From their fathers, children eed and want protection--from oth external and internal forces. lowever, deciding how much proection is enough--or too much-lagues many parents. So, many ook for a sensible middle ourse--somewhere between exreme strictness and great lenincy.

Besides protection from exernal forces, a child looks to is father for protection against is own impulses. For example, youngster engaged in minor rongdoing may declare, almost ith satisfaction, "Gee, I'll catch when my dad finds out." But eep within, the child probably eels that "Dad will make me top, even if I can't stop myself." f there's no one to make him top, then responsibility for his ction may become overwhelning .. or he may lose altogether is slow gains in conscience nade through the years.

Heavy-handed authority may defeat its purpose. Being a 'pal' isn't the answer either. Instead in the so-called 'middle-course' a father can be friendly with his children-without being a pal. As such, he can talk with them in

bank



father-son or father-daughter fashion, admit his limitation--even ignorance on some matters--and still remain essentially a father.

Children also like hearing about the times "Daddy" did foolish things as a boy. Knowing he was a mischievous boy who grew up to be responsible gives them a hope they can do the same.

In this "middle course" relationship, the father is a person who is somewhat stronger, wiser and better able to control himself--or a situation--than another boy or girl.

This doesn't mean a father must stand on dignity--or that he can't take a little teasing or wholeheartedly enter children's play at times.

A father doesn't have to be a perfect example 24 hours a day, every day. Nor should he set unattainably high standards of behavior for his children.

Realistic standards that can be reached by normally forgetful, harum-scarum boys and girls-without excessive pressure--are much more healthful.

Turning to extreme strictness, a stern father whose rules can't be questioned--and whose every word sends the family running to please him--faces two disadvantages.

First, if completely successful in teaching thorough going obedience, his children may look for an absolute authority all through life--to tell him what to do in every instance. As a result, the may develop independence of thought and action-or self-respect.

Or these children could grow up being against everything .- re-

belling completely against authority in any form.

On the other side of the coin, men who have only "pal relationships" with their children actually may destroy all essence of fatherliness.

Children want and need leadership--not competition--from their fathers, and if he's their equal, he's probably their rival, too.







During the last half of May, some 24,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician in Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas.

This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the state of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning produc-

Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry -- agriculture.
