War II and the Korean war, McBeath was elected sheriff of Foard County two successive terms, but resigned in 1957 to go to work for the Liquor Control Board.

Sherman McBeath, a high school graduate, ex-Marine Corps sergeant and former sheriff, said he intends to bring "common sense" to enforcement of the state's complex and often contradictory liquor law. McBeath, 51, and a 19-year veteran

history. Robinson, a literal-minded attorney, was canned when virtually the entire liquor-selling industry - from the package stores to the saloons - wanted his scalp.

HIS PROBLEM was vigorous enforcement of laws already on the statute books - such as those prohibiting the sale of booze to drunks and banning the issuance of licenses to liquor outlets that aren't at least 51 per cent Texas-owned.

McBeath - pronounced like the Shakespearean tragic figure - doesn't anticipate problems like that.

"I am going to enforce the law, of course," he said. "But I will do it from a more common-sense approach. If anybody wants to judge how I will do my job, they only need to look at my past 19 years' performance. I have always enforced the law, and I will continue to do it in a fair and impartial manner. selling booze to a drunk?

Rash McBeath is not. He was born and raised in Foard County, near the Panhandle, and was graduated from Thalia High School in 1942. He was in the Marine Corps (mainly in the Pacific) from then until 1945, when he returned to the farm and ranch with his father. He was called back to service during the Korean War, but returned to Foard County as a deputy sheriff in 1951

McBeath was elected sheriff and then re-elected before, in July 1957, he

quit to become a Liquor Control Board agent. He served in regional offices in Wichita Falls, Amarillo and Paris before becoming assistant chief of enforcement and, in 1974, chief.

He was holding that job when he was approached by Alcoholic Beverage Commission members Tom Gordon of Abilene and Ed Harllee of San Antonio - separately - about the top administrator's job

"THE PONY EXPRESS"

On April 3, 1860, the first Pony Express relay rider left St. Joseph, Missouri, on the first leg of the 2,000 mile route to Sacramento, California. The entire trip took only 10 days and later trips were made in as few as eight days. Each rider rode 75 miles at a time, day or night, in all kinds of weather, making it possible to cover as many as 250 miles a day. The Pony Express became outmoded with the advent of the nation-wide system of the telegraph, and as a result was ended October 24, 1861. During its 19-month existence, the mail was lost only once. 

Education is the key **Most Farm and Ranch Accidents Can Be Prevented**

AUSTIN - One hundred eighty-three deaths and thousands of injuries occurred on tensive educational campaign Texas farms and ranches dur- will be carried out during that ing 1975 as a result of farm time by the Texas Safety accidents. Many people were crushed when their tractors overturned; others were caught in, or run over by, machinery; and, still more were victims of shocks, falls and fires.

"Most of these accidents could have been prevented, however," states Joe Smetana, vice president for the Farm and Ranch Section of the Texas Safety Association. 'Better training in the use of machinery, protective guards shielding dangerous moving parts, and more safety consciousness on the part of all rural workers can go a long way toward stopping these senseless deaths and injuries."

Because of the magnitude of the problem - over half a million agricultural deaths and injuries occurred last year nationwide - President Gerald Ford has declared July 25-31, National Farm Safety Week.

A special observance of this formation to farm people week in Texas also has been through literature and com-

Dolph Briscoe and an in-Association, Texas Farm Bureau, State Agricultural Extension Service, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers, and the Young Farmers of Texas.

The theme for Farm Safety Week is "Educate for Safety." "The families and coworkers of those who died in farm accidents learned a painful, but effective, lesson through their experience," said Smetana. "But we feel education based on the experiences and solutions of others can be an equally effective, yet faster and less costly, process.'

Safety education is everyone's responsibility. Parents should teach their children what is safe and unsafe and set good examples. Teachers should emphasize safety regularly in their vocational/agricultural courses. Community leaders should get in-

proclaimed by Governor munity services. And farmers and ranchers should train their workers - particularly in the handling of new equipment.

While safety cannot be legislated, the federal government has taken steps to help assure that farms and ranches are safe and healthful places to work by including them under the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA). The law outlines certain minimum standards which must be met by every farm employer who has one or more full or parttime employees. Members of a farmer's immediate family, however, are not regarded as employees and are not within the Act's coverage.

"Many farmers may not be aware that their operations come under governmental regulations;" Smetana explained, "so, as part of our education efforts, Texas Safety Association has produced a bulletin entitled 'Agriculture and OSHA' which answers many questions about the Act's provisions and enforcement. Copies are available from TSA, P.O. Box 9345, Austin, Texas 78766."

Is there any training required under the ROP Standard and Machine Guarding Standard?

As of June, 1975, employers must train every employee in safe tractor operation. This includes fastening seat belts on tractors with ROPS, proper operation in and around ditches, staying off very steep slopes, watching where they are going, smooth tractor operation and proper hitching and how to properly park a tractor. Extra riders are not allowed.

Both the ROPS and Machine Guarding Standard require employers to instruct employees at the time of initial assignment to operating equipment, and at least annually, in the safe operation and servicing of all equipment with which he will be involved.

What is the Pulpwood Logging Standard?


The Pulpwood Logging Standard applies to the harvest of pulpwood and covers environmental conditions, clothing and personal protective devices, first aid, hand tools, explosives, stationary and mobile equipment, machinery guards, mufflers, and guylines. Also included are instructions on logging, construction and maintenance of roads and bridges

What is the Temporary Labor Camp Standard?

The Temporary Labor Camp Standard covers enironmental aspects of housing such as site selection, building construction, space, ventilation, and heating. It also prescribes santitation requirements for cooking and eating space, water supply, laundry, bathing facilities oilets, refuse disposal, insect and rodent control. Can my farm be inspected?

Yes. A U.S. Department of Labor Compliance Officer may inspect any farm employing help at any reasonable hour. If he finds any alleged violations, he also may issue citations and set a specified time for the corrections to be made


ROTARY SPEAKER

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
