Norvell 'Booger' Redwine Named To Texas Ranger Hall Of Fame

Norvell "Booger" Redwine, Sheriff of Lynn County, was inducted into the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame. The honor to this effect was conferred on Mr. Redwine by the Texas Ranger Association in Ft. Worth, Texas on March 11, 1976. Mr. Redwine was Sheriff of Lynn County from 1961 to 1976. He is a member of the Texas Rangers and is a member of the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame. Mr. Redwine was a patrolman for 4 years before being promoted to Sheriff.

Our local Sheriff worked on several big cases as a Texas Ranger, but most would remember such cases as the Hunt murder case and the Morton bank robbery. According to Sheriff Redwine, "Law enforcement

has changed considerably since I began in 1936." He stated that in Tahoka there was a bell that was rung or a red light that flashed when an officer had a call. There were no car radios at that time.

Mr. Redwine is married to the former Lennie Finch, a school teacher in the Tahoka School System. The Redwines live 2 miles east of Tahoka.

City Is Placing New Trash Containers

New Trustees Administered Oath of Office

The Tahoka I.S.D. Board of Education met in regular session Thursday, April 8, 1976. The regular meeting was preceded by a dinner honoring retiring Board members Dayton Parker and Roy Stephens and new Board members Bob Haney and J.D. House.

The regular meeting was called to order by President Kenneth Turner at 7:30 p.m. Minutes from the regular monthly meeting of March 11, 1976, were read and

The results of the Board election on April 3, 1976, were approved and the oath of office was administered for newly elected members, Bob Haney and J.D. House by Board Secretary, Mrs. Mary Brecheen.

The Board for the next year was organized with Kenneth Turner elected President, Othell Meeks, Vice President and Mrs. Mary Brecheen, Secretary.

Instructional budgets for Tahoka Junior-Senior High, North Elementary, Tubb Elementary, Athletic Department and the Band were approved for 1976-77. In

addition, the low bid of \$151.82 for 80 new band uniforms was accepted from Sol Frank Uniforms of San Antonio.

Tentative plans were adopted to consolidate the current seven bus routes into five routes for 1976-77. These routes will be operated the last four to five weeks of school on a trial basis.

Mrs. Janie Pickett, a recent graduate of Texas Tech, was appointed to teach Spanish and English in the High School. Patricia Hammonds and Milton Edwards were appointed to serve as substitute teachers.

The time of the regular monthly meetings was changed from 7:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. The regular monthly reports were heard and there being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Board Adopts Finance Plan For 1976-77

The School Finance Bill passed by the State Legislature has placed a greater amount of responsibility for financing public education upon local school districts. The Tahoka Independent School District will be required to increase the amount of local effort by \$70,747 for 1976-77.

Faced with a maintenance tax rate ceiling of \$1.50 per \$100 of assessed value, the Board can not raise the required \$70,747 without drastically reducing services now being offered for the students attending Tahoka Schools.

The Board in special session, faced with this difficult financial situation, decided that the best interest of the students of Tahoka Independent School District would be served by increasing the assessment ratio of real and personal property now rendered for taxation in Tahoka Independent School District.

\$26,739 Grant for SPCA

Congressman Omar Burlison announced the approval of a \$26,739 community services grant to the South Plains Community Action Association Inc., with headquarters at Levelland.

The grant is effective April 1, 1976 and will run for 3 months. The areas served are Garza, Lynn, Anton, Terry, Yoakum, Cochran, Morton and Lamb counties. The funds will be used for the administration of the central staff facilities and equipment, collection of information planning program development and evaluation of Community Action Association activities.

All three Amarillo Rotary clubs are co-hosting the conference which will headquarter at the Hilton Inn in Amarillo.

"To Dignify the Human Being" is the theme of the conference; Rotarian L.S. "Skip" Kreidler of Tulsa will deliver the keynote address. Other speakers include incoming district governor John Tyler, Midland; the RI President's Special Representative William Murphy, Paris; and Ernest D. Upham, RI World Fellowship Activities Chairman, Columbia.

Amarillo Rotarian Dr. Jim Cook, responsible for the opening "fun day" events has organized the first "Rotary Olympics" competition. Golf, bowling, handball, bridge, tennis and a marathon run are included; winners will be decorated with bronze medallions in a three-tiered awards ceremony Friday evening, April 23. An Amarillo advertising executive, Rotarian Ken Parker, designed the special medallions.

Wives of the Rotarians from the 45 cities in the northwest Texas district will tour the new Discovery Center in Amarillo, which boasts the largest domed screen of any planetarium in a 400 mile radius. They will also attend a fashion show, and will view a special art show featuring works by West Texas State University and Amarillo College students.

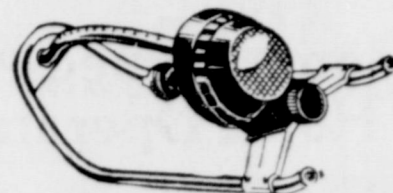

Baptism? What Sayeth The Scriptures? (Part 1)

Religious people have many different opinions about baptism. Let us see what the Scriptures say about this vital subject.

