# SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Richard Christie, SCS conservationist at Tahoka, said the leaflet "Mulches For Your Garden" has the best and most concise explanation of how to use mulches and compost in a garden that he has ever seen. "The leaflet explains how mulches cushion falling raindrops which reduces soil loss and soil compaction," Christie said. "Mulches keep soil cool in the summer, conserving moisture; they also furnish food for earthworms which are valuable for aerating the soil. Organic matter added by mulches help keep soil crumbly and easy to work." Richard L. Christie said some mulches are more valuable if composted before using. The new publication shows how to build a simple compost bin out of wire or boards and is complete with drawings and pictures. The leaflet lists the number of cupful of various kinds of fertilizer, wood ashes, or ectosom salts to add to a bushel of compost's plant nutrient value. Details are also given on how to make acid compost for use with azaleas and rhododendrons. "Proper handling of mulches is one of the most important but least understood soil water conservation measures used in Texas," Christie said. "All good conservation farmers leave the stalks and stems from their crops on the land to reduce erosion and conserve moisture. Few conservation measures do more to reduce pollution from blowing dust than mulching." Conservationist, Christie said gardeners could use the same principles in flower and vegetable gardens by utilizing mulches from grass clippings, tree leaves, straw, stems and stalks from harvested vegetables, and other material. ## Farm Bureau News

The Lynn County Farm Bureau will be informing the public as to the bills concerning our area that are being presented in Legislature now in Session in Austin.

For those who might be interested in writing our Representatives and Senators concerning these or any matter, the addresses are as follows: Senator H. J. "Doc" Blanchard, State Capitol, Austin, Texas 78711. Representative E. L. Short, State Capitol, Austin, Texas 78711. Bills that have been presented of interest are:

APPROPRIATIONS: H. B. 213 by Healy, an emergency appropriations bill providing emergency funds for the operation of state government for the balance of this biennium, was introduced in the House, referred to the Committee on Appropriations, a hearing held and reported favorably. H. B. 213 should come up for House consideration early next week. This bill included \$34.9 million for welfare, \$7.5 million for Texas Tech Medical School and \$6 million to the University of Texas Houston Medical School.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONTROL: H.B. 55 by Graves, a bill prohibiting the sale of DDT, except in cases of extreme emergencies as determined by the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, was introduced in the House and referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

TAXES -- H.B. 81 by Hannah and Bass of Van Zandt, a bill imposing a tax of two (2) cents per container on every disposable container used for the sale of soft drinks and alcoholic beverages within this state, was introduced in the House and referred to the Committee on Revenue and Taxation. One third of the revenue received from this tax shall go

to the state highway fund, one third allocated to incorporated cities and towns (based on population) and one third to the counties of this state (based on population).

H.B. 129 by Atwell and Wolff, a bill exempting from ad valorem taxation capital investments related to air and water quality control, was introduced in the House and referred to the Committee on Taxation and Revenue.

H. B. 108 by Clayton, a bill increasing the limited sales tax from 3/4 cents to 4 1/4 cents, depositing a portion of the one third the increase in the Sales Tax School Fund to be distributed quarterly to the school districts of the state based on scholastic population, was introduced in the House and referred to the Committee on Revenue and Taxation.

H.J.R. 1 by Mengden, a Constitutional amendment prohibiting the Legislature from taxing personal or corporate incomes without approval by a majority of the qualified electors of the state, was introduced in the House and referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

H.J.R. 10 by Atwell and Wolff, a Constitutional amendment providing a system that would exempt from ad valorem taxation capital investments related to air and water quality control, was introduced in the House and referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

TRANSPORTATION-- H.B. 61 by Dramberger and Lombardine, a bill requiring at least four (4) inches vertical clearance between the top of the trailer or truck bed when transporting sand, gravel, dirt or similar loose materials, was introduced and referred to the Committee on Motor Traffic.

H.B. 104 by Clayton, a bill providing for temporary thirty (30) day registration permit for trucks and trailers transporting farm products from place of production to market, storage or railhead, not to exceed seventy five (75) miles, was introduced and referred to the committee on Motor Traffic.

