"Living Proof", an unparalleled \$1.5 million media evangelism campaign featuring testimonies by well-known personalities such as Houston Oiler Billy "White Shoes" Johnson; actor Dean Jones; former militant Elbridge Cleaver; country and western super stars Jeannie C. Riley and Connie Smith; successful businessman Allan Mayer of Oscar Mayer Company; Miss Teenage America, Rebecca Ann Reid; Rosargentina Pinel, Consul General of the Republic of Honduras; former band leader Paulino Bernal; and Antonio Mendoza of the U.S. Office of Equal Employment

who have experienced changed lives through commitment to Jesus Christ is being funded by Texas Baptists.

Large numbers of professions of faith have marked the first wave of media saturation and revival meetings since the campaign began February 21 in North Texas. Ballot Recount Reassures Brooks, Meeks, Mrs. Green

An unprecedented recount of votes in the April 2nd school trustee election in Tahoka Independent School District failed to upset any of the previously declared winners.

Candidate Lyndell Wood had filed an application for recount of election ballots in accordance with the procedures of Article 9.38a of the Texas Revised Civil Statutes which states that a recount may be requested if the difference in number of votes received by the applicant and the next highest candidate above the applicant is less than five percent of the number of votes received by the next highest candidate. Wood's tally, after the initial count on April 2nd, was 205 and Joe Brooks, incumbent, received 206.

Ben Gwin 69, Billy Davis 78, Othell Meeks 217, Joe Brooks 210, Steve Greer 126, Lyndell Wood 209, and Larry Pollard 118.
Write-in votes remained the same—Domingo Riojas 2, Julia Garcia 2, Billy Miller 1, Ernest Isbell 1, and Jacky Henry 2.

County Beef Producers Will Meet April 25th In Tahoka

A countywide meeting about the proposed Beef Research and Information Act has been called for 7:30 p.m. April 25 in the Lyntegar Meeting Room in Tahoka, by Edward Bartley, chairman of the Lynn County Beef Development Task Force.

Details about the upcoming beef referendum will be explained, the chairman has announced.

The educational program, which is designed for all beef and dairy cattle owners of the county, will include two slide presentations about the Beef Research and Information Act—one prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service—and the second by the Beef Development Task Force. There

will be a period for questions and comments from producers.

Additionally, the BDT chairman, County Extension Agent W. B. Griffin, and Extension C.E.A. specialist Marvin Sartin, area economist, will provide more detailed information about the forthcoming beef referendum.

The Beef Research and Information Act serves as enabling legislation and authorized the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a referendum among beef producers to determine whether they want a beef development plan, developed by an industry-wide committee. (see County Beef, page 2)

Little League Scores Hit With Sponsors And Parents

As surely as spring comes, the young lad and his dad begin to think home plate, the pitcher's mound, short stop, three strikes...in a word, baseball, softball.

Time was, when the only semblance of organization to the thing was an uncanny sense of knowing when to head for the town's vacant lot and there the games were started—no announcer, no dugout, no uniforms, old tin cans for bases, and not many spectators.

But times have changed and the game has a name—Little League—and it is a national organization. Everywhere, in small towns and big cities, when the days get warm, the rustle in the air spells organization, above and beyond the vacant-lot-on-the-spur-of-a-moment bit.

In 1956, through the efforts of, generally, the Rotary Club, and specifically, Clint Walker, Tahoka was granted a Little League franchise and each year since that time, countless numbers of boys have enjoyed a measure of success in the all-American sport of baseball.

And it didn't all accidentally fall into place—ball parks were built by city

workers and every year, someone has taken it on himself to "get the ball rolling" and that involves, first and foremost, sponsors for the teams.

That someone in Tahoka this year is Tommy Lawson and through his diligence, the program now has wheels and with his guidance, the financial support of merchants and individuals, and the all-important co-operation of parents and players, the season is off and running in Tahoka.

On Tuesday of this week, Red Brown at The Pit joined other sponsors and as he gave his \$75 sponsor fee, Brown said, "I attribute part of my son Charlie Brown's success as a high school baseball coach to Tahoka's Little League program. He played Pee Wee, Little League, Pony League, and Babe Ruth League under the Tahoka Little League Program."

Brown continued with an admonition, "You parents take a little time out and be sure your son shows up for practice and games. It's a fine program and we are proud to help sponsor it."

Joining Brown and The Pit are twelve other sponsors, to date—Haney Gin, Farmers Co-op No. 1, D & J

"We try to impress upon our sponsors, other donors, and parents that this is a year-to-year program. We want businesses to put us in their advertising budgets and each year, the Little League president will know that he can start with a \$75

The Little League teams are boys between the ages of ten and twelve who have played Minor League at least one year. Those who played on a Little League team last year automatically go back to that same team this year. Managers will select enough 10 to 12-year-olds to give each team twelve players. Those teams will have try-outs this Thursday night, April 14, at 6:30 at the softball park.

