He had the power, he had the know-how and the drive to illuminate any bill bearing the taint of suspicion. And he didn't. This could turn out to be the greatest mistake of his political life.

Waldrip Appointed To Naval Academy

President Nixon has appointed 17-year old Randall Wayne Waldrip, son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Waldrip, to the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland.

Randy has received and accepted one of the 100 appointments the President may offer each year to outstanding candidates throughout the United States and will be entering the Naval Academy this coming July.

The Bensalem High School senior of Bensalem Township, Cornwall Heights, Pennsylvania will take a distinguished record of achievements with him to the Naval Academy.

While living in San Miguel in the Philippine Islands, Randy played an instrumental part in the rescue of a fellow student hit by a car as he left a school bus. For his part in aiding the hurt student, he received a letter of commendation from Philippine school authorities.

During his sophomore year at George Dewey High School in Subic Bay, Philippines, Randy also received the Service and Scholarship awards, ranked first academically in his class and was voted class president. At that time he was also a valuable member of the varsity basketball and track teams.

At Bensalem High School, during his junior year, Randy was ranked first academically in his class of over 400 students. For the past two years he has consistently made the honor roll and has become a member of the National Honor Society.

Narrow-Row Cotton

Narrow-row cotton production at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1971 pointed to the importance of management skills necessary for profitable production.

In the first year of the narrow-row cotton variety test, Dr. Owen said two things became evident. "First, the management aspect of farming narrow-row cotton is more critical than regular row width production and, second, there is not yet well adapted variety available to farmers.

"And we cannot over stress the importance of management of cultural practices in narrow-row cotton production," Dr. Owen said.

The narrow-row cotton variety test was sponsored by companies with varieties in the test and a grant from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Dr. Owen said this test would be continued this year.

Dr. Owen pointed out that narrow-row cotton production means anything planted on less than 40-inch rows. Cotton in narrow-row tests at the Foundation was double-rowed 12 inches apart on 40-inch beds. Yields ranged from the top 386 pounds per acre to 197 pounds on varieties in the test. Low yields resulted from excessive fertilizer and moisture combined with unfavorable weather in August and September.

The high yielding performer was the Paymaster dwarf variety which should be available to farmers possibly in another year. Dr. Owen said. He stated there was no significant yield difference among varieties in the test. Top performers currently available to farmers included Paymaster

Nutrition Subject Of Lions Program

Nutrition and vitamins were the subject of a program presented to Tahoka Lions last Wednesday by Mrs. F. B. Hegi.

Mrs. Hegi outlined the importance of vitamin B and E as "heart health" vitamins. "Vitamin B is usually found in the foods we like least," reported Mrs. Hegi, "such as greens, asparagus, broccoli, liver."

Not much was known until recently about vitamin E. Long thought to be important in the reproductive cycle, vitamin E has now been accepted and proven as essential to good heart health. This vitamin is found in grains. Normally we would get vitamin E through bread and cereal, but today's grains are processed to the point where the essential vitamin is lost. Whole wheat bread contains it. Also wheat germ.

Maid Spins Good Cotton Yarn

Not only does 1972 Maid of Cotton Debbie Wright speak up for cotton as the natural fiber, but she also spins a good yarn about the research going on in the industry.

Neither of these points comes as a surprise, however, because the job is a natural for the 22-year old Texas Tech graduate. She grew up on a cotton farm at Tahoka on the South Plains of Texas, where a large portion of the nation's cotton crop is harvested.

Debbie's cotton-farming dad, Bryan Wright, instilled in her a fierce loyalty to the natural fiber that provided their livelihood. She says she has been buying her clothes on the basis of cotton content for a long time, and it was usually okay with her father to bring home anything of cotton. "If it

bring it home." In the interest of ecology, consumers — and particularly those who make up the youth market — are buying more cotton items. The search is for the natural. "Cotton is the ideal natural fiber," Debbie says. "It's fresher and crisper and it has the real clean look I like. It even looks clean in a pair of blue jeans."