FOUR YEAR TERMS -- S.J.R. 1 by Creighton, a proposed amendment to the Constitution to provide for four (4) year terms of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and other state officers, was introduced in the Senate and referred to the Senate Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

SENATE MEMBERSHIP -- H.J.R. 19 by Jones, a proposed Constitutional Amendment providing for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, was introduced in the House and referred to the House Committee on Constitutional Amendments. The purpose of this amendment is to retain the rural senators that are now in office. Redistricting will eliminate one or more rural Senators if the number of members is not increased. The Texas Senate will be dominated by urban Senators regardless the number of members.

DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME - H.B. 237 by Doran, a bill providing that the question of "Daylight Saving Time" in Texas be placed on the ballot in the general election to be held in November, 1972, was introduced in the House of Representatives and referred to the House Committee on State Affairs. The vote for or against this proposition would be only an expression of public opinion. However, the outcome of the vote would certainly influence the decision of the Legislature in determining what to do about this particular issue.

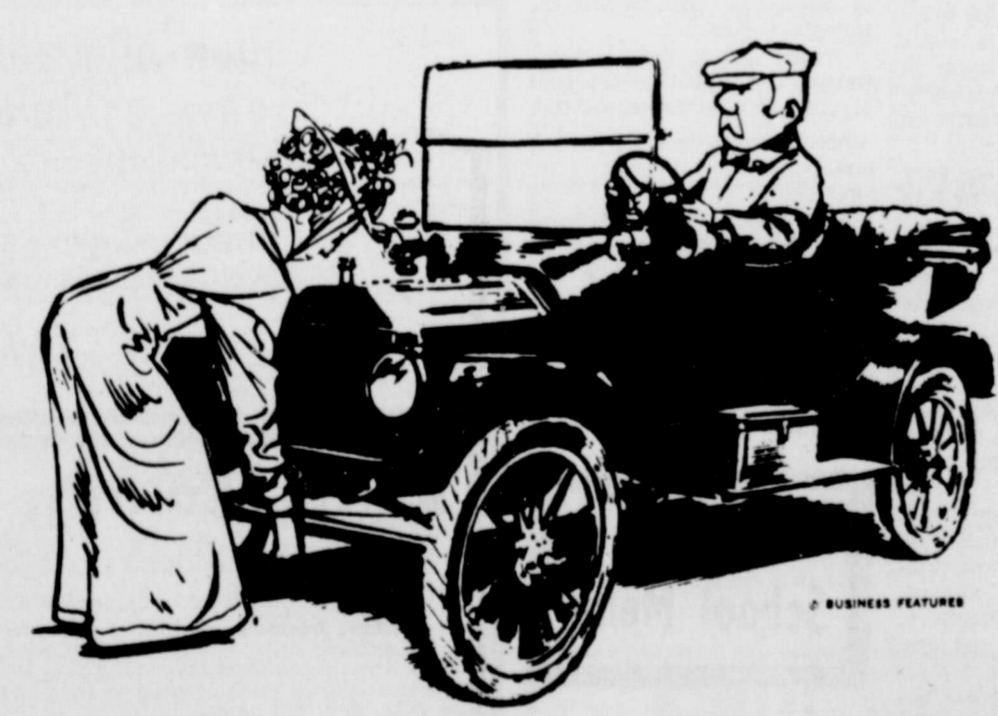
### Wilson Lions Club Will Have Annual Volleyball Tournament

