Wilson School Track Results

District 6-B Meet was held April 21 at Sundown, Texas. Wilson High School Varsity placed 6th overall. The places were as follows:

Richard Cedillo was 6th in the 100 yard dash with a time of 11.4. Mark Brieger was 1st in discus with 116'9". Mark also placed 3rd in shot put with 42'7/2". Carlton Henderson was 2nd in the broad jump with 19'4". Greg Bednarz tied for 3rd with a leap of 5'6" in the high jump. Greg placed 4th in pole vault with 11'0". 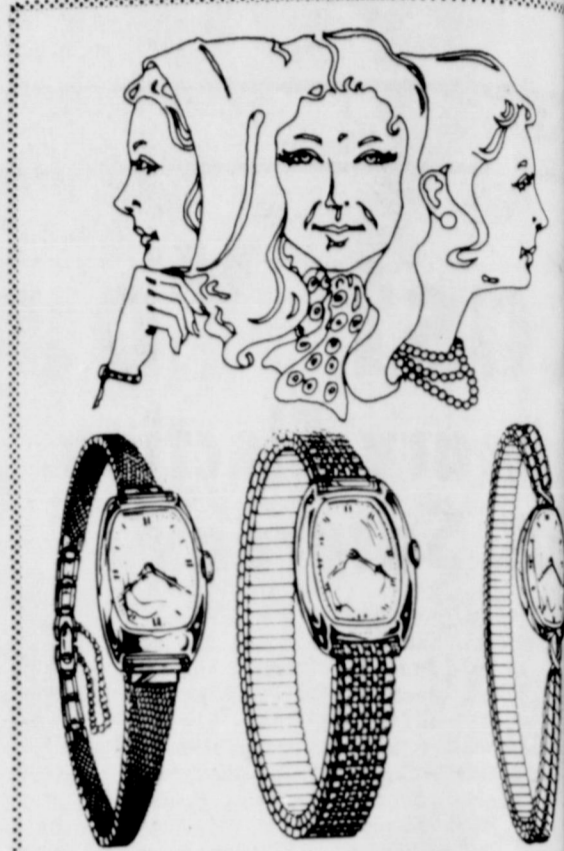

Letter to Editor

About 500 years before Christ was born the man who founded the religion of Buddhism died. I do not know his age. I do know he traveled extensively in India, preaching and converting the people to his way of life, until today, Buddhism is one of the world's ten great religions. Look in any good encyclopedia and you will be able to learn more than I can tell you in this condensed caption.

The Buddhist worshippers like to go to the tombs of their great scholars and pay homage to them. Japan has a huge Bronze statue of Buddha and to the Japanese it is very sacred. Groups of Buddhists go visit these tombs and Dalai Lamas. Buddhism was introduced into Tibet in the seventh century. There are several sects of Buddhism. One of these sects or if you had rather say divisions believe that a great Buddhist scholar transported his spirit at the time of his death to a huge ape or gorilla high in the Himalayan mountains. He, in turn, mated with a huge female monkey and this is where the Tibetan people started from. They claim to have artifacts found in caves of the mountains to prove this theory. Also, I have been told there is only one sect of Buddhist that permit their Lamas to marry.

For several hundred years the Buddhist of India, Tibet and several other small countries have had what they call the Dalai Lama as the titular head of their religion. Buddhist religion is not India's only religion, not even its largest, only second in numbers.

The present Dalai Lama the 14th was born in Tibet, June 6, 1935. The difference in calendar names of years make it very difficult for anyone who does not understand Tibetan to compare dates. I am not one who understands, so I must rely on research.

On the thirteenth day of the tenth month of the Earth-Hare year (1939) his head was shaved and Tenzin Gyatso became the 14th Dalai Lama. It is quite a story as to how this four year old was found. Come by if you would like to know. This much, though, the Buddhist believe him to be a re-incarnation of the 13th Dalai Lama. And I suppose he is worshipped by his followers as such. Through this re-incarnation it is believed the "Lord Buddha" has come on down to this day, and that he will live on and on... At the age of 15 years the government of Tibet was turned over the 14th Dalai-Lama. That was about the time or just before the People Republic of China sent its troops into Tibet and began to take the country under their rule.

I have contact with one man who is a close personal friend of the present Dalai-Lama, whose home is in Mussoorie, India. The Dalai-Lama's brother, who warned him of what the Chinese were going to do, had to flee Tibet and come to the United States where he presently lives. This resulted in the Dalai-Lama having to disguise himself and flee to India where he still is. Before he left Tibet

he and his friends organized the provisional government of Tibet, which, I assume, he still heads. He lives in India today as a religious refugee and is supported in part by the Indian Government and in part by the Tibetan Buddhists who have been lucky enough to get out of Tibet and get jobs in other countries.