A blue-eyed blond, Debbie was a dean's list scholar as a home economics major at Texas Tech and plans to do graduate work in nutrition therapy when her tour as cotton's first lady ends. Her interest in nutrition has been heightened greatly by the new possibilities of cottonseed as a food source.

"Most people associate cotton with fashion," she says, "and, of course, it's the No. 1 use. But it's also interesting to see the new research going on

in the labs today to develop new, high-protein foods from cottonseed.

"Nutrition has been one of my interests for a long time. One of my friends worked with cottonseed when she was doing nutrition research, and these products — cookies and breads, mostly — really taste pretty good."

"Now they're talking about putting cottonseed concentrate in soft drinks so that three of them would give kids their daily protein requirement."

Another exciting phase of cotton research, according to Debbie, deals with new developments in durable press and non-flammable cottons. "For example, experiments with radiation are being done to change the fiber at the molecular level for no-iron fabrics without chemical finishes."

Like any daughter of a cotton producer, Debbie is often asked if she has picked cotton. The answer is a polite "no." Cotton on the Wright farm — like that on 95 percent of the nation's cotton farms — now is machine harvested.

"When I was small, I did go out and pull some to see if I was good enough to keep up with the workers," Debbie says. "I lasted about five min-

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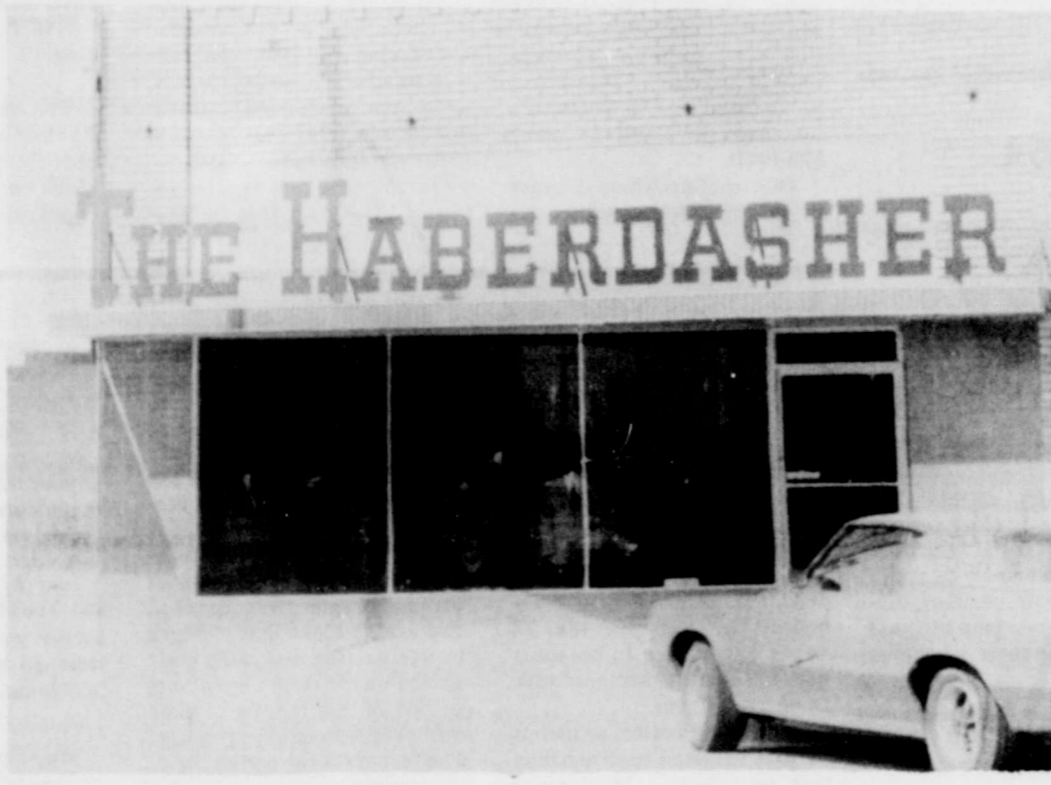

Contesting the Contest

"Decisions of the judges shall be final."

