## Truett Smith Appointed To Bar's Screening Process

The Texas Supreme Court has appointed Truett Smith of Tahoka as a member of a State Bar of Texas committee to aid the Bar's screening process in reviewing applicants for admission to the Bar.

He is charged with certifying the eligibility and qualifications of applicants for admission to the Bar as part of a new Supreme Court system of assuring that all lawyers meet character and fitness guidelines.

## Farm Bureau News

Farmers and ranchers in Lynn County are promoting a unique gift idea for Christmas -- gift certificates redeemable in meat, poultry and dairy products.

Charlie Beckham of Tahoka, Texas president of the Lynn County Farm Bureau which is coordinating the effort in this county, says that the idea is for people to give these foodstuffs instead of for example, a bottle of perfume, tie or after shave lotion.

"Not that we're knocking these gift ideas," Charlie said, "we just believe that a gift of food -- especially these commodities that are in over supply at this time -- will not only benefit the recipient but also help the hard-hit producers of these products."

The idea is for people to go to their favorite grocery store and buy a gift certificate redeemable in these foodstuffs in any amount they wish, the farm leader said.

"Some larger chains have their own gift certificates," he said, "and these are useable in our promotion. We are furnishing these stores with a colorful message insert that tactfully suggests which products to buy."

Mr. Beckham said that other

stores participating in the promotion are being furnished gift certificates along with colorful gift envelopes.

He added that people who prefer to give checks or money orders can obtain gift envelopes and message inserts which explain the idea behind the gift. These are available free of charge at the county Farm Bureau office at 1651 Ave. J in Tahoka, Texas.

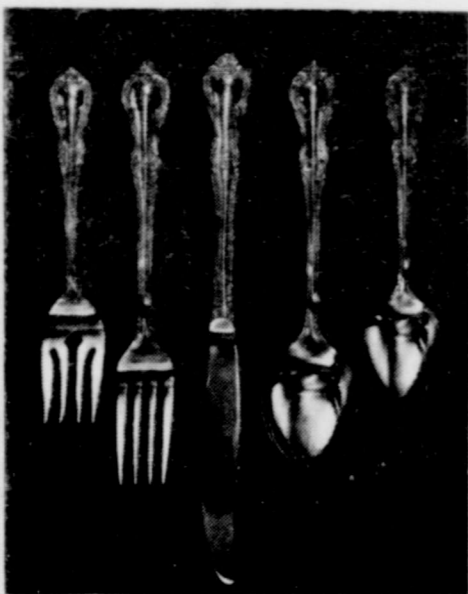

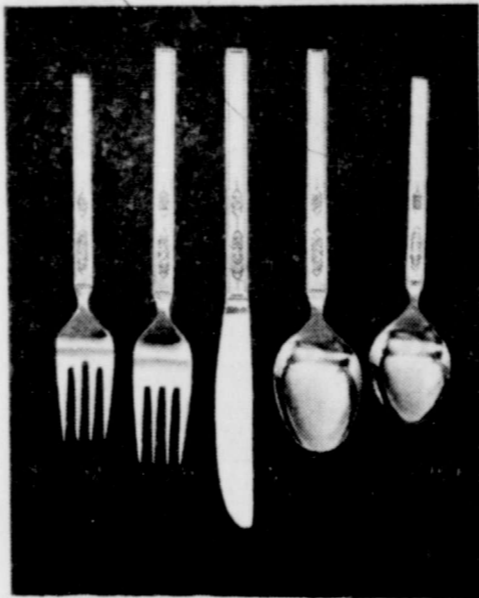

**Harvest Passed Half Way Point**

The High Plains cotton harvest passed the half way point during the first week in December, according to Paul R. Dickson in charge of the USDA's Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock. "Curiously enough," he added, "the half way mark was the first week in De-

ember last year."

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa, and Leveland classed 206,000 samples during the week ending Friday, December 6. This brought the season's total to 342,000. On this same date last year the total was 1,181,000.

At Lubbock predominant grades this week were 41 and 51. Grade 41 accounted for 28 percent while grade 51 was assigned to 27 percent of these samples. Twenty-four percent of the cotton samples were reduced one grade because of bark, the same as the previous week.

The predominant staples were 31 and 32. Staple 31 amounted to 29 percent and staple 32 amounted to 29 percent and staple 32 was 28 percent of the samples this week.

Micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9 accounted for 27 percent of the samples. This compares to 36 percent the week before. Micronaire readings below 3.5 accounted for the other 73 percent this week.

Pressley Strength tests averaged 82,000 pounds per square inch.

Prices quoted by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange for the most pre-

dominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Grade 41, Staple 31 - 34.45, Staple 32 - 35.15 cents per pound. For Grade 51, Staple 31 - 32.05, Staple 32 - 32.60 cents per pound. Mixed lots of cotton brought 29.00 to 35.50 cents per pound.

Prices paid to farmers for their cottonseed ranged from \$120 to \$140 per ton.

