Wilson High, Elementary Will Register Thursday, August 25

Junior High students (sixth, seventh, and eighth grade) at Wilson will register the first day of classes, August 29, but all other students will register on Thursday, August 25.

Those students will observe the following schedule: Elementary (kindergarten through 5th grade), 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.; seniors, 12:30-1:30; juniors, 1:30-2:30; sophomores, 2:30-3:30; and freshmen, 3:30 to 4:30.

Students enrolling in kindergarten or any new students in the elementary school must bring a birth certificate and immunization records will be required for all new students in the Wilson schools.

Also, if a student received immunizations during the summer, he will need to bring his immunization record in order that the school nurse may update records.

The first day of classes for all students will be Monday, August 29.

Sunday Shooting Leaves Two Injured; Suspect Free On Bond

Tahoka policeman Carlos McCleskey investigated a shooting at 12:05 a.m. Sunday, August 14, at the J and J Pool Hall in southeast Tahoka which observers said was the result of a lengthy feud between the parties involved.

Juan Calvillo, Jr. shot Reynaldo Villarreal and Ricardo Valdez Villarreal

and both parties were taken to the local hospital and later transferred to a Lubbock hospital.

Calvillo was arrested and charged with assault with a deadly weapon. He is out on \$1500 bond on each of the two counts with which he was charged. He and both victims are residents of Tahoka.

Giant Fish Fry Set For Saturday At Mini-Park

Minutes, Hours, Days Turn Into 50 Years...For Woods' Jewelry In Tahoka

An advertisement which from the Grapevine school yearbook tells about one A. F. Woods' optometry business, along with his watch and phonograph repair business. A copy of the ad is framed and hangs on the wall in C. N. Woods' Jewelry Store in Tahoka and it calls to mind many memories for C. N. (Shorty) Woods, a resident and businessman in Tahoka for "nigh on to 50 years."

Shorty Woods was born at Grapevine in 1903, the second of the three children of the A. F. Woods, and it was there that he started to school and started his lifelong profession--that of a watchmaker and watch repairman. He was a vital part of his father's business by the time he was seven years old and when he was ten, the family moved to Haskell.

At the ripe old age of twelve, he was repairing phonographs and clocks and when he was fourteen, his father was teaching him gold soldering and watch repair.

In 1921, the Woods family moved to Lubbock and the elder Mr. Woods was "the first cut-rate optometrist there," according to his industrious son. "Why, he sold double-vision glasses for \$19.95 and single visions for \$14.95," he marvels now.

"Long about that time, Walter Bond, an employee over at Haney Drug, told the jeweler over at Thomas Brothers Drug about a young lady over at Brownfield--someone Bond wanted Woods to meet. Her name was Phalba Johnson, and her dad was a Baptist preacher, D. D. Johnson.

They did meet, and on September 29, 1929, he made a binding contract with the preacher's daughter and the two of them will celebrate their 48th wedding anniversary this September.

In 1935, Woods purchased the jewelry stock and fixtures from Thomas Brothers and moved down the block and around the corner to different quarters, in the old bank building.

Years went by and the bank expanded. "Business was at an all-time high in Tahoka in the late 1940's and, in order to obtain another building, I had to buy an entire shoe repair business just to get the building," he said. That is the present location of the store, on the west side of the square, and Woods Jewelry has occupied that spot since 1950.

Shorty Woods has seen good times and he has seen bad times, in his lifetime. He bemoans the fact that parents do not keep their children busy and fail to teach them how to work. "No wonder it's hard for kids to get a job; they've not been taught how to do anything," he says.

1977-78 Budget Approved By Tahoka's Board of Education

At the regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Education of Tahoka Independent School District on Thursday night, August 11, the 1977-78 budget was approved, as was the employment of three additional staff members.

Luther Cassler will be teaching girls' physical education and health and will be 7th and 8th-grade boys' coach; Loyd Scott will teach history and be an assistant coach; and Gale Stephens will be a kindergarten teacher.