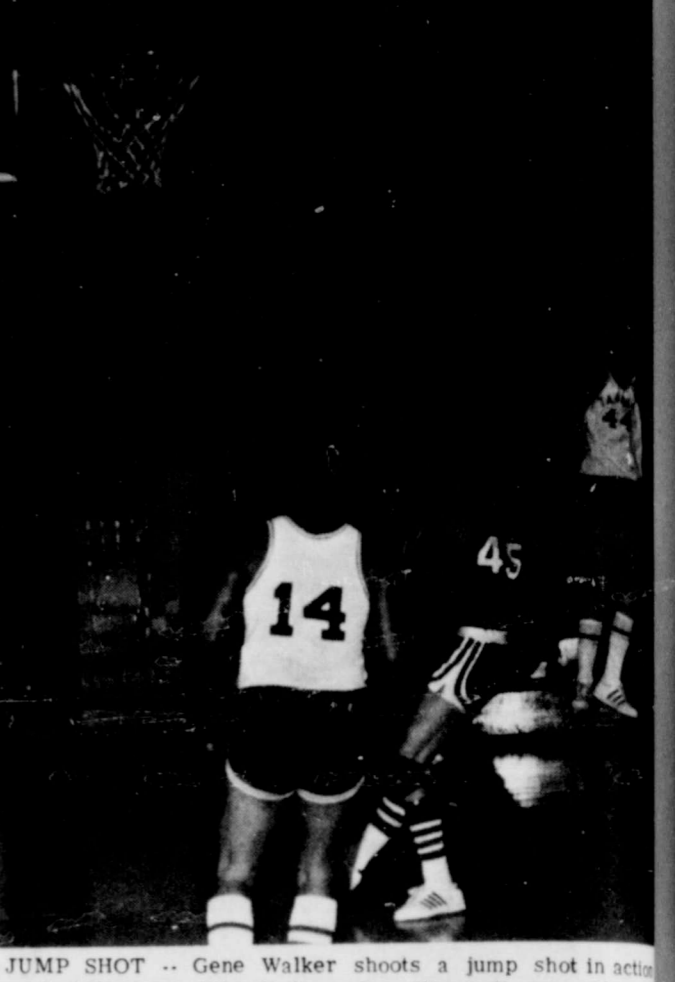

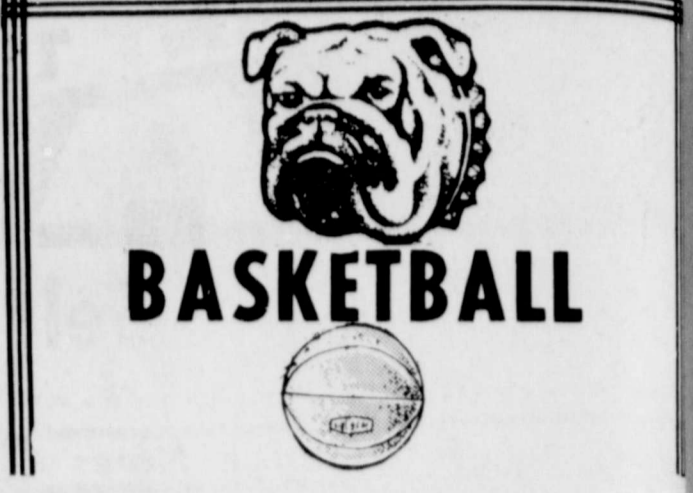

### Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Make ordinary dishes sparkle by adding an extra dish of just the right spice or herb. Spices and herbs not only add flavor, but also color and aroma to mild foods.

Spices are the roots, stems, bark, leaves, seeds, fruits or buds of aromatic plants. Normally, "Spice" means seeds and herbs which are either dried, whole, or ground.

Herbs are the leaves of plants. They may be fresh or dried, whole, ground, or crushed.

Effective use of spices and herbs is an art acquired through practice. Begin by experimenting with a few at a time.

Some spices and herbs seem to belong with certain foods. Sage is associated with pork dishes, dressings and stuffings. Basil is used for most vegetables, especially tomatoes. Chervil and parsley go well in salads, stews, and sauces. Cayenne and paprika are used in stuffed eggs, vegetables, and salad dressings. Dill suggests pickles, and mint is good with tea, ice cream, and candy.

To be sure your cooking has all the appetizing flavor you want, check the storage shelf occasionally. Certain spices and herbs may be down to mere tinctures; others may need replacing because they've been mistakenly stored near heat or in direct sunlight. Even with the most careful storage, spices and herbs, especially in ground form, lose their vitality after a time. That's the time to throw out and replace with a fresh and potent supply, the agent says.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK:  
Round Steak Dinner  
1 lb. round steak cut in bite size pieces  
1/2 lb. bacon or enough to cover bottom of pan  
2 carrots sliced  
3 potatoes, sliced thin salt and pepper to taste  
1 onion sliced  
Place bacon in pan. Cover with steak pieces. Season with salt and pepper. Layer carrots, potatoes, and onions on top of steak. Season. Add 1 cup water, cover and cook over low heat for one hour. Be sure lid fits tightly.