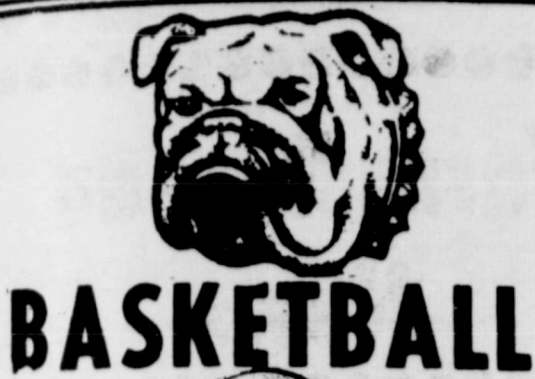

Tuesday, December 3, the Bulldogs won a thriller over the strong Lorenzo Hornets, coming from behind late in the fourth quarter to win 78-75. Leading the Bulldogs scoring was Tommy Botkin with 22, Dodson 17, Raindl 13, and Bailey 11. The Bulldogs hit 39 percent from the field. In rebounding it was Raindl 14, Bailey 11, Dodson 10, and Glenn 4, Graves 3. The Bulldogs Press created 23 turnovers on December 5-7. Tahoka played in the Hub of the Plains Tournament at New Home, coming away with the second place trophy. In the game played Thurs-

### Carolyn Haley Says...

What will I tell my child about Santa Claus? This is a familiar problem for many parents during the holiday season. The secret is to take clues from the child. Ask yourselves "What does the child want to know--what does the child understand?"

Up until about two years of age children have little understanding

of Christmas activities. The name Santa doesn't have much meaning to the young child. A common reaction to seeing Santa is one of fear -- the fat man with the wooly beard in the red suit is a stranger to him and may be threatening his world..

But by two years of age, the child is more conscious of Santa. He's

really more interested in presents and what he is going to get for Christmas though. Parents should be careful not to frighten the child by forcing him to see and talk to Santa.

The three year old shows a little more interest in Santa Claus and knows it's Santa that brings the toys. Christmas is a time

of excitement for him, but he doesn't yet understand the ledgers or basis for the holiday season.

But by four years of age, children are interested in all the details of Christmas, even though they still get confused about what is happening and why.

Santa is very real to the five to six year old. Christmas is a time of wonderment and excitement. Maybe the child is interested in writing a letter to Santa, or perhaps visiting him. He might want to leave Santa a late snack under the tree.

The child is also learning that Christmas means giving as well as receiving gifts. This is a good time to let the youngster help family members make, wrap, and deliver gifts to loved ones.

Much of the child's attitude about Santa Claus will be influenced by the feelings and actions of his parents and other family members.

Even past the age of believing that Santa is a real person, the spirit of Santa lives on as family members feel and express their love and concern for one another.

Having trouble deciding what to get your children for Christmas? Give fewer things and more of yourself during the holidays.

### Bond Sales 86% of Goal

United States Savings Bond sales in Lynn County totaled \$2,947 during the month of October. Sales for the ten-month period were \$111,326 which represents 86 percent of the 1974 sales goal for the county, according to County Board Chairman F. B. Hegi.

October sales in Texas totaled \$21,154,479 compared to sales of \$16,634,914 during the same period of 1973 -- an increase of 26 percent. Total sales for the January - October 1974 period were \$195,016,443, representing 82 percent of the \$236.8 million goal for the year.

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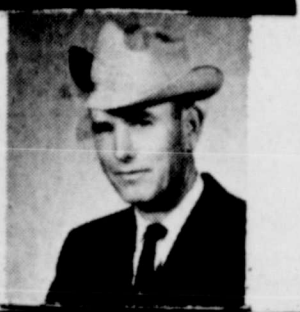

NITRATE POISONING: Nitrate poisoning is a noninfectious disease condition which affects consuming certain forage either in the fresh or dry state. Nitrate poisoning is often associated with wheat pasture poisoning (grass tetany) and acute cyanosis. The symptoms for the three conditions are similar and each result in sudden death. Differentiation between or among the most important since cause prevention is different for each condition.

rate of conversion of nitrite to ammonia. Consequently, when higher than normal amounts of nitrate are consumed, an accumulation of nitrite may occur in the rumen. Nitrite will then be absorbed into the bloodstream and will cause hemoglobin to be converted to methemoglobin, which is unable to transport oxygen. Thus, when an animal dies from nitrate poisoning it is due to asphyxiation.

The occurrence of nitrate poisoning is difficult to predict because of the development of this is influenced by various circumstances. These include the rapid change of nitrite levels in plants and the wide range in the quantity of nitrate which cattle can tolerate under various conditions.

NITRATE LEVELS IN PLANTS: The growth of a plant is dependent upon several factors. These include available nitrate in the soil and the plant's genetic ability to grow. The faster a particular type of plant can absorb nitrate, the greater is its potential for growth. In the process of breeding, and selecting plants for increased production, an automatic selection occurs toward the ability to accumulate large amounts of nitrate.

A wide variety of plants can be affected by nitrate accumulation. These plants may be categorized as field crops, and weeds. Texas field crops capable of high levels of nitrate accumulation under adverse conditions include corn, small grains, sudan, and fescue.

Dickson, in charge of Lubbock Office, invited persons interested in this service to inform him of their needs, as well as to want this service to reflect needs of the public."
