Crop harvest has been delayed this week by several severe sandstorms, but minimum damage to unharvested cotton was reported.

Another bumper crop is being harvested in Lynn County this year, and prices for both cotton and milo are the highest on record. Grade, staple and mike are all excellent as a general rule.

Gins are snowed under with possibly the biggest backlog of unginned cotton on the gin yards ever seen here. Most farmers have all their trailers filled, and many are ricking cotton in the fields. Almost all the milo has already been harvested, and some farmers are through harvesting

One source estimated to The News that 40 percent of the cotton has been pulled, and 30plus percent ginned.

Farmers hope for some more fair weather, followed by rain and snow. The ground is very dry due to no rainfall of any consequence, and much moisture will be needed later this winter and next spring.

Due to high prices this year, bank deposits are already at an all-time high and going higher every day.

3 Accidents **During October**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of October, according to Sergeant H.E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1973 shows a total of 41 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 22 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1973, shows a total of 664 aecidents resulting in 31 persons killed and 377 persons injured as compared to October, 1972, with 605 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 280 persons injured. This was 59 more accidents, 11 more fatalities, and 97 more injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 31 traffic deaths for the month of October, 1973, occurred in the following counties: Moore, Lubbock, Wichita, Wise, three each; Dallam, Hale, Jack, Lamb, two each; Carson, Castro, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Oldham. Randall, Wheeler, Bailey, Clay, Knox, one each.

O'DONNELL PAIR DIE IN CRASH

A grinding traffic accident involving two mobil house trailers took the lives of an O'Donnell couple and injured a Midland man about midafternoon Tuesday.

The accident occurred about two miles northwest of Wall on U.S. 87 near San Angelo.

Killed in the accident was Mrs. V.B. Hohn of O'Donnell. Her husband was taken to Shannon hospital in San Angelo where he died about two hours later.

Injured was William C. Hammett of Midland. He was treated and released at Shannon Hospital.

According to witnesses, Hammett was driving a pickup pulling a trailer when he pulled off onto a shoulder to allow another car to pass. When he tried to go back onto the highway, a gust of wind apparently caught the trailer and it went out of control.

The Hammett pickup and trailer then were in collision with a station wagon and trailer driven by Hohn.

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
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
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BILL GRIFFIN SAYS



With cooler weather and longer hair coats on cattle, Lynn County cattle producers can expect increasing problems with lice, particularly on animals that have not been treated for other parasites during the summer.

Only low numbers of cattle lice survive the summer. However, during the winter and fall, lice multiply rapidly and often cause intense irritation and unthrifti-

Some types of cattle lice suck blood while others feed on skin

scales and hair. Cattle should be treated now while the weather is still mild and before significant damage occurs to infested cattle.

Cattle lice can be effectively controlled with a number of approved insecticides applied as sprays, dips or pour-on treatments, information on these materials is available from the County Extension Office.

The agent further cautions that any selected material for livestock use be applied in strict accordance with the product label to avoid personal or animal injury or the creation of illegal residues in meat or milk.

Harvest Passes 500,000 Bale Mark

The South Plains cotton harvest passed the 500,000 bale mark during the past week and is nearing peak activity, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock.

Sample receipts at the four South Plains classing offices have reached a seasonal high of approximately 40,000 daily.

The U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland classed samples from 214,000 bales during the week ending Friday, Nov. 23. This brought the total classed this season to 572,000.

Estimates indicate that approximately one-third of this season's crop is now out of the fields.

At this date last year only 126,000 samples of the 1972 crop had been classed.

Quality of cotton continued excellent and is considerably higher than last year.

Grades 31 and 41 continued to be the predominant grades at Lub. bock, making up 78 percent of all classed. Grade 31 made up 30 percent, Grade 41, 48 percent and Grade 32, 10 percent.

Staples were predominantly 30 to 32. Fifty-six percent had staple lengths of 30 and shorter and the remaining 44 percent stapled 31 and longer. Average staple length was 30.6-32nds of an inch.

Micronaire readings continued excellent. Eighty-six percent of all cotton tested at Lubbock had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, 8 percent was in the high micronaire range of 5.0 to 5.2 and 2 percent was in the very high range of 5.3 and above.

