First hard freeze of the fall season occurred Wednesday morning when the temperature here dropped to 29 degrees, the latest killing freeze since 1962, when the first freeze came on December 1.

Annual 4-H Bake Show To Be Held

The Annual Lynn County 4-H Show will be held Saturday, December 8, in the Lynter Room, Tahoka. The Bake Show has been held for many years as one way to instill an interest in Food and Nutrition. A 4-H'er is eligible to enter the show if they are carrying a Food and Nutrition project. There will be three divisions: elementary grades 4-5; Junior grades 6-7; and Senior grades 8-12. One product per individual may be entered in one of the classes - bread, cake, pie or candy. A plaque will be awarded to the winner of each division. 3 Accidents During October

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of October, according to Sergeant H.E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1973 shows a total of 41 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 22 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1973, shows a total of 664 accidents resulting in 31 persons killed and 377 persons injured as compared to October, 1972, with 605 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 280 persons injured. This was 59 more accidents, 11 more fatalities, and 97 more injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 31 traffic deaths for the month of October, 1973, occurred in the following counties: Moore, Lubbock, Wichita, Wise, three each; Dallam, Hale, Jack, Lamb, two each; Carson, Castro, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Oldham, Randall, Wheeler, Bailey, Clay, Knox, one each.

O'DONNELL PAIR DIE IN CRASH

A grinding traffic accident involving two mobile home trailers took the lives of an O'Donnell couple and injured a Midland man about mid-afternoon Tuesday.

The accident occurred about two miles northwest of Wall on U.S. 87 near San Angelo.

Killed in the accident was Mrs. V.B. Hohn of O'Donnell. Her husband was taken to Shannon hospital in San Angelo where he died about two hours later.

Injured was William C. Hammett of Midland. He was treated and released at Shannon Hospital.

According to witnesses, Hammett was driving a pickup pulling a trailer when he pulled off onto a shoulder to allow another car to pass. When he tried to go back onto the highway, a gust of wind apparently caught the trailer and it went out of control.

The Hammett pickup and trailer then were in collision with a station wagon and trailer driven by Hohn.

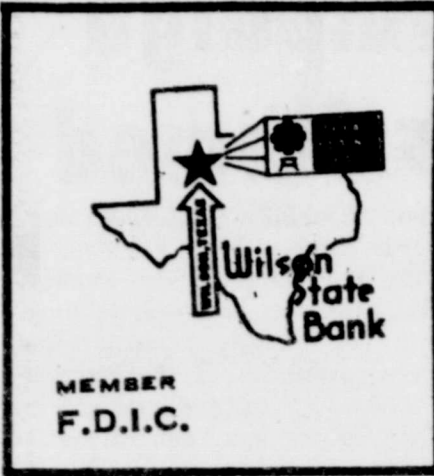

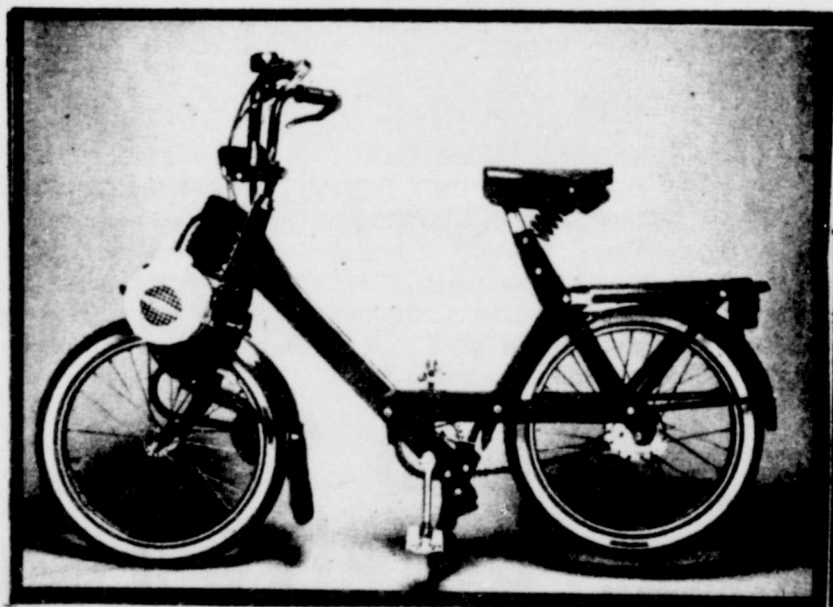

Christmas Mailing Advice Given By Postal Service

The time is rapidly drawing near for mailing all those thousands of Christmas gift packages to far away destinations. Local department stores and U.S. Postal Service Friday area residents tips on how to mail their packages to insure safe destinations intact.

