Tech Student Speaks To Rotary Club

Using the subject "It's About Time," Joel Green, a senior majoring in agriculture at Texas Tech, in a talk before Tahoka Rotary Club last Thursday, pointed out some of the problems of the farmer and life in general in these troubled times.

We need to educate the public and especially our leaders in Washington on the importance of agriculture to our nation. To illustrate the ignorance of many Washington bureaucrats in the field of agriculture, he told of an important figure in the capitol who declared, "We need to shorten the gestation period of the cow so we can breed more cattle.

In other remarks, he declared, "It's time to help one another...It's time to dream, to hope, to act, to build...Without vision, people will perish.

Dr. K. R. Durham, who arranged the talk and introduced the speaker, said Mr. Green was reared at Cooper, has been outstanding in FFA work and as a student at Tech, lives at Welch, is doing his practice teaching in Brownfield High School, and plans to become a Methodist minister.

Buying Toys For Children Christmas is almost here.

and children are making requests by the dozen. There are so many toys and games for children that it becomes a problem to choose toys and games which are suitable for a child. Nothing is more exasperating on Christmas morning than getting a game that only a college graduate can play--except maybe not having batteries for a toy.

The lists below are suggested toys and games for children of all ages. Children may like some of all of these at each age. Just because the toy isn't included for that age group, don't rule it out. Often the only difference is the level of difficulty.

Infancy (up to one year): Bath toys and sponges, crib mobiles, music boxes, rubber squeeze toys and balls, teething toys, texture pad.

Toddlerhood (one to two years): Baby walker, blocks, climbing aparatus, hammering sets, hardbound or cloth books, push and pull toys, sandbox and implements.

Two to Three Years: Art supplies (paint, playdough, etc.), blackboard, building blocks, bulletin board, equipment for outdoors, housekeeping toys, large picture books, lotto games, magnifying glass, painting easel, put-together toys, rhythm instruments, simple puzzles, transportation toys.

Three to Four Years: Balancing boards, blunt scissors, climbing apparatus, housekeeping furniture. pegboard and pegs, puzzles, records, table and chair sets, tools, tricycle, unbreakable dishes, wagons, zoo and farm animals.

Four to Six years: Note: The older pre-schooler will like many of the toys he liked when he was younger, only now he will find more creative and imaginative ways to use them. Ant farm, child's reference books, construction toys, equipment for store play, garden equipment, playhouse, puppet stages and puppets, simple board games, unusual live animals.

Energy-One More Reason For Tune-Ups

For the Lynn County which you take to your pharfarmer who hasn't figured his fuel bill lately, he may be in for quite a surprise. Growing fuel costs make management even if we weren't facing a fuel shortage.

Simple engine tune-ups can help keep escalating fuel ask for its return or for a copy? costs to a minimum. A recent study of 50 sparkignition tractors showed that a simple tune-up decreased the fuel consumption by more than 14 percent.

Such a tune-up includes maintenance and adjustment of air cleaner, ignition system, timing, carburetor and governor.

Spark-ignition engines should have a frequent tune-up for the sake of power efficiency as well as fuel conservation. Spark



For the northern Texas counties, the hardy Scotch pine and the Norway pine do well. The Colorado blue spruce and a variety of junipers also make interesting living Christmas trees.

After you have chosen your tree, some basic helpful hints will keep it thriving through the holidays and will prepare it for planting later.

To keep your tree fresh, water twice weekly and use pine bark, peat moss or a similar media to retain the moisture around the root

A living tree should not remain in the house for more than two weeks. Placing the tree in a cool location of about 65 degrees F. will keep it fresh and reduce the shock of relocation after the

One should place the root ball in a leakproof container or wrap the ball in a polyethylene film such as a arge trash bag. Such a bag can also be placed under the tree's tub or box to prevent moisture damage to the