Board members also voted to raise the graduation requirement from nine quarters to eleven quarters of English.

In other action, substitute-teacher pay was raised to \$22 per day and the price of students' lunches was set at

50 cents, 75 cents for school personnel, and \$1.00 for non-school people.

Resignations were accepted from Clarence Law and Miss Karen Elder.

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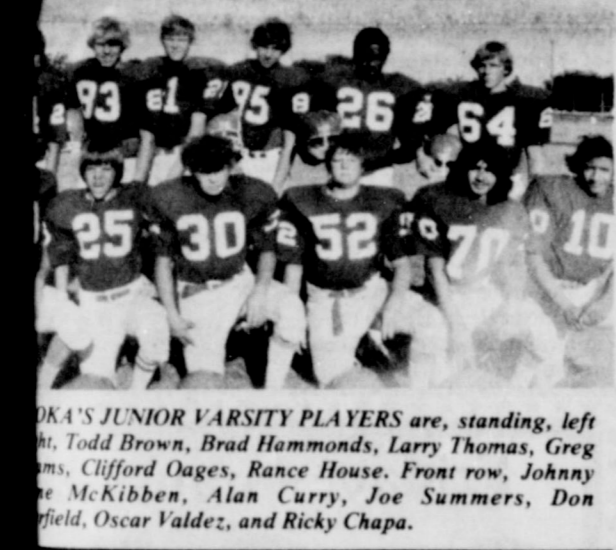

Keep your medicine cabinet stocked. Dr. Max Benis, of UCLA medical school, recommends keeping sterile gauze, tape, bacitracin antibiotic ointment, Chlor-trimeton (to stop itching) and an antibiotic soap handy. For insect stings; wash the wound with soap, apply bacitracin (to combat infection) and cover with gauze. If swelling or signs of allergy appear, call a doctor immediately. Contact with poison ivy and oak should be cleansed 2 or 3 times a day with soap. If the condition lasts longer than a week, see a physician. For heat exhaustion; rest, take cold showers and salt tablets to get the salt back into your system. For open blisters, apply bacitracin and gauze. Simple remedies work in many cases but any time complications arise, see your doctor.