A booklet, entitled "How to Pack and Wrap Parcels for Mailing," the U.S. Postal Service says, lists three types of loads recognized for mailing.

The first type, easy, should include items of moderate density and completely fill the container, or items in inner containers that will completely fill the outer mailing container.

The average load contains moderately concentrated items packed directly into a shipping container, or may be packed in an intermediate stage, such as in smaller containers.

The third load, difficult, contains items which have a high degree of protection and must be packed to prevent puncture, shock or distortion.

The gifts should be packed in padded cardboard boxes, according to the postal service stores' recommendations. Residents do not have a box that fits, these types of boxes may be cut to fit the gift.

If the box does not have a top, boxes may be fitted, one on the other, to make a strong package.

The box should be adequately padded to contain the gift and provide enough extra space for cushioning material, such as bubble plastics, corrugated fiberboard, polystyrene, excelsior and shredded newspapers.

Cushioning material should prevent the item's movement to an outside surface of the package, and, if several items are packed in one container, they should be cushioned with material to protect them from each other and outside pressure on the package. If several gifts are packed together, they also should be wrapped separately in packing material to prevent breakage or damage.

After the gifts are packed in the container, the package should be closed and reinforced. The Postal Service suggests using gummed and pressure sensitive tapes, adhesives, twine and string.

Pressure sensitive, filament reinforced tape or reinforced paper tape is recommended as the best type to use for sealing the package for mailing.

For mailing packages that make sure enough tape is applied to hold the box from opening under pressure and to seal ends and corners from damage.

For complete assurance the package will not open under pressure, it is recommended that a strong cord be used also. One or two loops around the length and width of the box, with knots at each intersection.

For address packages, the Postal Service recommends printing the name and

complete address of the recipient, including the zip code, and the sender's name and complete return address. It also is recommended that the addresses be printed inside the package, so that it may be delivered even if the address on the outside is damaged.

Special markings, such as

fragile, perishable, or do not bend, should be placed in an area below the postage and above the name of the addressee.

Further information about parcel mailing may be obtained from parcel post window clerks, dock foremen, and mailing requirements personnel.