The four Minor League teams, consisting of nine-year-olds and the 10 to 12-year-olds who need more time in that League, are the Astros, coached by Ruben Perez and Rudy Fuentes; the Dodgers, coached by Pug Paris and Randy Evans; the Orioles, coached by Taylor Knight and Jerry Isbell; and the Pirates, coached by Elmer Wilson. Those players will try out on Friday night at 6:30 in the softball park.

Little League games are on Monday and Thursday nights, one game at 6:30 and one at 8:00, beginning May 2nd. Minor League games are on Tuesday and Friday nights, same hours.

"Our biggest problem is getting umpires," Lawson said. "We're not able to get

paid umpires as we had hoped, so we'll depend on dads." Each team manager is responsible for three umpires in each of five games.

With the Lawsons, it's a family affair—Mrs. Lawson will get volunteers from among the players' mothers to operate the concession stand, proceeds from which go to the League program.

In Little League, every boy who tries out is placed on a team. Each player is asked for a five-dollar donation which covers the cost of caps and insurance through a League policy. A birth certificate is also required of each player.

Lawson says that two Pee Wee teams will be organized if enough interest is shown. Those teams are made up of eight-year-olds and playing time would be Saturday mornings, beginning at 10 o'clock.

"Part of what Little League is all about is teaching cooperation to youngsters," Lawson says. "We feel that if our businesses support us financially, parents must insist that their children attend practice and games faithfully," he stressed.

Cleve Littlepage To Represent Lubbock PCA In Dallas Meet

Keynote speakers at the session are newly elected Governor Donald Wilkison, head of the Farm Credit Administration in Washington, D.C., and President Jack Barton, the Houston bank's top executive officer.

Wilkison, a former administrator of the Agricultural Marketing Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, heads the agency which supervises the \$37 billion national Farm Credit System. He speaks on "Agriculture - Building for Tomorrow."

Barton will report on last year's highlights, financial and otherwise, to the stockholders.

The Houston Credit Bank, principal source of funds for 32 Production Credit Associations and seven agricultural credit corporations, last year loaned more than \$1.5 billion through its agricultural credit outlets. It is a member-bank of the Farm Credit System.

Commissioner Dorman Gandy Fatally Injured On April 7th

Dorman Gandy, third-term Lynn County Commissioner in Precinct Two, was killed Thursday afternoon, April 7, when the bed of a dump truck fell on him.

According to witnesses at the scene of the accident in the county barn, the truck had overturned earlier, causing a malfunctioning in the hydraulic lift and Gandy was attempting to fix it by having the bed propped so that he could work underneath it. The bed released itself without warning, pinning him between it and the rest of the truck. Justice of the Peace N. E. Wood pronounced him dead at the scene.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday afternoon at First United Methodist Church with Elmer Tyler, pastor of Tahoka's Assembly of God Church, officiating. Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery under the direction of White Funeral Home.

Gandy came to Lynn County with his family in 1927 from Mullin, having been born there on September 5, 1921. He attended Tahoka schools and was married to Patty Florence Fenton on July 12, 1941 in Tahoka.

A World War II veteran, Gandy had been employed by the county for twenty-two years, ten years of that time as Commissioner in Precinct Two. He was a member of the Assembly of God Church.

Jim Marcus, Tahoka High School principal, was introduced as a new member of the club.

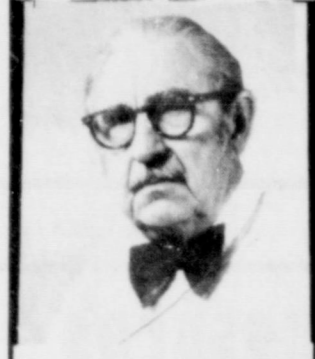
Lusk, Ashcraft Win First At Bridge Club

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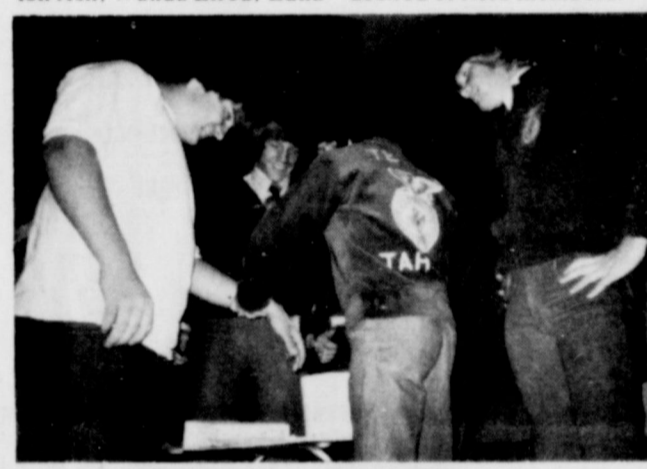

BILL GRIFFIN SAYS.....