For centuries the Tibetans were able to fight off the Chinese because of the great distances involved. Now with the advent of the cargo carrying airplane, China can keep her troops supplied, and, I am afraid, Tibet is lost to its people forever. Read Exodus 20:1-5. Just one more reason why I am not a Buddhist.

In commenting on the balance of the pool marketing year which will conclude on September 30, Unfred said the Association is in good position to capitalize on any market upturn.

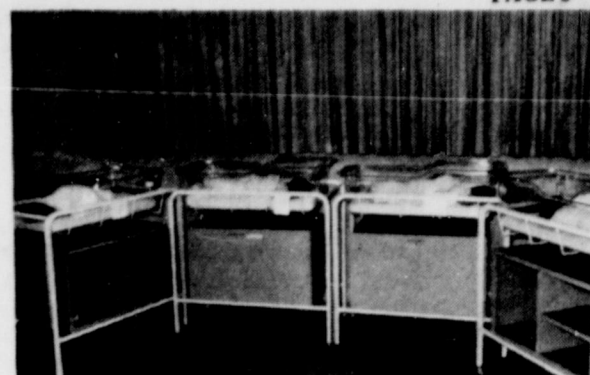

SWPS Station Is Nearing Completion

Southwestern Public Service Company's new Harrington Station northeast of Amarillo is nearing completion, and it will be the first SPS generating plant to use coal as its primary fuel.

The coal that will be used in the plant is low-sulphur western coal mined and brought in by unit train from Gillette, Wyoming. The trains have about 110 cars designed and built specifically to haul coal. Each unit train brings about 10,000 tons of coal to the plant on a twice-a-week schedule.

Southwestern's system chemistry laboratory has recently been enlarged and expanded to provide a complete facility for analyzing and testing coal.

The lab, located at the Nichols Station plant one mile south of the new Harrington Station, takes coal samples for testing and analyzing from two different sources.

The first source is at the mine site where the coal is being loaded into the unit train. The purpose of the tests of this sample is to assure SPS that it is getting the kind of quality of coal for which it is paying. The lab analyzes the moisture content, the percent ash, the percent volatile and most important, the heat value or the BTU content of the coal.

While the price of coal is generally expressed in terms of dollars per ton, Southwestern actually buys the coal on a BTU per ton basis. In other words, it's the amount of energy in the coal that determines its value.

The second source of samples of coal for testing is from the conveyor belt at the power plant where the coal is being moved from the crusher house to the bunker or storage silo. This sample is primarily for operational control. Immediate results indicate the kind of coal that is being fed into the boiler at that particular time.

Testing and analysis of coal in the SPS system lab starts with the preparation of the coal sample. The coal is poured into a pulverizer and ground to a very fine powder-like consistency.

The first analysis is to determine the heat value or the BTU content. This is done in a laboratory apparatus called a Adiabatic Calorimeter. It measures the rise in temperature of a water bath caused by the heat generated when the

coal sample is burned in an atmosphere of pure oxygen. The rise in temperature is compared to the rise experienced when a material is burned that has a known BTU content or is considered a standard. This comparison gives the BTU content or heat value of the sample.

The BTU content of the coal SPS is receiving from the mines in Wyoming will average about 8,700 per ton.

The test is computer programmed and a digital thermometer records the temperature rise as the sample burns while a digital printer records the results on tape.

The next test is to determine the percent of volatile elements in the coal—primarily the amount of hydro-carbons and fixed carbon in the sample. A weighed sample is placed in a crucible and placed in a 555 degree C. electric furnace for six minutes to remove the moisture. The sample is then placed in a furnace for six minutes to remove the moisture. The sample is then placed in a second oven for an additional six minutes at 950 degrees C. Then the sample is weighed and the weight loss represents the amount or percent of volatile materials.

Another important aspect of the coal that must be determined in the laboratory is the percent of ash it contains. To make this test, the sample is placed in a 750 degree C. furnace equipped with forced air. Complete combustion is attained in this analysis and all that remains is the ash—oxides of iron, aluminum, silica, calcium and magnesium. The coal that SPS is receiving for use at Harrington Station has approximately five percent ash. This means that in every 100 ton car of coal there will be about five tons of ash. The 350,000 kilowatt unit at the new plant will use about 1 million tons of coal per year, leaving about 50,000 tons of fly ash.

Southwestern Public Service Company engineers are now looking at various markets and uses for the fly ash. It is particularly suited for use as a roadbed material, as an additive for concrete mixes and for landfill uses.

When coal is burned in a boiler, it is necessary to know the fusibility or melting point of the ash. At certain temperatures, the ash begins to form slag inside the boiler and on the outside of the boiler tubes. This can eventually cause major problems in the boiler and lead to a complete shut-down for cleaning and repairs.