Wilson Lions Sponsor Blood Drive

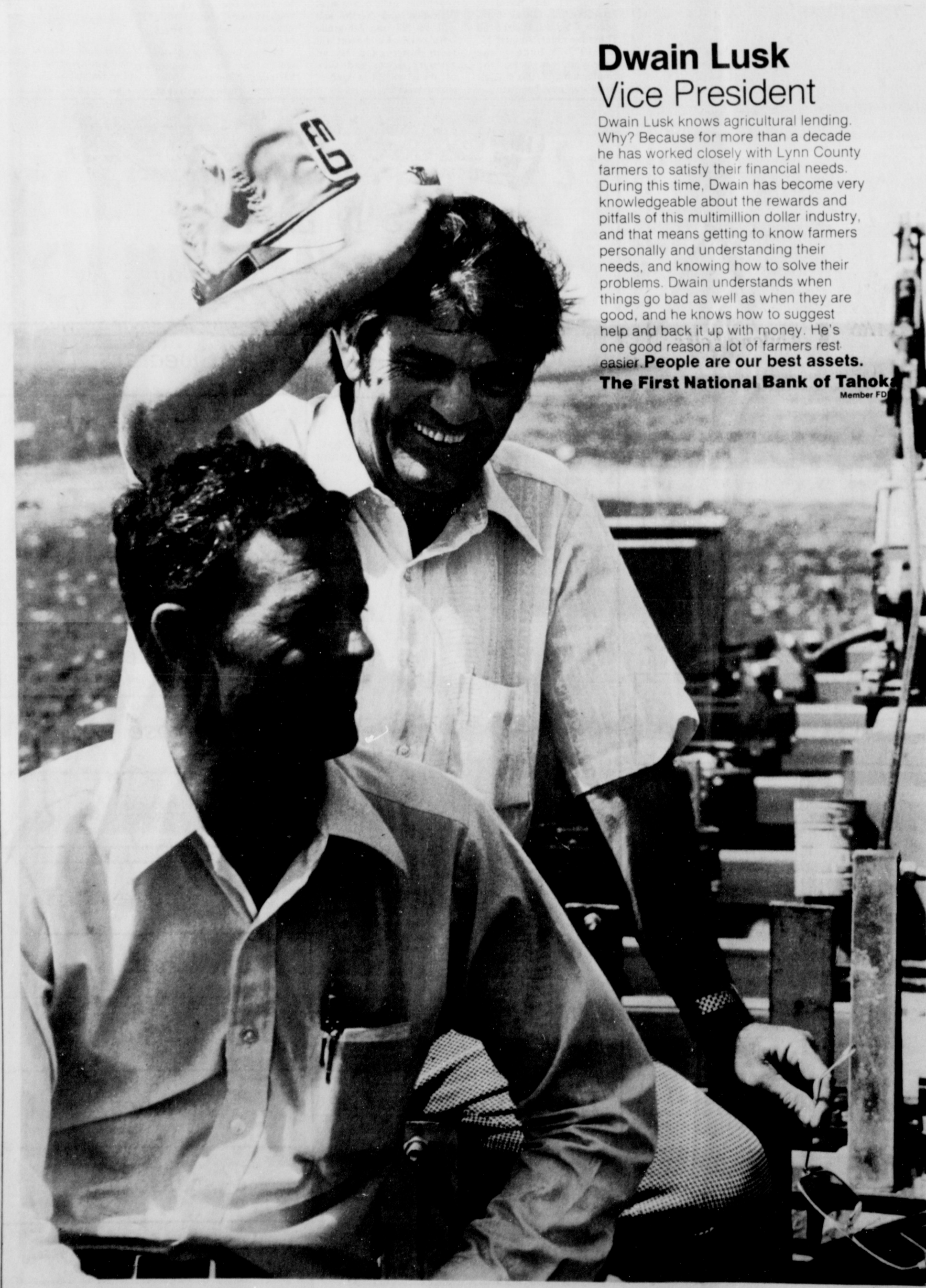

Lunch Program Guidelines**

Guidelines for free and reduced-price lunches in effect for Tahoka Schools during the 1977-78 school year have been approved. Reduced-price lunches sell for 20 cents. Any family may apply at any time for either free or reduced-price lunches.

Tahoka ISD will not participate in the breakfast program during 1977-78, but does plan to have the breakfast program during the 1978-79 school year.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the income scale below are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Those children eligible for free lunches are also eligible for an extra carton of free milk. This extra milk is available during afternoon break in Tubb Elementary School. All students in grades 4-12 who receive free lunches are eligible for an extra carton of milk with their meal at no additional charge. Students on reduced-price lunches are not eligible for an extra carton of free milk.

If the family income is greater than shown on the scale below, but you have unusually high medical bills or shelter cost, special education expense, disaster or casualty expenses, your children may still qualify for free or reduced-price lunches.

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for these benefits. Anyone having foster children in their homes may apply for free or reduced-price meals.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, some adult member of the family should submit an application to the office of Tubb Elementary School between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. on any school work day, starting Monday, August 22.

The school will let you know within 10 days whether or not your children are eligible for free or reduced-price lunches. If you do not agree with the school's decision, you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling Jim Coulston, Superintendent of Tahoka Schools, at 998-4538, or by writing him at P.O. Box 1230, Tahoka, Texas 79373. All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay, and lunch tickets are disbursed to all students at the same location in each building. In operation of the child feeding program, no child is discriminated against because of race, creed, or color.

The Tahoka School lunchroom serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy a lunch for 50 cents and may buy an extra carton of milk for 5 cents. Adults who work for the school may buy a lunch for 75 cents while other adults may purchase a lunch for \$1.00. Any adult may purchase an extra carton of milk for 11 cents.

Federal guidelines stipulate that one carton of milk be served with each meal, and that no food be taken out of the lunchroom.
