## Gardner Accepts A New Challenge ... A Slower Pace



CLIFTON GARDNER was "at the helm" in Tahoka High School for seventeen years and will be principal at North Elementary when school begins Monday.

"My goal is to help the younger student build on a foundation in North Elementary and help him meet the challenge he faces in high school," he continued.

Clifton Gardner was born at Swenson, near Aspermont, in 1922, and his entire public school career as a student were spent there. His parents are Mr. Ward Gardner and the late Mrs. Gardner, of Swenson.

Tarleton University at Stephenville was his first step on the ladder to higher education, but this was interrupted by a stint in the service, starting in 1943, as a crewman on a dive bomber. He spent two and a half years in service and was stationed many places on the east coast.

In 1947 he was married to Miss Joan Cumbie from Aspermont and he got his first degree from Hardin Simmons University in January of 1950; in March of that year, he was employed by the schools in Aspermont as a teacher and coach.

He served as tax assessor at Aspermont for a year and operated a Ford tractor agency there until the drought in the mid '50's. 1954 and 1955 were spent at Blackwell as a principal and coach and he was with the Wilson schools from 1956 to 1959. He got his Master of Education degree at Texas Tech during the time he taught at Wilson.

The Spectator... By Mary Brecheen

It may sound trite, but I am hereby pledging my allegiance to the school personnel who began work on Monday of this week. Our school is one of the largest businesses in this town and in some way, touches each one of us.

Be a good parent--don't wait until you are invited, to visit the school. Possibly no other gesture would mean as much to your child's teacher than your acknowledging his/her efforts in a positive way. The best place to discuss a teacher is in his/her presence at school--in contrast to the turnover or coffeshop.

Joe Brooks, Othell Meeks, and I were privileged to visit with Senator Kent Hance when he was in town recently to attend the Lyntegar Annual Meeting. Since that time, I have received a letter from the Senator and I am confident that Joe and Othell have had the same correspondence.

The thrust of the conversation pertained to school finance and I quote from Senator Hance's letter: "...it was good to discuss public school financing with you and the other board members. I realize the strain that the local school boards and local school districts have been put under due to the last public school financing bill. I assure you that I did everything possible to keep the local fund assignment as low as possible during the last Legislative Session, and I pledge to try to get it lowered when we meet again in January. It is imperative that the local districts not have to deal with this continued burden..."

We tend to throw out educators' and politicians' jargon without due consideration to those whose vocabulary doesn't contain phraseology such as "local fund assignment" or "minimum foundation program." The tax statements come through loud and clear, however, and then the call goes out, "Why didn't you tell me?"

Public education is financed by the state, in cooperation with a local district's ability to help, in other words, its property valuation.

Tahoka Independent School District will receive \$587,946 in revenue from the State, a figure based on our number of students, vocational units, etc. Add to that our local fund assignment, what the State says we can raise ourselves, \$212,241, and you get \$800,187. That's what it will take to provide the minimum foundation program for our children.

So we must raise over \$200,000 for building maintenance, the extra teachers that we have beyond our minimum program, etc.

And, in a nutshell, that was Governor Briscoe's "no new taxes" platform. When we look at school districts all around us and at our own situation, we wonder what he meant--"no new taxes" for whom?

When all else fails, try wing directions. Don't ever think because it's snow on the roof that the fire is out in the house. We don't want promises; we want results.

The list is endless--and the list of Tahoka High School during the past seven years knows the names of those statements. In 1959 Clifton Gardner endeavored himself to Tahoka High with his own philosophy and as school year begins in August he will be in a different environment and his "problems" will all be small ones.

In 1959 he became high school principal at Tahoka and has served in that position since. In January of

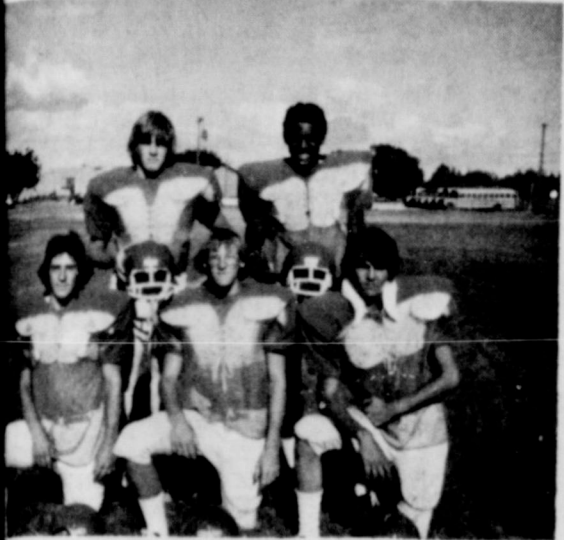
# Bulldogs Will Scrimmage Morton Thursday At 7:30 P M