To determine the fusibility of ash, the sample is shaped into a cone and heated in an ash fusion furnace. By viewing the sample through an optical pyrometer, a device for measuring the temperature of glowing objects, the melting point can be determined.

The temperature in the boiler is then kept just below this melting point, thus preventing the formation of slag and damage to the boiler.

Since the fly ash will be sold for other uses, it is important that analysis be made to determine the percent of trace materials it contains. Trace materials include such metals and lead and arsenic that have a potential of being harmful to the environment. These tests make sure that the fly ash will not contaminate the water strata or nearby lakes and streams when used for commercial purposes.

The percent of trace metals in the coal sample are determined by the use of an atomic absorption spectrophotometer. The sample is burned in a graphite furnace and a spectral light beam analyzes the sample.

Finally, the coal sample is given a sieve analysis to check the size of the coal and to make sure it is not too large for the crusher equipment at the power plant. On the other hand, if the coal is too fine, it will be hard to control and create dust problems. This test also checks the performance of the coal pulverizer at the plant.

The introduction of a boiler fuel made a milestone in the energy picture for the 45,000 square miles served by Southwestern Public Service Company. No more power will be built by SPS that uses natural gas as the primary fuel. However, gas will continue to be used until time to come. But the future belongs to coal, ultimately to uranium and nuclear power.

After a short welcome address by Mr. Bert Grimes, high school principal, a review of what has been done and what is to be done was made by Mr. Harley McCasland, Elementary School principal. Mr. Grimes followed with explanation of the five-year plan. Community suggestions were received after review of the twenty-two goals that had been developed by the faculty steering committee. Goals will be finalized, prioritized and must be approved by the local board of education before submitted to the Texas Education Agency for approval.

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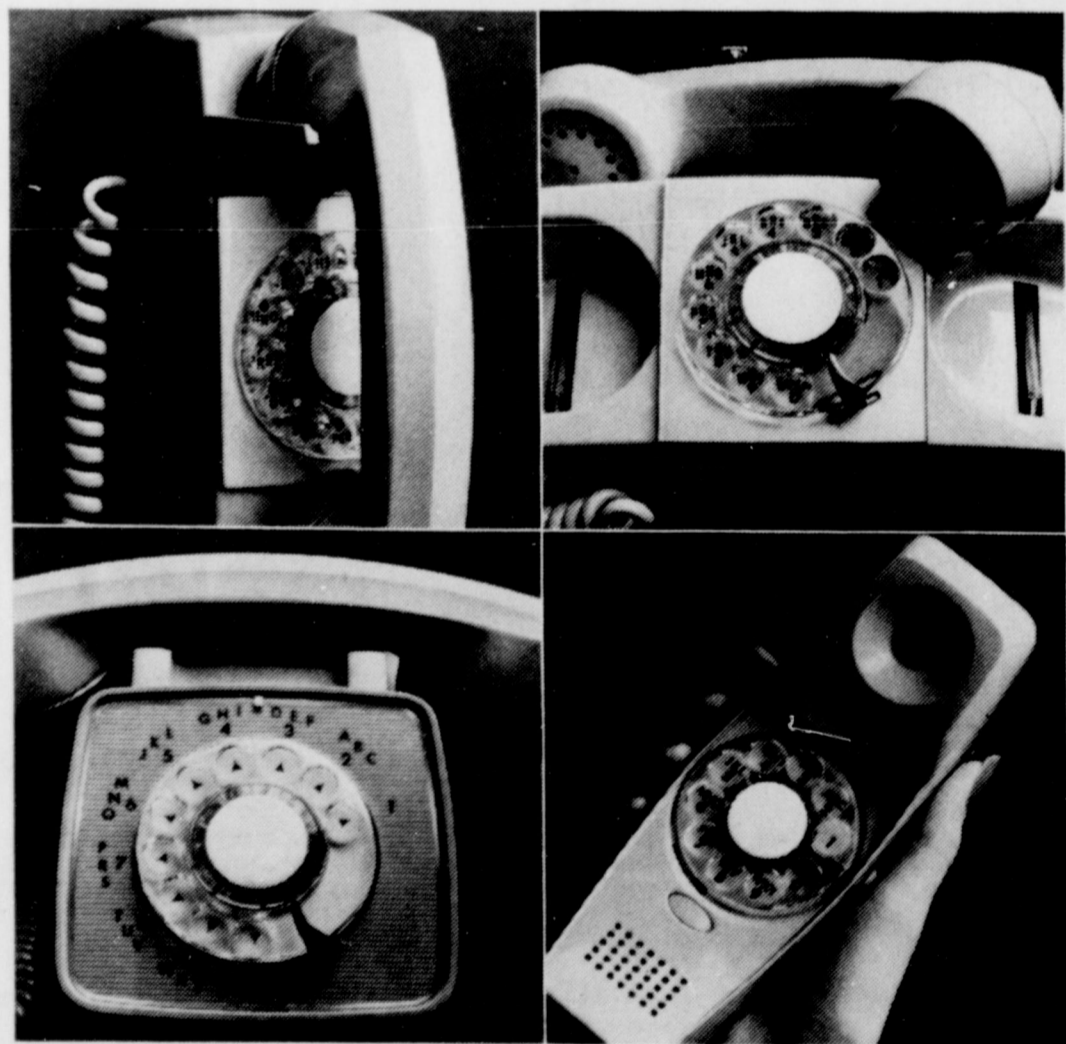