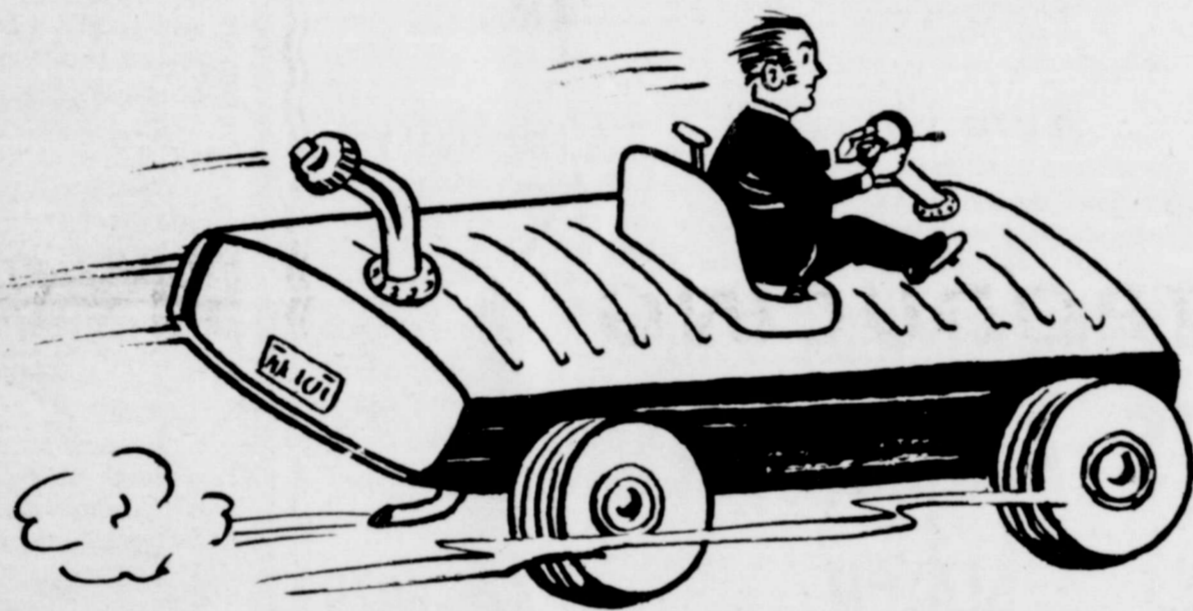

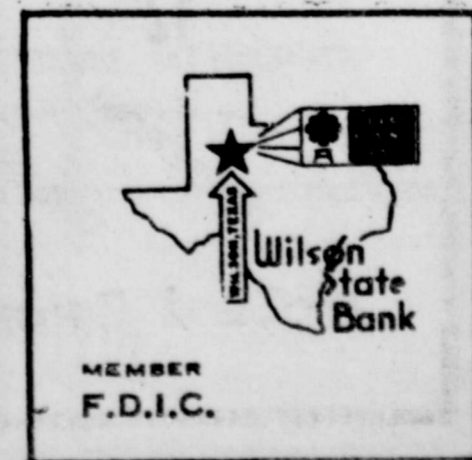
TAHOKA HIGH HAPPENINGS

ASCS To Assist In Fuel Allocation

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and the Texas Railroad Commission have joined hands in an effort to increase efficiency in the handling of the mandatory allocation of middle distillate fuels. An agreement between the state and federal agencies should speed up the program.

Beginning immediately, ASCS County Office personnel will verify fuel needs for hardship cases on Form OOG-PAP-20 for all applications prior to their submission to the State Allocation Officer (Texas Railroad Commission.)

Previously, it was planned that needed verification would be obtained after the form was submitted to the Austin office. Form OOG-PAP-20 is to be used by wholesale purchasers to request emergency allocations for immediate use. The form has been supplied to ASCS County Offices throughout the State and was made available to County Clerks' offices.

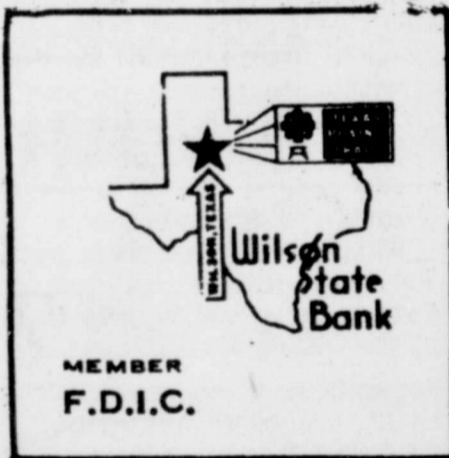

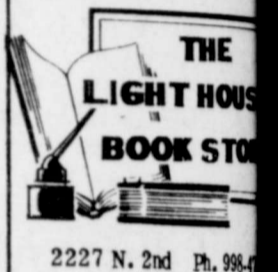
Rites Held For Mrs. Coffee

Carolyn Haley Says . . .

Many parents keep nutritious snack foods in the refrigerator for after-school snacks and evening raids. And every day of the week, they serve good, well-balanced meals.

Parents should tell their youngsters about food, guide them and then try to put food selection responsible for choosing good nutritious foods for better living.

Most parents have hopes and dreams for their children--and the children they work with. They

want them to have inner-confidence, a sense of purpose, success at school and work, meaningful relationships with others, and most of all, happiness.

Behavioral scientists contend if a child has high self-esteem, his chances of attaining his--and his parents'--hopes and dreams are much better.

According to research conducted by Stanley Coppersmith, University of California, most successful men and women have an attitude called self-esteem. Some define self-esteem as how a person really feels about himself--how much he likes or respects himself.

High self-esteem is one of the most crucial ingredients of mental health. Therefore, helping children build high self-esteem is a key to successful parenthood.

A child builds his identity from words and actions directed to him.

Words have power--when a child is told by a parent that he's bad, he believes it. If he lives with constant negative comments, he may develop a dim view of himself.

Adults often use words to convey judgement--such as messy,

rude, mean, good and nice. Such judgements can put a child on the defense and encourage him to tune you out.

There are ways of reacting to a situation rather than simply judging it. For example, encourage the child--or help him a bit.

A child who lives with a reactor rather than a judge will understand he's loved even though some of his behavior isn't acceptable.

A healthy child sees himself as separate from his acts. If he's to have self-esteem, a child must have a sense of personal value independent as his behavior.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK:

Chicken - Asparagus Casserole
 1 (10 oz.) can condensed cream of mushroom soup
 one-third cup milk
 dash nutmeg
 1 cup diced cooked or canned chicken
 1 (14 1/2 oz.) can asparagus spears, drained
 1/2 cup crushed corn chips)

Combine soup and milk. Mix in nutmeg and chicken. Pour into a 1 1/2 quart casserole. Top with asparagus, attractively arranged. Sprinkle with corn chips. Heat in moderate oven, (375 degrees) 15-20 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

Variations: Substitute diced cooked ham for the chicken. Use buttered bread crumbs for the corn chips.

A SHORT REPORT

Requests for information concerning emergency gasoline, propane, and diesel fuels have been tremendous the past few days.

I have been in constant contact with Congressman Mahon and his office in feeding them information on the many different fuel shortage situations and I am happy to report that Congressman Mahon has been able to accomplish and answer many of these requests.

