The 1977 legislative session in Austin will prove of interest to those who follow the school picture closely. The Texas State Teachers Association is going to push for a pay raise for teachers which Governor Price says will have to come from the local level--and the local scene can't stand any more tax-wise. The Texas Association of School Boards has recommended that the state's share of funding be financed by broad-based state taxes, include a new one-cent sales tax. It is positive that teachers need a raise. Salary of a beginning teacher in Texas is \$8,000 per year plus whatever the local district can afford (for a classroom teacher). Divide that by twelve months then take out 6 percent for mandatory retirement, income tax, hospitalization insurance, and try to hide your dismay at how a teacher support a family. I think that the sales tax would be a good idea to see that everybody helped pay for his children's education. However, that would just give the higher powers one more inroad to doing without local control of education. It is obvious that I'm no authority on the subject but I would be invited to Austin. But I have some ideas that I think would be worth batting around. Charity Benefit Brings Large Crowd Of Bridge Players To Tahoka Recently

That a small town can successfully stage a sectional bridge tournament was proved Tuesday, November 23rd, when Tahoka's T-Bar Duplicate Club played host to this area's Llano Estacado Unit 197 American Contract Bridge League Charity Game for benefit of The Arthritis Foundation. Thirty-two tables in two sections (128 players) from 13 towns turned out for the event and \$224 in entry fees went to the charity. This was the first time the annual game has ever been held outside Lubbock. The game is unique in that at the same hour in about 500 cities over North America and some foreign countries, identical computer-dealt hands were being played.

First-place overall winners were two Lubbock ladies, Mrs. E. C. Terry and Mrs. Cliff Widener, who had a 69-percent game and have been entered in the state and national events as a result. Several Tahoka pairs did well in the competition. Mrs. Coye Collier and Mrs. Lillian McCord finished first in Section B east-west and were fourth overall. Mrs. Al Gardner, formerly of Tahoka, and Mrs. Dick Park, Lubbock, finished third overall.

Mrs. Winston Wharton and Mrs. Meldon Leslie were fourth in Section B north-south. Also, east-west in the same section, Mrs. Jacquie Chesshir and Mrs. N. M. Barham, Jr. of Brownfield, who play with the Tahoka club, were third; and Mrs. C. R. Bursleson of O'Donnell and Mrs. Olen Renfro, Tahoka, won fourth place. No men's pair won anywhere.

Although a majority of the players were from Lubbock, Tahoka had 36 players entered, Brownfield nine.

Flu Vaccine To Be Repeated December 10

According to Mrs. Bebe Boren, R.N., another round of swine flu vaccine will be given in the Tahoka Community Center on Friday, December 10, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

The third onslaught of winter weather, before that season officially makes its debut, hit the South Plains last Friday just after dark, causing temperatures to plunge rapidly. A strong north wind all day Saturday brought blowing snow to the area by late afternoon and by nightfall, snow was falling heavily. The snow was very dry and that fact, together with the wind, caused little to stay on the ground and melt. Sunday morning's low of 12 degrees and high of 26 and Monday's low of 9 degrees caused ice and snow

to contribute to hazardous driving conditions until noon on Monday.

Some area farmers only halted harvest operations all of Saturday and part of Sunday, some beginning again Sunday afternoon and others resuming operations by Tuesday noon at the latest.

The previous November low-temperature record, until this year's 4 degrees on November 14, was 8 degrees on November 23, 1957.

According to Frank Hill, local U.S. Weather Observer, the lowest temperature recorded here was -15 degrees on February 8, 1933.

Also, Hill reports, the earliest killing freeze recorded was October 15, 1953, compared to the latest killing-freeze date of December 11, 1962.

Farmers are hoping for maximum sunshine and drying conditions until the cotton harvest is completed. Some estimates are that only one-fourth of the county cotton crop has been harvested.

City Manager Mason Invites Citizen Participation Re Grant

According to Ray Mason, City Administrator, the Citizen Participation Plan for the City of Tahoka as published in the September 23rd issue of *The Lynn County News* is amended to read as follows:

The City of Tahoka anticipated filing a pre-application for Community Development Block Grant funds with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development prior to January 7, 1977. The City may request program funds within the amounts of \$50,000 and \$250,000. Additional citizen participation concerning the pre-application may be provided at the Tahoka City Council meeting at 7:30 p.m. December 6, 1976 in the City Hall, 1612 Lockwood, Tahoka.

Mason stressed that any citizen of Tahoka who would like information concerning the Block Grant is welcome to attend the December 6th

meeting or come by his office at the City Hall.

He says, "At this time I would like to thank each person who attended our public hearings and presented his ideas. Everything possible is being done to obtain this grant for the City of Tahoka and my office will try to keep you, the citizens of Tahoka, informed as to the progress being made."



Basketball Publication Gives Tahoka Teams Good Ratings

According to the 1976 publication of **Panhandle-Plains Basketball**, Tahoka is predicted to make another run for the 5-AA title which it won last year under first-year coach Jim Egan. Egan, who left a successful coaching career for private business, says the publication, which is edited by Mike Williamson, Tahoka coach at Shallowater, coached at Shallowater for three years, posting a 67-26 record, would like this club to do at least as well as last year (24-4 regular season and 11-1 in district).

