

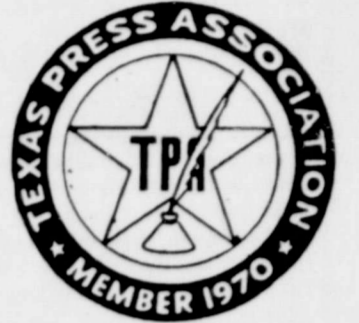

### SAYS USDA Meat Yield To Eclipse Top Volume

Farmers may produce a record-breaking volume of meat and other livestock products during the coming year, although the picture is clouded somewhat by the after effects of 1970 corn blight attacks. Agriculture Department economists say.

The forecast came in a publication updating earlier government reports on livestock numbers and the relationship between livestock and supplies of animal feeds.

The data showed that the number of "grain-consuming animal units" — a statistical method of summing up such varied species as cattle, sheep and chickens into standard units consuming fixed volumes of grain — rose 3 per cent in the year ending Sept. 30, 1970, to a new all-time record of 117.5 million units.

The year which began Oct. 1, experts added, could show a further increase in animal units

### Cattle, Hog Sales Dip

Receipts were below a year earlier for cattle and calves, and hogs but above for sheep and goats at the livestock auction markets inspected by the Texas Animal Health Commission, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Cattle and calves marketed through auctions during November numbered 623,000 head, 2 percent below a year ago and 12 percent below October.

Receipts at livestock auctions during November at 81,000 head were 17 percent above a year ago but 32 percent below a month ago.

### Lynn Co. Hospital Is Member Of THA

The Lynn County Hospital has just received notice that it has been accepted as an Active Institutional Member of the Texas Hospital Association, the activities and programs of which are directed specifically toward "better health for Texans."

The requirements for membership in the Association are that a hospital be registered by the American Hospital Association and that the doctors practicing there be members of, or eligible for membership, in their county medical society.

Being a member of the Texas Hospital Association is beneficial to an institution because it indicates to a community that its hospitals are qualified and ethical, and are meeting the high standards of good hospitalization. This adds prestige to an institution and creates confidence.

Membership affords opportunities for improvement of member hospitals by frequent contacts with other hospitals in the Association concerning procedures and practices. It also offers a means of joining with other Texas hospitals in any advancement of their interests.

Legal counsel in Austin is provided for member hospitals to watch any legislation that would affect hospitals, and makes legal advice on matters of legislative nature available to members of the Association through its council.

The Association sponsors such organizations as Group Hospital Service, Inc., and Group Medical and Surgical Service to furnish hospitalization for employed people at cost. It places statistical information on Texas hospitals at the disposal of its members through extensive studies and surveys. # SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

All livestock people have found themselves short on grazing this year. This is a result of several natural conditions, but mainly the dry weather. Adjustment of grazing and livestock number should have already been done and has been by most good managers in this risky business. Many people have begun to feed and small grains aren't growing much and don't look as if it will make much grazing this year.

If a man is feeding his livestock he should be sure he is not damaging his pre-annual grasses. Livestock that is being feed and has excess to

native pastures will still graze. They many damage the native grass to where they won't recover. If this happens, the grass will not come back to normal production. It will cost the owner many years of normal production to recover. The cattle will completely destroy desirable grass if they are confined to an area all the time. The answer to feeding and protecting your grass is to pen the livestock in a pen or limited grazing area so they damage as small of an area as possible. A balance in grazing is a part of a good conservation plan. All livestock men should have a grazing plan based on their forage inventory and be prepared to initiate a drought plan for extended dry weather when they can't carry out photosynthesis. We are in a drought. Maybe it will be a short one, but it may be a long one, so analysis your situation. We at the Soil Conservation Service will be glad to help analysis your livestock grazing plan.