Is BAPTISM IMMERSION, SPRINKLING, OR POURING? The word "baptism" in the Greek text is "baptizo". It means immerse, plunge, or submerge. There are different words in the Greek New Testament for sprinkling (Rhantizo) and pouring (Cheo). Neither of these two words were used by the inspired writers when commanding baptism. Now let the Scriptures define baptism.

"And it came to pass in those days that Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee, and was baptized of John IN THE JORDAN". (Mark 1:9)

"And John also was baptized in Aenon near to Salim, BECAUSE there was so MUCH WATER there". (John 2:23)

"And he commanded the chariot to stand still; and they WENT DOWN both INTO the water; both Philip and the Eunuch; and he baptized him. And when they were COME UP OUT OF THE WATER the Spirit of the Lord caught away Philip". (Acts 8:38, 39) "Therefore we are BURIED with him by baptism". (Romans 6:4)

"BURIED with him in baptism." (Colossians 2:12) Is it acceptable to baptize some way other than the Bible way of Immersion? "One Lord, one Faith, one BAPTISM". (Eph. 4:5)

"Whoever speaks, let him speak, as it were the utterance of God;" (1 Peter 4:11)

"But Peter and the Apostles answered and said "we must obey god rather than men". (Acts 5:29) MORE TO FOLLOW.

Cardboard chewing cattle may become more common during the next few years. Researchers say cellulose in cardboard provides a much better diet for cattle than newsprint materials which were experimented with for several years. Giving the new product the title, "Rumose", promoters are pushing for acceptance of treated corrugated boxes as a viable feed supplement in the feedlot for commercial feeders. Developers advocate grinding or pelleting of the boxes, then mixing with whey (waste material from cheese making) or other materials to make the boxes more palatable. One of the key researchers for this project is Dr. John Campbell of the University of Missouri. Dr. Campbell says the process of manufacturing the boxes may increase their digestibility which "approaches or even exceeds the digestibility of common forages". For cattle, "box" lunch may take on a whole new meaning.

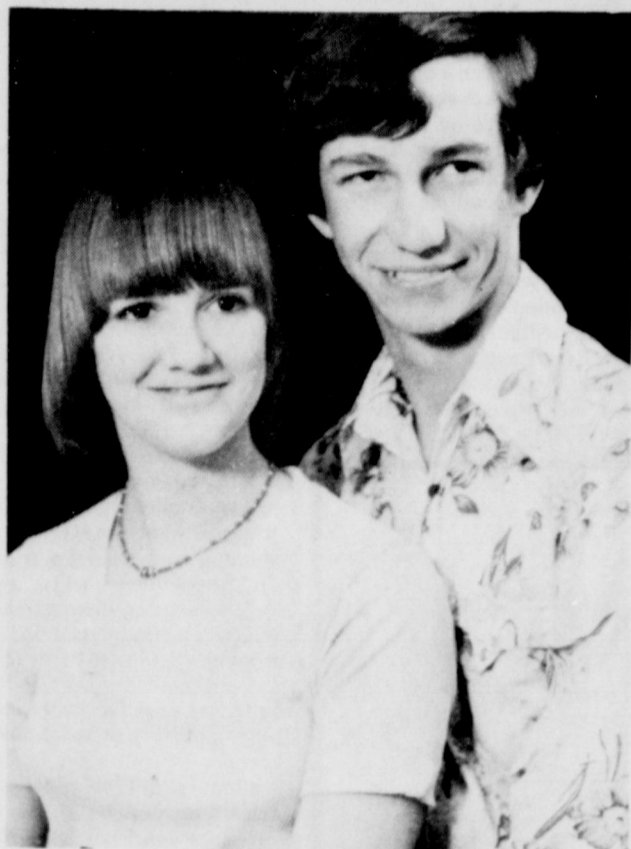

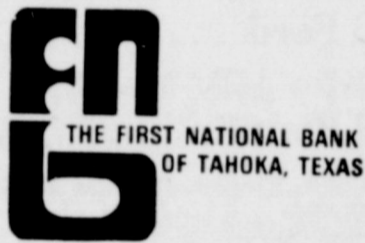

Try this recipe:
Frozen Strawberry Cream
4 cups sour cream
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
2 pts. strawberries
Up to 1 month ahead:
In 13 x 9 inch baking pan, stir sour cream, sugar and lemon juice until mixed.

In covered blender container, with blender at medium speed, blend strawberries, about one-third at a time until pureed; stir into sour-cream mixture, mixing well. Cover pan with plastic wrap or foil and freeze until almost firm, about 2 hours.

Spoon mixture into chilled, large bowl; with mixer at medium speed, beat until mixture is smooth. Return mixture to pan. Cover, label and freeze until mixture is firm. Makes about 4 pts., or 12 servings.