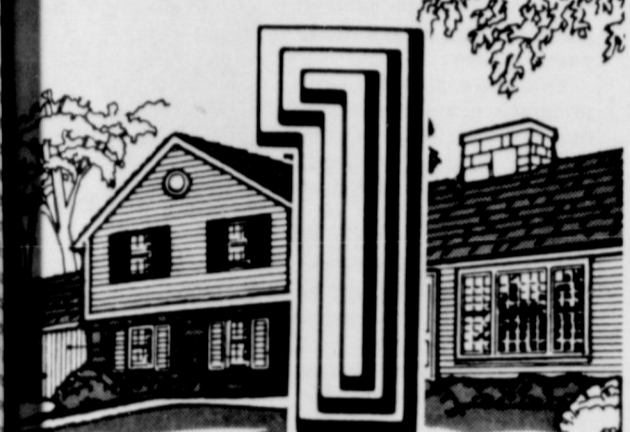

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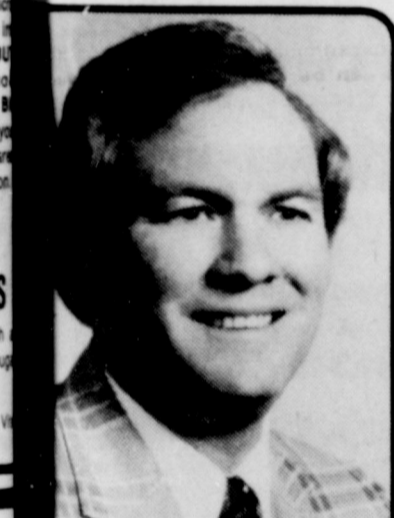

TV Set Can Be Used as Home Radar

Although the human eye is still the best method for locating tornadoes, most homes are equipped with a built-in tornado radar: the home television set.

If properly tuned, it is believed that a television set will detect a twister within a 15-20 mile radius.

Known as the Weller Method, the phenomenon is named for the Iowa scientist (Newton Weller) who first perfected the procedure.

The method is not foolproof and therefore should not be the sole source of information during bad weather. The National Weather Service recommends that anyone who lives in an area for which a "tornado watch" or "tornado warning" has been issued should keep an ear on up-to-date weather bulletins broadcast over local radio and television stations.

Weather bulletins are based on information from both radar and the phalanx of trained spotters deployed around a community whenever dangerous weather threatens.

As a supplement to this kind of protection, anyone can apply the Weller Method by following a few simple instructions:

First, warm up your television set as if you were going to watch it. The contrast control should be tuned to the maximum position.

Turn to Channel 13 and adjust the brightness control until the screen is just on the

threshold of black. Then turn to Channel 2 without making any new adjustments to the picture settings. The audio (sound) settings may be adjusted as desired. If Channel 2 is not an operating channel in your area, be sure to have a radio or second television tuned in for weather reports.

Monitor the screen as continuously as possible. Lightning will appear on the screen as horizontal flashes or streaks. On a color set the streaks will be in color.

A tornado within a 15-20 mile radius will cause the screen to glow brightly or cause the darkened picture to become visible and remain continuously visible.

Should this happen, it is important to take immediate safety precautions. Turn your television set off and open windows a crack to reduce the potential damage from pressure if a tornado passes nearby.

Take cover in a safe place, preferably near the center on the bottom floor of the building. A closet or small, windowless room offers best protection.

If you have a transistor radio, take it with you to the shelter area and continue to monitor weather broadcasts.

During particularly bad storms, when the electric power is off, the transistor radio can be used to augment the television warning system. To do this, set the radio alongside the TV and turn the radio knob to the lowest end of the dial (about 550 kilocycles).

At this setting the radio will pick up storm signals, emitting intermittent static when lightning is near and continuous static when a tornado is moving toward the signal.

Advance warning, from whatever source, is of no use if it is ignored. Anytime a tornado watch is issued

persons living in the area should take precautions to protect their lives and property.

Loose items in the home should be tied down to prevent severe weather to cause wind damage. Cars should be moved inside the garage if possible, to prevent damage from high wind-blown projectiles.