So said Rule Number Seven in the dot-counting contest sponsored by a neighborhood store. But when the judges rejected Myrtle's entry on grounds of neatness, she took the matter to court.

"Their announcement didn't say a word about neatness," she complained. "Not even the judges can make decisions that are outside the rules of the contest."

The court agreed with Myrtle, and her entry went on to victory.

Contests create a legal contract between the sponsoring company and the contestants. Accordingly, the basic principles of contract law will apply. Once the terms of the agreement are fixed, neither side can arbitrarily make changes.

However, if the contest judges keep within the limits of the original contract, they generally do have broad discretion.

In another case, contestants were supposed to deposit their entries in person at the showroom of a local automobile dealer. One contestant, disqualified by the judges for having mailed in his entry, insisted that this was too flimsy a reason for him to be barred.

But this time, the judges' ruling was upheld in court. The court said they had acted within the reasonable scope of their authority.

What about a rule against participation by company employees and their families? Again, the specific wording is crucial. In one case, the father of a company salesman submitted an entry in a football pool contest.

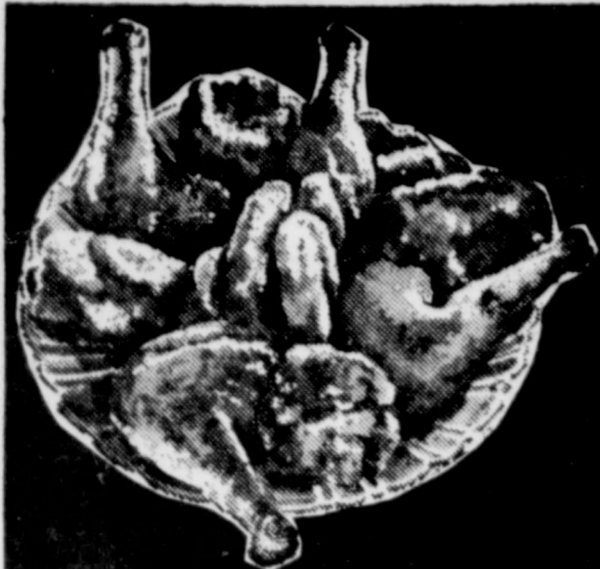
According to the rules, "no employee or member of his immediate family" could compete. Was the father a member of his son's "immediate family"?

In a court hearing, he pointed out that the son lived in his own home, on his own income, with his own wife and children. The court concluded there was enough separateness between the two men to leave the father eligible.

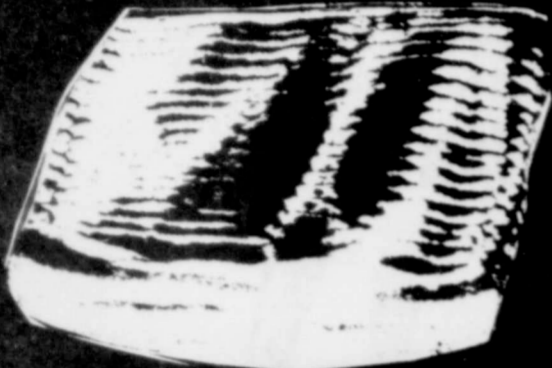

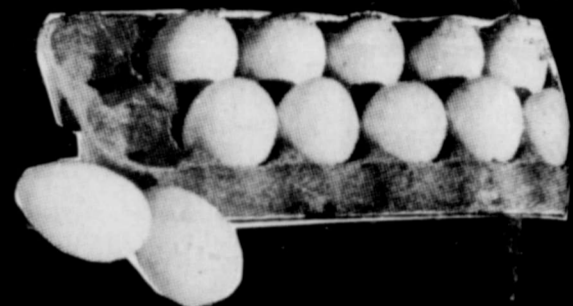
