"Well, what happened with Granny and Papa, then?"

"They were found under a gooseberry bush."

"The boy went back to school and wrote in his story book, 'There has not been a normal birth in my family for three generations.'"

Now, back to the grim.

Speaker of the House Bill Clayton has responded with chairmen of school boards across the state and has urged them to decrease wherever possible. His feeling is that since school districts' financial woes were abated by new money allocated by the special session of the legislature, the taxpayers should be in a break.

All sounds great on paper and some districts may be able to do so, but my suggestion is that the best do some planning and scanning before making any rash promises.

School budgets, in most areas, are tight and any "new money" is already nipped to death by inflation.

Tahoka's school budget will be over a million dollars this next year. The state will pick up part of that and the rest of it, some \$500,000, will come from local taxes.

Knowing that, it seems to me that there would be a standing room only at the public hearing. Most of the time we are pretty concerned about where the money is spent.

But, sadly enough, the "public hearing" will be sporadically through the year--petty complaints from people who do not want to be bothered with becoming informed about what the issues are.

## Birth Certificates, Health Records Are Required For Entry To Tahoka Schools

All children in Tahoka schools are eligible for kindergarten if born on or before September 1, 1972 and such students must have proof of age at the time of enrollment, either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, says Melvin Burks, principal of Tubbs Elementary School.

Any first-grade student who was not enrolled in Tahoka schools last year will need a birth certificate or records from prior schools.

### Immunization Proof Required

Mr. Burks says that all students enrolling in Tahoka schools must present proof of required immunizations. Records are on file for students in school last year and a list of students who need booster shots will be available in the nurse's office the week of August 22 and in principals' offices during registration.

Immunizations required of all students are as follows: Diphtheria/Tetanus; Pupils

5 through 11 years--at least 3 doses of DTP or Td, of which at least one dose has been received since the fourth birthday. Pupils 12 years and older--at least one dose received in past ten years.

Oral Polio: A minimum of 3 doses of which at least one (see Health, page 3)

## 1977-78 School Budget Hearing Is Set Tonight

The public hearing for the 1977-78 budget for Tahoka Independent School District will be tonight (Thursday) from 8 to 9 p.m. in the board room at the high school.

School trustees expect that the present tax rate of \$1.35 per hundred dollar assessment will remain the same, following a budget work session last week. That rate is based on 82 percent of market value and twenty cents of the rate is for debt retirement.

## Lynn County Hospital Commended For Its Cost Containment Efforts

Lynn County Hospital has received a Certificate of Recognition from the Texas Hospital Association's Statewide Hospital Productivity Center, commending its participation in cost containment efforts.

O. Ray Hurst, president of the Association said, "Texas hospitals have long been aware of the escalating health care costs and the public's questioning of financial accountability. The past favorable reaction to this problem is indicated by the fact that Texas hospitals' costs consistently have been below national average.

Costs per hospital day are currently over 13 percent higher nationally than in Texas. In spite of this accomplishment, Texas hospital leadership banded together in 1975 to form the Statewide Hospital Productivity Center which is dedicated to effecting immediate and continuing savings in individual hospitals. To date, substantial cost savings have been demonstrated. Reduction in

costs to date amount to more than \$56 million."

In issuing the Certificate of Recognition, Hurst lauded Lynn County Hospital for its efforts to contain health care costs, improve the overall productivity of the hospital

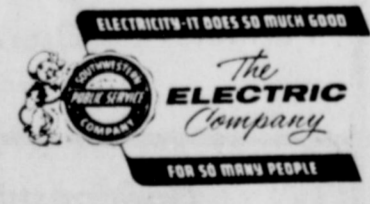
Meters are easily read from right to left as you look at the meter. If the pointer on a dial is between two numbers, write down the smaller number. When the pointer is directly on a number such as one (1) (see center diagram), then read it as 1 if the pointer on the next dial immediately to the right has passed zero (0). However, if it is zero (0), if the pointer on that dial to the right has not reached zero.

Always read from left to right: 9-3-1-5. If, however, the pointer on the second dial from the right is between 9 and zero then the center dial would read as a zero.

Now let's read the same meter 24 hours later

After reading is 9-3-1-3-8. Subtracting the first reading, 93115, from the new reading of 93138 — the difference is 23. Thus you would have used 23 kilowatt hours in the 24 hour period.

### Texas Grain Producers Will Elect Four Board Members

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, High Plains Area, will hold its third biennial election on September 15, the terms of four present board members expiring at that time.