The supplier or fuel dealer should go immediately to the local ASC office and they will help fill out the proper forms to secure emergency supplies of fuel. Please note, the farmers or consumer should not make application with anyone except his dealer.

On Friday, November 16, the Office of Petroleum Allocation, Department of Interior in Washington, released the following three priority categories. This is only for sixty days and hopefully we can get this extended if an emergency still exists after that time.

1. For the operation of prime movers and/or units necessary for the exploration, production, refining and distribution of fossil fuels which includes petroleum, natural gas and coal.

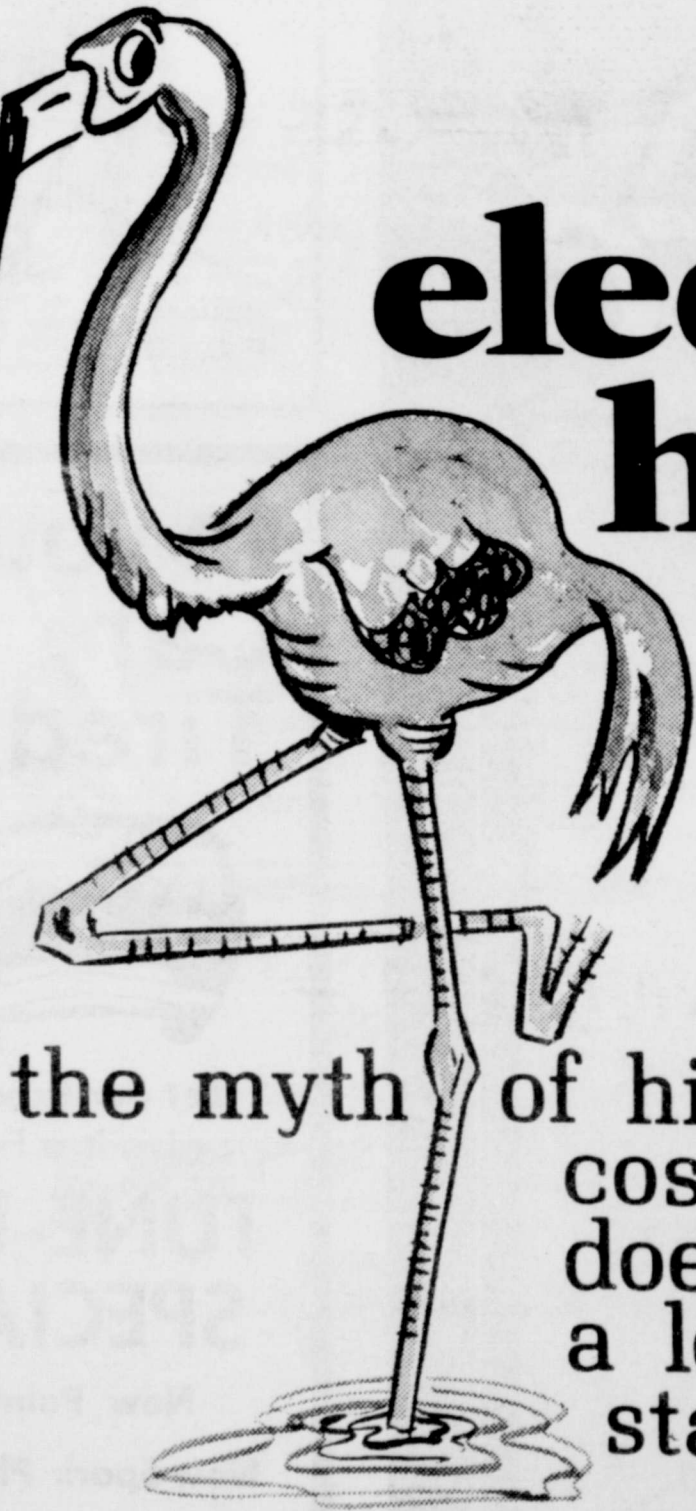
2. For the operation of mobile and fixed farm and ranch equipment as well as for the planting, growth and harvesting of crops and/or livestock.

3. For the operation of Public Mass Transit Systems.

At this time I am trying to find out from the Oil and Gas Division in Houston and the Texas Railroad Commission, who will be processing the forms, just how long it will take for the dealer to be notified of his emergency allocation and I will be contacting all dealers as soon as we have this information.



In the girls game, Tahoka won

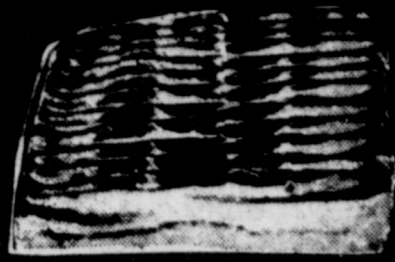
