## Tahoka Police Department Cracking Down On Violators Of Leash Law

Tahoka Chief of Police Jack Miller has announced the appointment of Milton Harris by the police department to pick up stray dogs in the city.

City Ordinance 135 provides for the registration and licensing of all dogs within the city limits and requires that all dogs will wear a collar with a valid license tag and vaccine tag thereon.

In addition, the ordinance prohibits dogs running at large in the city limits, "at large" meaning off the premises of the owner and

not under the complete control of the owner, either by leash, cord, chain, or otherwise.

The "owner" is interpreted to mean any person owning, keeping, harboring, in charge of, or in control of a dog.

Furthermore, Section 2 of the ordinance gives the Chief of Police and any police officer of the city the right to enforce any of the provisions of the ordinance. The Chief of Police has the authority to appoint any person or persons to aid and assist him in the enforcement of the ordinance.

Chief Miller says that a three-dollar fine will be charged for the first offense; six dollars for a second; third, ten dollars; and after

the fourth offense, the city will file charges against the owner.

Any dog found within the city in violation of any of the provisions of the ordinance shall immediately be impounded and kept for a period of 72 hours, then disposed of if its owner has not paid the fine and regained custody.

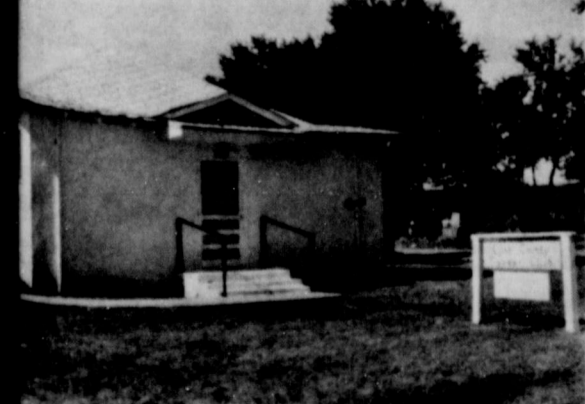

## Former Church Building In Tahoka Home For County Pioneer Club

Monday, June 12, was an especially hot summer day, and it was a special day for members of the Lynn County Pioneer Club.

That was the day set aside for the dedication of the building which has been their headquarters for the past year.

The little building at 1600 South Third Street in Tahoka was built in the early 1900's by members of the Little Flock Primitive Baptist Church and because it was no longer in use by the church, it was deemed to the senior citizens in Lynn County last year.

At Sunday's dedication, Elder Glen Williams, who was minister of the church for some twenty-five years and who is now Bailey County Judge, addressed the crowd of some thirty-five people, some of whom were former members of the little congregation.

Mrs. Robert Abbe, Sr., program chairman for the occasion, introduced Johnny Wells, whose grandparents,

Thus, Glen Williams expressed his humility at being among the senior citizens on their special occasion.

He reminded them that great minds talk about ideas, average minds talk about events, and small minds discuss people. Social Security Increase Due

A cost-of-living increase in monthly social security benefits will be included in checks delivered on July 1, according to Laura Peacock, social security district manager in Lubbock.

The increase will amount to 5.9 percent for most people getting social security payments. The automatic cost-of-living provision was added to the Social Security Law in 1972.

"People getting social security checks don't have to do anything to get the higher payments," Mrs. Peacock said. "The increase will be added automatically."

The increase is based on the rise in consumer prices from the first three months of 1976 to the first three months of 1977.

With the cost-of-living increase, average social security retirement payments to retired workers will go from \$221 to \$234 a month. Average social security disability payments to disabled workers will go from \$248 to \$262 a month. Average social security survivors payments to widowed mothers or fathers with two children in their care will go from \$517 to \$547 a month.

Social security pays benefits to over 48,000 people in the Lubbock district, Ms. Peacock said. The payments are funded by social security contributions from employees, employers, and self-employed people.

Social security checks are usually delivered on the 3rd of the month. When the 3rd falls on Saturday or Sunday, the checks are delivered the preceding Friday. July 3rd is on Sunday this year and the checks will be delivered Friday, July 1.

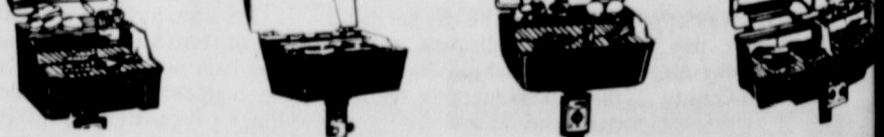

### SSI Program Has Changes

Effective October 1, 1976, Federal rent subsidies paid on behalf of or to needy people cannot count as income in the supplemental security income program, according to Laura Peacock, social security district manager in Lubbock.