Any person within the following counties who is engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced, grain sorghum for commercial purposes, is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and share croppers, if such person is required to pay the assessment that is collected on grain sorghum within the counties:

Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dallam, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Gaines, Hale, Hansford, Hartley, Hockley, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Moore, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Sherman, Swisher, Terry, and Yoakum.

Any person qualifying to vote in the election may have his name placed in nomination for membership on the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board by application to the above organization, signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the election. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date in order to have the names printed on the ballot. Application forms may be

obtained from the TGSPB office, 1708-A 15th Street, Lubbock, 79401.

The election will be held by mail ballot. Ballots will be sent to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election and must be mailed to the TGSPB office in Lubbock before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot by September 2 may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

#### Blackleg Still Killing Calves

Young cattle are still dying in Texas despite an effective vaccine to combat the killer disease called blackleg.

Since a case of the disease doesn't show up every year, most producers won't vaccinate for it until an outbreak occurs.

The disease is caused by spores that live in the soil and are carried by forage grown on contaminated ground. These spores can survive in the soil for many years before showing up again.

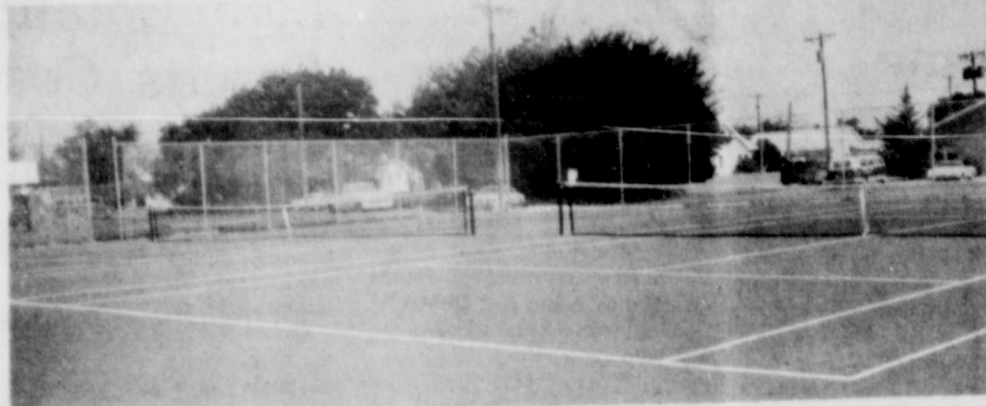
Blackleg is usually the major cause of death in younger cattle. The disease is not transmissible between calves, only through contaminated pasture.

A strict vaccination schedule is the easiest way to protect cattle. Although more common in the fall and winter, blackleg can occur during any season, so lack of immunity is the most probable cause.

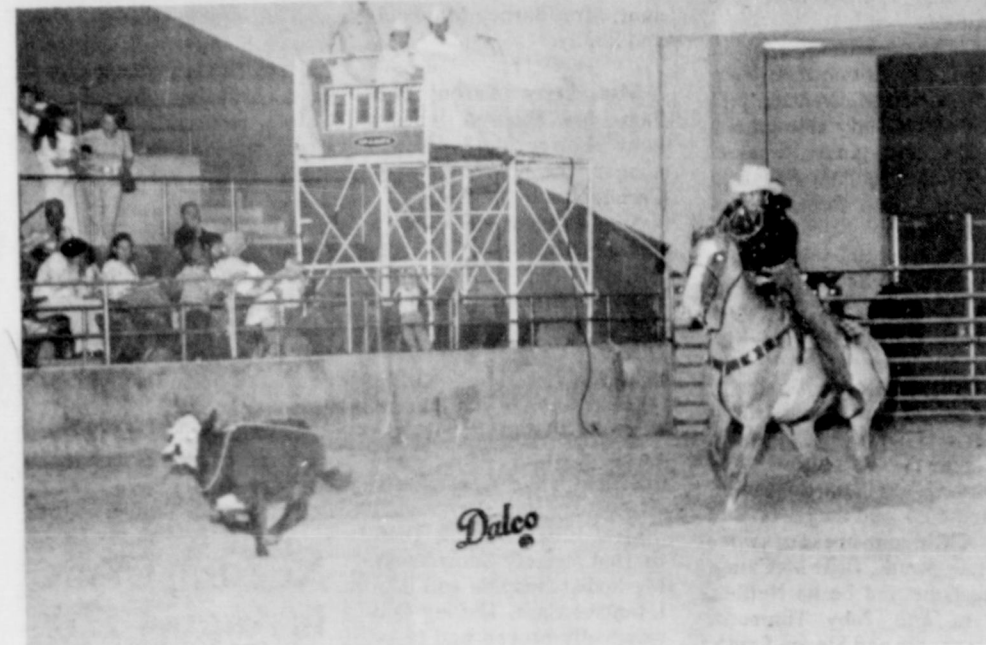
Vaccinations for blackleg should begin when the calf is three or four months of age. Another dose of the vaccine should be administered when the animal is weaned. Calves kept for replacement breeding stock should also be vaccinated regardless of past vaccinations.

