Mr. Gardner will be the principal of North Elementary School which will house fourth, fifth, and sixth grades. When asked his feelings regarding his new assignment, Gardner said, "I'm looking forward to being principal at North Elementary. That age child expects to share and he still loves everything about

While high school principal, he was expected to attend many extra-curricular activities that are common to secondary schools and which he will not find so numerous now. "Selfishly speaking, I will be glad not to have so many hours away from home," Gardner said.

Clifton Gardner was born at Swenson, near Aspermont, in 1922, and his entire public school career as a student were spent there. His parents are Mr. Ward Gardner and the late Mrs. Gardner, of Swenson.

Tarleton University at Stephenville was his first step on the ladder to higher education, but this was interrupted by a stint in the service, starting in 1943, as a crewman on a dive bomber. He spent two and a half years in service and was stationed many places on the

In 1947 he was married to Miss Joan Cumbie from Asperment and he got his first degree from Hardin Simmons University in January of 1950; in March of that year, he was employed by the schools in Asperment as a teacher and coach.

He served as tax assessor at Aspermont for a year and operated a Ford tractor agency there until the drouth in the mid '50's.

1954 and 1955 were spent at Blackwell as a principal and coach and he was with the Wilson schools from 1956 to 1959. He got his Master of Education degree at Texas Tech during the time he taught at Wilson.

Mrs. Gardner is teacher's aide in Tubb Elementary and the Gardners have four children, the first three of whom are Tahoka High alumni. Mrs. Jim (Connie) Monk will be moving to Odessa in the near future from Enid, Oklahoma; Cliff is a teacher and coach at Brownfield; Carol will be enrolled in Methodist Hospital School of Nursing this fall; and Clint will be a senior at THS.

Not to be overlooked is an eight-month-old grandson, Chad Monk.

Throughout his tenure as high school principal in Tahoka, his job did not end on Friday afternoon. More often than not, he went to Swenson on Saturday to help ? with a family-owned cattle ranch.

He has never been too busy to spend time with his family nor too selfish to assist a teacher with whatever tasks arose.

Clifton Gardner has influenced the lives of many people in Tahoka and will continue to do so-starting with fourth graders instead of high school freshmen.



It may sound trite, but I am hereby pledging my allegiance to the school personnel who began work on Monday of this week. Our school is one of the largest businesses in this town and in some way, touches each one of us.

Be a good parent--don't wait until you are invited, to visit the school. Possibly no other gesture would mean as much to your child's teacher than your acknowledging his/her efforts in a positive way. The best place to discuss a teacher is in his/her presence at school--in contrast to the turnrow or coffeeshop.

Joe Brooks, Othell Meeks, and I were privileged to visit with Senator Kent Hance when he was in town recently to attend the Lyntegar Annual Meeting. Since that time, I have received a letter from the Senator and I am confident that Joe and

Othell have had the same correspondence. The thrust of the conversation pertained to school finance and I quote from Senator Hance's letter: "...it was good to discuss public school financing with you and the other board members. I realize the strain that the local school boards and local school districts have been put under due to the last public school financing bill. I assure you that I did everything possible to keep the local fund assignment as low as possible during the last Legislative Session, and I pledge to try to get it lowered when we meet again in January. It is imperative that the local districts not have to deal with this continued burden...

We tend to throw out educators' and politicians' jargon without due consideration to those whose vocabulary doesn't contain phraseology such as "local fund assignment" or "minimum foundation program." The tax statements come through loud and clear, however, and then the call goes out, 'Why didn't you tell me?'

Public education is financed by the state, in cooperation with a local district's ability to help, in other words, its property valuation.

Tahoka Independent School District will receive \$587,946 in revenue from the State, a figure based on our number of students, vocational units, etc. Add to that our local fund assignment, what the State says we can raise ourselves, \$212,241, and you get \$800,187. That's what it will take to provide the minimum foundation program for our children.

So we must raise over \$200,000 for building maintenance, the extra teachers that we have beyond our minimum program, etc.

And, in a nutshell, that was Governor Briscoe's "no new taxes" platform. When we look at school districts all around us and at our own situation, we wonder what he meant--"no new taxes"

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