The Agricultural Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A. reported increased trading on the Lubbock market. Prices were steady from the previous week and averaged 34 cents per pound over the loan. Most lots were selling in the price range of 50 to 60 cents per pound.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 premium micronaire range were: Grade 31, Staple 30- 49.65 cents per pound, Grade 31, Staple 31-53.40, Grade 31, Staple 32-57.40, Grade 41, Staple 30-48.70, Grade 41, Staple 31-52.25, and Grade 41, Staple 32-55.95.

Cottonseed prices were steady and farmers received \$96 to \$110 per ton. Average price was \$101.50 per ton.

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

ASCS To Assist In Fuel Allocation

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and the Texas Railroad Commission have joined hands in an effort to increase efficiency in the handling of the mandatory allocation of middle distillate fuels. An agreement between the state and federal agencies should speed up the program.

Beginning immediately, ASCS County Office personnel will verify fuel needs for hardship cases on Form OOG-PAP-20 for all applications prior to their submission to the State Allocation Officer (Texas Railroad Commission.)

Previously, it was planned that needed verification would be obtained after the form was submitted to the Austin office. Form OOG-PAP-20 is to be used by wholesale purchasers to request emergency allocations for immediate use. The form has been supplied to ASCS County Offices throughout the State and was made available to County Clerks' of-



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

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

Many parents keep nutritious snack foods in the refrigerator for after-school snacks and evening raids. And every day of the week, they serve good, wellbalanced meals.

Parents should tell their youngsters about food, guide them and then try to put food selection responsible for choosing good

nutritious foods for better living. Most parents have hopes and dreams for their children--and the children they work with. They

want them to have inner-confidence, a sense of purpose, success at school and work, meaningful relationships with others, and most of all, happiness.

Behavioral scientists contend if a child has high self-esteem, his chances of attaining his--and his parents'--hopes and dreams are much better.

According to research conducted by Stanley Coppersmith, University of California, most successful men and women have an attitude called self-esteem. Some define self-esteem as how a person really feels about himselfhow much he likes or respects himself.

High self-esteem is one of the most crucial ingredients of mental health. Therefore, helping children build high self-esteem is a key to successful parent-

A child builds his identity from words and actions directed to him.

Words have power- - when a child is told by a parent that he's bad, he believes it. If he lives with constant negative comments, he may develop a dim view of himself.

Adults often use words to convey judgement--such as messy, rude, mean, good and nice. Such judgements can put a child on the defense and encourage him to tune you out.

There are ways of reacting to a situation rather than simply judging it. For example, encourage the child--or help him a

A child who lives with a reactor rather than a judge will understand he's loved even though some of his behavior isn't acceptable.

A healthy child sees himself as separate from his acts. If he's to have self-esteem, a child must have a sense of personal value independent as his behavior. RECIPE OF THE WEEK:

Chicken - Asparagus Casserole 1 (10 oz.) can condensed cream of mushroom soup

one-third cup milk dash nutmeg

1 cup diced cooked or canned chicken 1 (14½ oz.) can asparagus

spears, drained 1/2 cup crushed corn chips)

Combine soup and milk. Mix in nutmeg and chicken. Pour into a 11/2 quart casserole. Top with asparagus, attractively arranged. Sprinkle with corn chips. Heat in moderate oven, (375 degrees) 15-20 minutes. Makes 4 servings.





A SHORT REPORT

Requests for information concerning emergency gasoline, propane, and diesel fuels have been tremendous the past few days.

I have been in constant contact with Congressman Mahon and its office in feeding them information on the many different fuel shows tage situations and I am happy to report that Congressman Mahon has been able to accomplish and answer many of these requests.

The supplier or fuel dealer should go immediately to the local ASC office and they will help fill out the proper forms to secure emergency supplies of fuel. Please note, the farmers or consumer should not make application with anyone except his dealer.

On Friday, November 16, the Office of Petroleum Allocation, Department of Interior in Washington, released the following three priority categories. This is only for sixty days and hopefully we can get this extended if an emergency still exists atter that time.

1. For the operation of prime movers and or units necessary for the exploration, production, refining and distribution of tossil fuels which includes petroleum, natural gas and coal.

2. For the operation of modiand fixed farm and ranch equipment as well as for the planting, growth and harvesting of crops and-or livestock.

 For the operation of Public Mass Transit Systems.

At this time I am trying to find out from the Oil and Gas Division in Houston and the Teras Railroad Commission, who will be processing the forms, just how long it will take for the dealer to be notified of his emergency allocation and I will be contacting all dealers as soon as we have this information.

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



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