Because the blackleg-causing spore also causes malignant edema and Black disease, a multivalent vaccine is available to protect cattle against all these diseases. The vaccine is relatively inexpensive, safe, and potent.

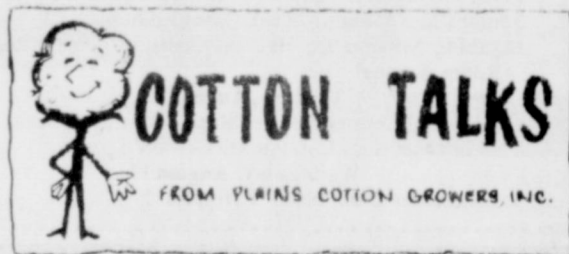

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, will sponsor a 3-day "Dutch treat" textile study tour to the Greensboro, North Carolina area beginning Thursday, September 29, officials have announced.

The tour will feature one and a half days of textile oriented activities and conclude with attendance at the Texas Tech-University of North Carolina football game on Saturday afternoon, October 1.

A charter plane with 95 seats will leave Lubbock Regional Airport at 7:00 a.m. September 29 and return to Lubbock after the Red Raider-Tarheel contest, arriving about 11:30 p.m. October 1.

A dinner for tour participants and local textile executives is planned for Thursday evening "to promote an exchange of ideas between West Texas cotton people and their customers."

The second day, Friday, will be devoted to tours and educational presentations at two Cone Mills' plants. Visited will be Cone's Granite facility, where cotton corduroy is manufactured, and the company's White Oak plant, said to be the world's largest integrated denim manufacturing operation. Tour participants will see all processes involved in taking raw fiber from the bale to the finished product.

About mid-morning Saturday, the group will depart for Chapel Hill, North Carolina and the 1:30 p.m. football game. Box lunches will be served enroute and reserved seat tickets will be provided.

After the game a stop will be made for a "victory dinner" and departure for Lubbock will follow. Interested parties should contact PCG's office in Lubbock for additional details and reservations, Johnson said.

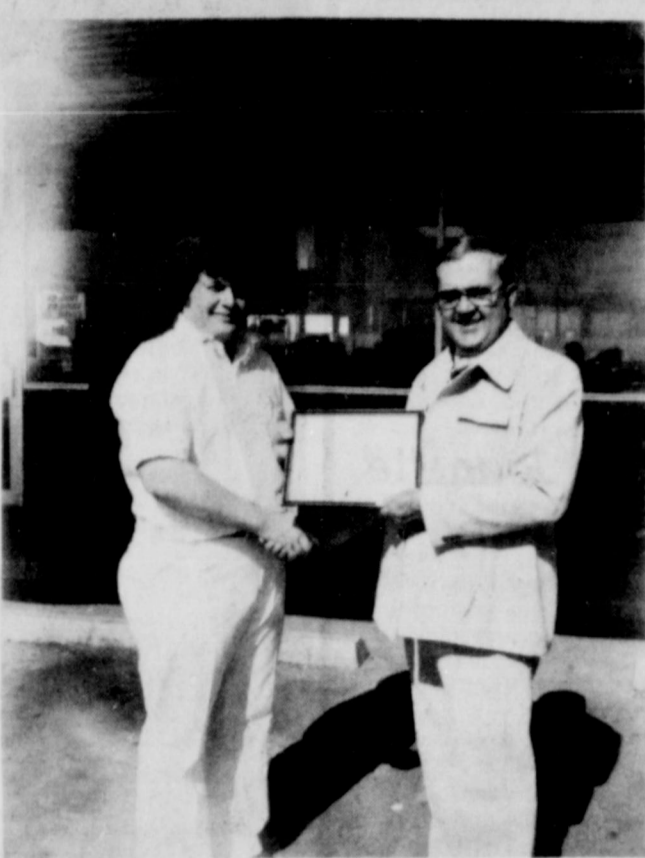

Local people donated only about fifty pints of blood in a recent drive here, and 300 pints, or 25 units a month average, are needed by Lynn County Hospital alone.

Several times in the past, blood has been desperately needed by patients here, the Blood Bank did not have any to release here, and Lynn County Hospital had to hunt among Lubbock and area hospitals before finding blood for a patient. Sufficient blood donations can possibly save a life of some local patient.