"Before the law was changed, any money the Federal Government paid on behalf of or to a needy person or couple for their rent, was considered income in determining eligibility for SSI and the amount of the benefit," Ms. Peacock said. "This includes so-called 'Section 8' rent subsidies, where the local housing authority pays the subsidy directly to the private landlord.

Anyone who has had SSI payments reduced or terminated because a Federal housing subsidy was counted as income, should contact a social security office immediately for reinstatement. Also, people who may have been denied SSI because the Federal Government paid part of their rent, should contact social security to see if they may now be eligible.

### May Bond Sales Reported

May sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Lynn County were reported this week by County Bond Chairman F. B. Hegi.

Sales for the five-month period totaled \$40,112 for 31 percent of the 1977 sales goal of \$130,000.

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

**COTTON BURRS** or gin trash has long been considered a problem rather than a benefit to the cotton industry. In recent years, some beneficial uses have been found for them, one being a heavy application, 3-ton or more per acre, back to the land. The use of burr extractors on cotton strippers should prove very beneficial in that burrs can be left in the blanks each year the cotton is harvested. Research being carried out at the USDA Experiment Station in Big Spring shows that plots where burrs were used in the blanks doubled the pounds of lint per acre on plots where the blanks were left bare. Production on the plots where burrs were used produced 401 pounds of lint per acre in 1976 while plots with bare rows produced 190 pounds of lint. This was the fifth year these tests had been run. Residue is a basic need of the land if it is to remain productive for generations to come and cotton burrs is just one way to get that residue.

**Reconstruction Scheduled For FM Road 213**

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the contractor, Henry L. Stafford, of Lubbock have indicated that reconstruction work will begin on Farm to Market Road 213 during the coming week.

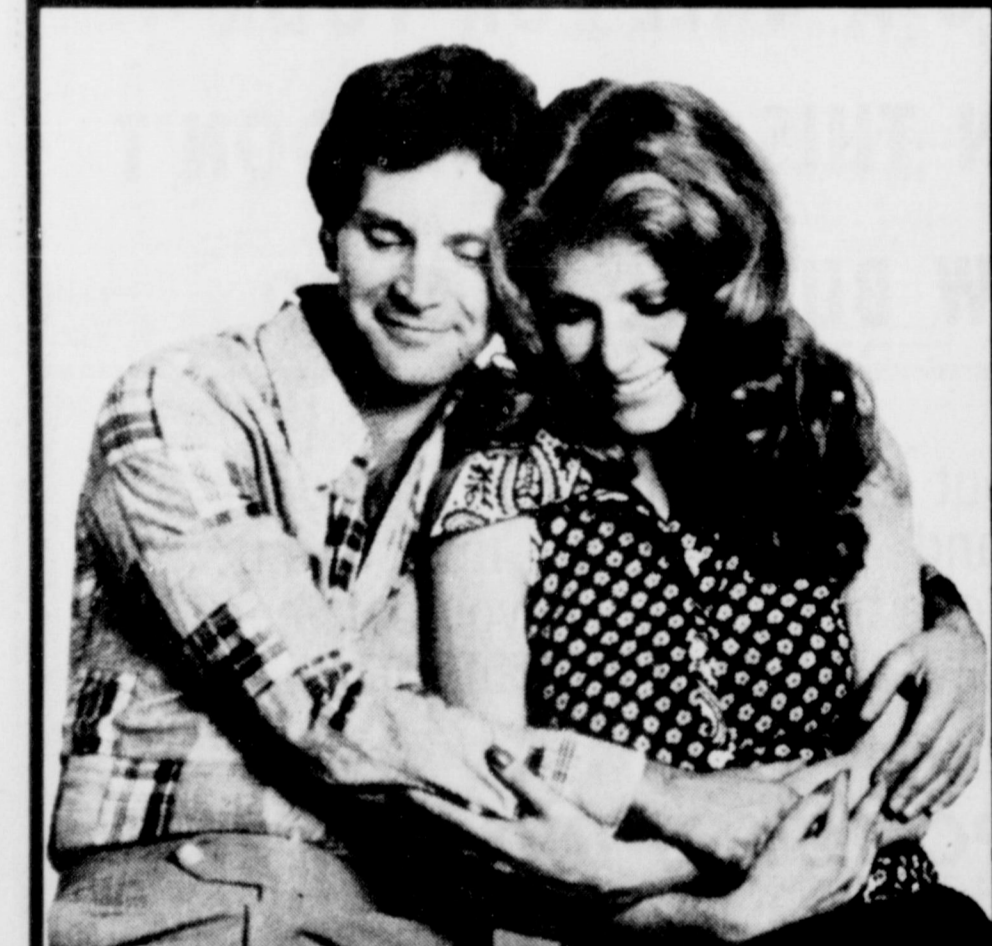