Edward Bartley, Chairman of the Lynn County Livestock Management Committee, urges all livestock producers to be alert to the screwworm threat and to use all possible measures to prevent re-infestation of local herds.

The County Screwworm Committee is conducting an educational campaign with all producer groups of the county to brief them about the campaign to "Stamp Out Screwworm."

Producers are reminded to inspect their animals at least twice a week, since screwworm larvae reach maturity in less than seven days. Treat every wound found with an EPA-labeled effective insecticide. Spray animals when screwworms are known to be in the community, and following livestock surgery or shearing of goats and sheep.

Collect larvae or egg masses found in or near wounds and send the

samples to the Mission Laboratory for identification. Mailing kits for worm samples are available at county Extension office and at several county locations, including Tatum Bros. and O'Donnell Farm and Ranch Store, says Mr. Bartley.

Producers should avoid animal surgery during seasons of high screwworm activity. All branding, de-horning, castrating, and shearing should be completed before the screwworm season opens. Also, avoid unnecessary animal injuries by keeping corrals and gates free of protruding nails and sharp wire.

Observe regulations governing livestock movements from screwworm-infested areas.

Mahon Gets Pledge Of 'All-Out Effort' To Get Consumer Support For The Farmer

At a top-level briefing March 31st for the new Secretary of Agriculture and most of his top staff people, Representative George Mahon received a pledge from Secretary Bob Bergland that the Department of Agriculture "will do everything that we possibly can to get

farmers and consumers working together."

Mahon hosted the special luncheon at the Capitol to explore specific ways the Department can cooperate with the Agriculture Council of America and with members of Congress in a comprehensive effort to

improve consumer understanding of the farmer's problems. The ACA is a non-partisan group dedicated to improving the relationship between farmers and consumers.

It was the feeling of the group that better understanding of farm problems

by consumers will enhance the chances for the passage of farm legislation acceptable to producers.

Commenting as Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, Rep. Tom Foley (D-WA) noted that "there is no question that a very big part of the problem is that people simply do not understand what it takes to produce the food and fiber that makes America such a great nation."

Among the farm leaders, members of Congress and agriculture officials participating in the meeting were Rep. Jamie Whitten (D-MO), Chairman of the panel handling Agriculture Appropriations; Sen. Curtis (R-NB); Carol Farnham, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture for Consumer Affairs; Chairman Dan Hendricks of ACA from Iowa; and Wilmer Smith, Lynn County farm leader and Chairman of the Board of the Central Bank for Cooperatives.

Secretary Bergland has now appeared before both the Senate and House Agriculture Committees regarding a new farm program expressed his desire to cooperate with Congress with the efforts of ACA.

Mahon noted that House Committee on Agriculture is readying a farm bill for presentation to the House in May. Farm and farm groups are expressing deep concern over USDA farm program proposals, but no final determinations as to the content of the new farm bill have been made.

Dear Editor:

As we approach another Tax Day (April 15), there are a couple of bills pending in the House of Representatives which will be of interest to many persons in the Tahoka area.

Some 54 million Americans are hit with an income tax penalty of up to 20% because they are single, or because they are married with both partners working. The Committee of Single Taxpayers (COST) has been working for several years to eliminate this inequity. To accomplish this goal, Rep. Ed Koch has again introduced HR850 in the House.

Also pending in the House is HR84, introduced by Rep. Herb Harris, which would make a beginning toward income tax equality for renters, similar to what has for so long been available to homeowners.

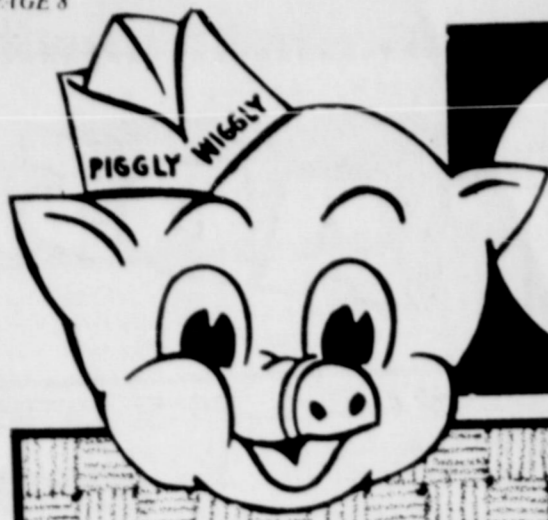

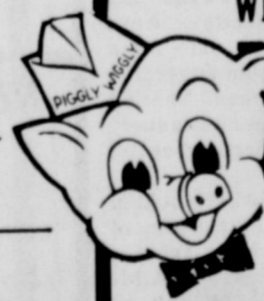