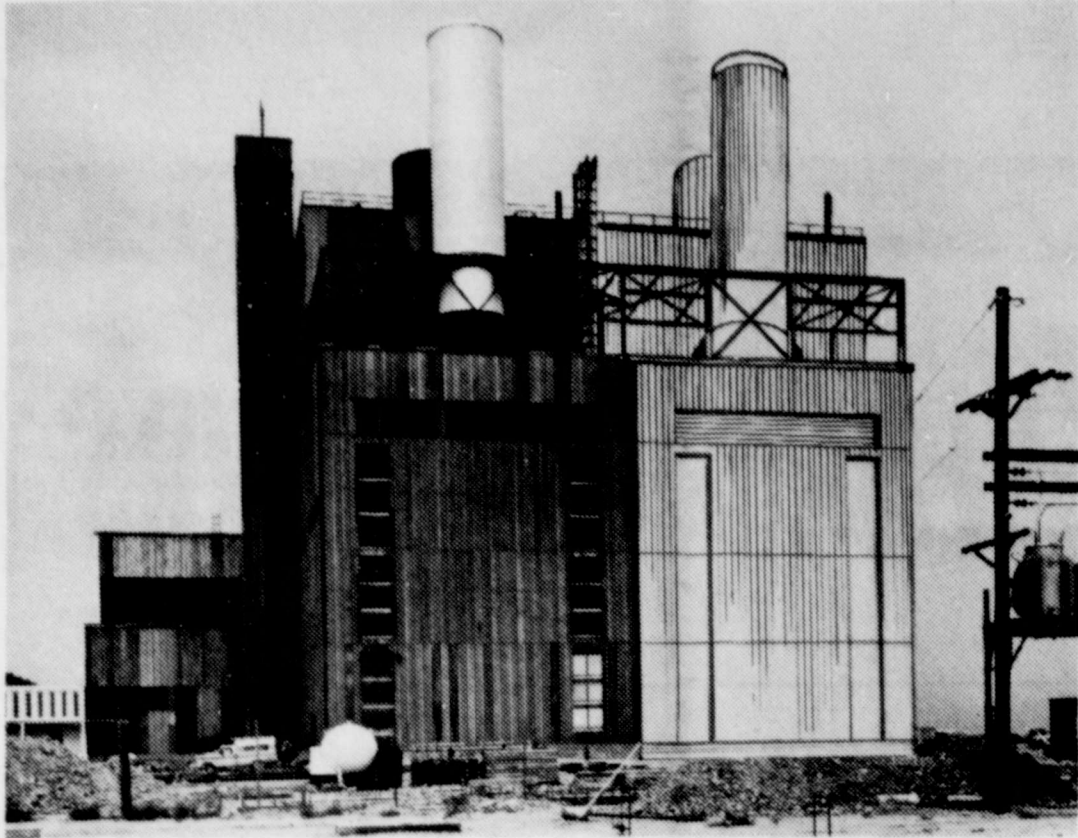

**NEW PLANT ...** More electric power for 1971 and 1974 is portrayed by this combination construction picture-artist's rendering of Southwestern Public Service Company's Jones Station, southeast of Lubbock. The left half of the picture shows recent construction of the 1971 addition which will add 256,000 kilowatts to Southwestern's generating capability in mid-year. That means we'll have 14 percent more electric power available next year than we had this year, when the region had a more than adequate supply. The 1974 addition, sketched in on the right, will double the capability of Jones Station and make it the largest of the company's 11 power plants. The 1971 plant addition is part of the electric company's Golden Anniversary Year construction program which calls for an investment of nearly \$20,000,000 for new plant and equipment throughout the company's 45,000 square mile service area.

## Southwestern Public Service Company Opens New Plant

A 14 percent addition to the area's electric generating capability in mid-1971 and plans for still another major power production unit in 1974 highlight a nearly 20 million dollar construction program for 1971, announced today by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

The addition to electric generating capability in mid-year will come about when the first unit goes into service at Jones Station, located southeast of Lubbock. The 256,000 kilowatt generator will be the largest single unit on the company's system and will put the company's total power producing

capability at nearly 2,000,000 kilowatts. That's more than twice what it was 10 years ago. Tolk also revealed plans for the second 256,000 kilowatt machine at the new facility. A twin of the one which will go into 1971 service, the new unit has been ordered from Westinghouse Corporation. Ground will be broken for the second unit in 1972.

"We don't propose to get into any bind insofar as adequate power supply to serve our customers is concerned. It takes longer to get electric generating equipment these days, so we've put our order in to adequately meet our requirements. We are noting an increase in number of customers throughout our service area, an indication that we are returning to a growth pattern, and we want to have the electric power supply that will stimulate that growth," Tolk said in making the plant expansion announcement.

Jones Station is named for Clifford B. Jones, president emeritus of Texas Tech University, and a director of Southwestern Public Service Company since 1945.

When the two units are in service, Jones Station alone could serve a city three times as large as Lubbock or Amarillo and it is just one of eleven generating facilities on Southwestern's interconnected system.

There has been no power shortage problem in Southwestern's service area. In 1970, for example, when some sections of the area were plagued with brownouts and voltage reductions, Southwestern's customers were able to continue to use electric power without restriction.

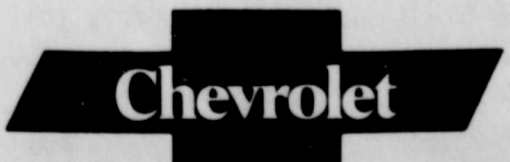



Says.....**

Soil testing is an important part of today's production agriculture. Maximum yields produced at the lowest per unit cost are a must to keep fertilization practices at a profitable level.

Now is the time to have soil tested to determine its capacity to supply the needed plant nutrients for top yields. It is also a good time to make arrangements for the fertilizer which will be needed when the test results are known.

If the soil test shows the soil is low in a given nutrient, fertilizer containing this element will be recommended to meet the expected yield requirement for the crop to be grown.

Low production means a higher per unit cost of production and a loss of potential profit while high yields have the opposite effect on production and profits.

Fertilizers for next year's crops can be applied when the land is being prepared; thus when planting time rolls around next spring, there'll be no delays and planting can proceed on schedule.

Detailed information on all phases of soil testing along with needed instructions, mailing cartons and record sheets are available at my office.

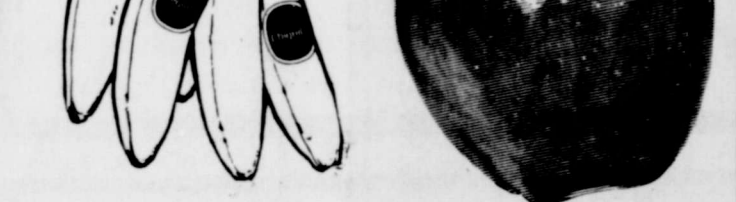