David Graves, a 5-11 senior, led the club with 20 points a game last year and was named third-team all-state. Earning rebounder Earnest Bailey (6-0 senior) again to be on the prowl as will senior Danny Moore who started last year. Clint Gardner could be a key since senior letterman is the club's tallest man at 6-3, Gary Vink Miller (5-11) and Ricky Harston (5-6) also played last year.

From the JV are 6-2 Clifford Bailey, 6-2 Alton Graves and 5-7 Sam Louder while junior Ronnie Thompson also will be trying to make the team.

Says the publication, "Tahoka liked the taste of winning big and may very well do it again this year."

Continuing, **Panhandle-Plains Basketball** says Tahoka girls will have strength at the post forward in 5-10 Elaine Draper and at the post guard with 6-1 senior Beverly Bryson, honorable mention all-district last year.

The third letter-winner was 5-6 senior guard Carla Stevens. Also trying out at guard will be juniors Bridget Fowlkes, 5-6 senior Becky Harris, Penny Witt, and Jona Valentine. Sheree Jerden and Bridget Fowlkes can play on either end of the court.

Forward prospects include 5-2 senior Donna Maret, 5-7 junior Jodie Brecheen, 5-6 junior Sylvia Salinas, and 5-1 junior Carmen Garcia.

Losing all-district forward Cindy Craig and being in the same district with Slaton make things even tougher, but the Bulldog fans hope to meet the challenge with a much better year in 1976-77.

Sherry Etheredge Says

The beauty of many fall flowers and leaves may be preserved to enjoy indoors during the winter months.

Heavy textured leaves such as oak and magnolia are most attractive when placed in a simple container or combined with other foliage. Remove an inch or so of the bark and cut slits into the stem. Place the stems in a solution of one part glycerin to two parts water. Rub the foliage with glycerin once a day. Remove from the solution when the leaves take on a pliable texture and change color.

may be dried by tying in small bunches and hanging in a dry place.

Many flowers also may be dried successfully by burying them in sand (if sand is not available, a mixture of one part borax to one part white cornmeal may be used). Sift the sand to remove anything which may damage the petals.

Pick flowers at full bloom during the warmest part of the day. The lightest, brightest flowers seem to turn out best. Cover the bottom of the box used for drying the flowers in with sand.

Open-faced flowers such as zinnias and blackeyed susans are placed face down. Thick-centered flowers such as roses and marigolds are placed face up. Do not be concerned with long stems-length can be added with wire. Carefully cover the petals with sand.

To prevent the centers of thick-centered flowers turning dark, remove them from sand as soon as the outer petals dry-usually four to five days-and hang to complete the process. It usually takes up to two weeks for other types to dry.

For use during the holiday season, evergreens may be preserved to prevent their becoming brittle. This applies also to table-top size Christmas trees, but will not work for large trees.

Crush the stems and place in a solution of four tablespoons micronized iron plant food, two cups of light corn syrup, and four teaspoons of chlorinated household bleach.

While atmospheric conditions and the age of the foliage will influence the finished product, you will soon have the basis for many beautiful arrangements, with a small investment of time and money.

BILL GRIFFIN SAYS....

Texas swine are being protected from an infectious disease that is predominant in the midwestern states.

Pseudorabies, a disease that infects the central nervous system, occurs as a natural infection most often in swine, cattle, sheep, dogs and cats. The Texas Animal Health Commission has issued a directive on the incoming movement of feeder, breeder and exhibition swine into the state of

pseudorabies within 30 days of movement.

An alternative requirement calls for the swine originate from herds known to be infected with pseudorabies, and where percent of the herd or head, whichever is greater, one or more litters have been tested negative for pseudorabies within 90 days of movement.

Feeder pigs that do not originate from a tested herd must be tested negative within 30 days of movement.

The directive is part of a state entry requirement and applies only to swine entering this state. Feeder pigs must be accompanied by a certificate from the premise of origin and a statement that the herd of origin meets entry requirements.

Entry requirements for Texas include a health certificate or statement that the swine entering do not come from an infected herd and a negative test to the serum neutralization test for

All of the honoree's children, some from out of state, attended the celebra-


tion. Mrs. Williamson is the founder and organizer of the Wilson Sewing Club. She was presented a birthday cake and a money tree.

Mr. Edwards, Mrs. Varner Are Married

Q: Our daughter in junior high school is threatening to move into an apartment with several other girls as soon as she reaches the age of 17. She keeps insisting that when she becomes 17, she is no longer a minor and therefore cannot be held against her wishes. At what age is she no longer responsible to the rules of the home?

A: Juvenile court jurisdiction is limited to acts committed by children after they are 10 years old and prior to their 17th birthday. After they reach the age of 17, there is no law which gives a parent authority to force a child to return to their home unless the child already was under the control of the juvenile court.

Q: A tree-trimming contractor came to our house soliciting business. If we hire him, would we be liable if he's injured while working in our yard?

A: A homeowner is not responsible to an independent tree-trimming contractor if the contractor is injured while working in the homeowner's yard, so long as the homeowner does not create a special hazard or interfere with the contractor. However, if the homeowner attempts to control the contractor, or supplies his tools, the homeowner could be held responsible for an injury. The key question is one of "independence". If the contractor is independent, the homeowner is not responsible; if the contractor is controlled or directed by the homeowner, the homeowner may be assuming legal obligations for his safety.