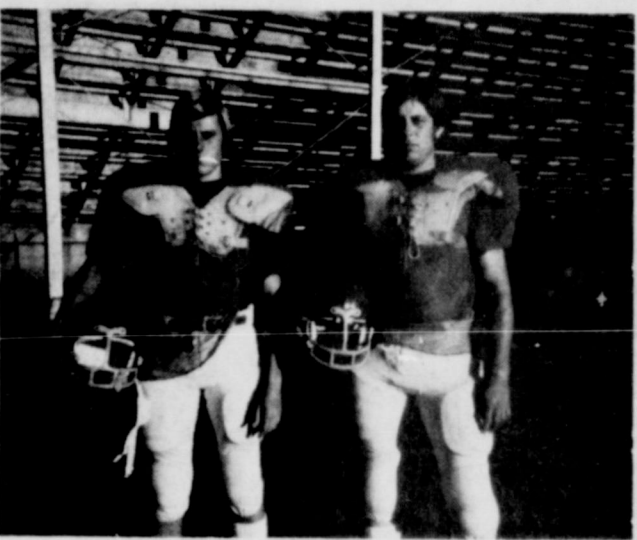

Field Day at Halfway The 67th Annual Field Day of the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center will be held at Halfway, Texas fourteen miles west of Plainview on Highway 70, Tuesday, September 14, from 1 to 5 p.m.

Tour highlights will include: Short-Season Cotton Variety: Higher cotton prices and more efficient utilization of increasingly more expensive irrigation water have stimulated renewed interest in cotton production in northern areas. Research on the new short-season varieties coupled with the narrow row concept have made cotton production more feasible where the

season is short. The field day tour will highlight research accomplishments on short-season varieties as well as Verticillium wilt resistant and "glandless" developments. Soil Fertility: Soil fertility and soil chemistry research programs of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station will be discussed by scientists from Lubbock and Halfway. Research plots with sunflowers, corn, and sorghum will be viewed.

Other tests can be observed: SORGHUM--new greenbug resistant hybrids, disease nurseries, and performance trials; SUNFLOWERS--performance trials; SOYBEANS--breeding lines and variety evaluations.

**City-County Library Gets New Volumes**

**WORSHIP OF THE LORD'S CHURCH (4)**

**Music In Worship**

God authorized music as a means of worship under both the old and new covenants. Music under the old law was both in song and with the instrument (2 Chron. 29:25), but the old law has been nailed to the cross (Rom. 7:4-6; Eph. 2:15). Today we look to the New Testament and Christ's authority to understand what kind of music we should use in expressing our admiration for God. Remember the John 4:24 teaches us we MUST worship Him in SPIRIT and TRUTH.

True worshippers do by faith only that which from the Word of God (Romans 10:17). The Word of Christ authorizes psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs accompanied by melody with the heart (Eph. 5:19). Colossians 3:16, 17 says that melody is to be made in the heart. The heart is the instrument of worship under Christ's law. Only this kind of music can be made by faith. Those who teach salvation by faith alone without obedience are so often the very ones who deny the faith that saves by going beyond what is written (1 Cor. 4:6).

Nadab and Abihu "took each of them his censers and part fire therein, and laid incense thereon, and offered strange fire before Jehovah, which had not been commanded them." (Lev. 10:1, 2) Notice the phrase, "strange fire---which he had not been commanded." God did not say, "Do not use that kind of incense, but He told them what to do. When He did more than what God said, He called that "strange fire" and destroyed them. God has said, "Do not use the instrument of music, but the Word tells us what to do. Anything more than instrumental music in this case, is comparable to "strange fire".

God instructed Noah to build an ark of gopher wood. (Gen. 6:13, 14). The specific command to use gopher wood eliminated pine, oak, and cedar. Instruments in worship are eliminated in the same specific way today. We must make our calling and election sure (2 Peter 1:10), and we must abide in the doctrine of Christ (2 John 9, 10), and we must add nor take from what the Bible said (Rev. 22:18, 19). Jesus came not to do His own will, but the will of the Father (John 6:38).
