Tahoka Stock Show All Set

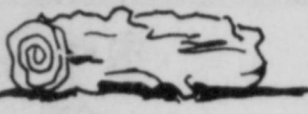

Two File For City Council

Two city of Tahoka council members whose terms are scheduled to expire this year have filed for re-election, filing on Monday, the first day for city and school filings in the county.

Terms of Jim Solomon, Richard White and James Roberts are scheduled to expire this year, and White and Solomon have filed for re-election.

Any persons interested in filing for city council may do

so from now up to a month before the election, which is scheduled for April 5.

School board and hospital board candidates also may file now, at the school business office, or at the Lynn County Hospital.

The city council met Monday afternoon and set March 3, 7:30 p.m. as the time for opening bids on street improvements in the city, a project to be paid for by a 1979 Community

Development Block Grant from the federal government, approved for \$500,000. An estimated 25 blocks in the city are to be paved, with another 40 or more blocks of caliche surfacing planned in what has been designated loser income portions of the city.

Former Tahoka Woman Recalls War's Horrors

A former Tahoka resident who has been there firmly opposes any plans to put women on the front line in combat. Mrs. Claudia Palmer of Vernon, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. I.M. Draper of Tahoka, recently was interviewed by Orlin Brewer of the Vernon Daily Record about her experiences as Maj. Claudia Draper, U.S. Army Nurse Corps in Europe during World War II.

According to the story, Mrs. Palmer, now a registered nurse, for years didn't want to talk about her experiences, and only in the last year or so has been speaking to civic groups with some of the details. Brewer wrote:

"The horror of those days in World War II during the Battle of the Bulge when a thousand maimed and dying American GIs a day passed through the school gymnasium admitting room of the field hospital where she worked, frequently on her knees at cot level, still floods her eyes with tears.

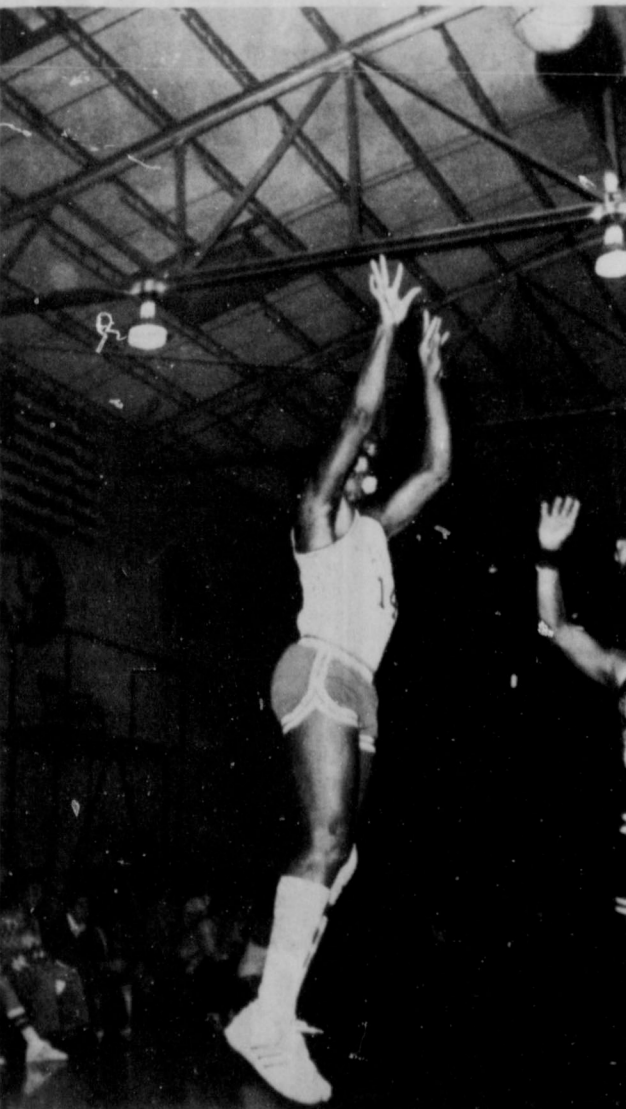
"For Claudia Palmer, head nurse for an Army Field hospital and later chief nurse of a hospital center that included 10 general hospitals and two station hospitals, the memories will never be erased."

The story describes many of Mrs. Palmer's experiences, including one instance of a

German shell destroying part of the building in which she was sleeping.

Mrs. Palmer considers that anyone favoring putting women into combat situations as part of the demands of women for equal rights simply is ignorant of the facts.

"She admits that it may be her opposition to the Equal Rights Amendment, based primarily on her wartime experiences, that may have made her finally willing to talk about the past," Brewer wrote.

Grand Jury Here Indicts Seven

Two persons were indicted on charges on attempted murder and four others on burglary charges as a 106th Dist. Grand Jury met in Tahoka Monday to consider cases presented by Dist. Atty Joe Smith of Seminole.

In addition, Charles Austin, accused in the June 1978 robbery of Woods Jewelry in Tahoka, was given a new enhanced aggravated robbery indictment in connection with that offense. Austin

was returned to Tahoka from California last year and still is in county jail here, apparently unable to post bond on \$25,000.

David Mendez, 22, of Wilson and Michael DeLeon, 21, of Tahoka were indicted on attempted murder charges. Mendez is accused in a shooting incident involving Robert Bacilio Garcia at Wayside Gin Jan. 6. DeLeon is accused of trying to kill Johnny Calvillo in a stabbing incident on New Year's Day in Tahoka.

a habitation were Rongelio Ramos Rodriguez and Ernest Lugo Rodriguez, accused in connection with burglaries of homes of Allen Lester last August and W.J. Kahl and B.L. Miller east of Tahoka on Sept. 4.

The grand jury, with Floyd Heck of Wilson as foreman, no-billed two persons accused. One was accused of aggravated assault and the other of a charge of "hindering secured credit."

Case Deferred

The jury passed until next term any action on two Tahoka High School students accused of criminal mischief in connection with damage to tractors owned by Mrs. Othell Meeks in January.

In current law enforcement activity, Tahoka Police Dept. investigated one wreck and one theft during the week and Lynn County Sheriff's Office checked on burglary and theft reports.

Last Saturday, Lynn Cook, Brownfield Hwy., reported theft of his wife's purse from their home. The purse contained credit cards and an undetermined amount of cash.

Last Wednesday near Ave. O on Lockwood a 1973 Chevrolet pickup driven by Danny J. Stanley of Tahoka skidded on the icy street into a parked 1975 Chevrolet owned by David Jolley of Tahoka.

Theft At Farm

Bert McDonald told sheriff's deputies last Thursday that five John Deere front tractor weights, some iron sweeps and other items, irrigation tubes and assorted tools had been stolen 9.5 miles east of Tahoka. And on Friday Robert Lee Hagler of Slaton reported a shop building two miles north and a half mile west of Gordon had been burglarized. Missing were items valued at a total of \$1,075, including a welder, land transit, electric drill and press, antique International cream separator, antique trunk, gasoline engine and pump, and three camper trailer jacks.

A DPS officer and sheriff's deputy Tuesday arrested a 24-year-old Los Angeles man in a stolen car 14 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87. The 1974 Chevrolet was reported stolen in Colorado, and the man was held in jail here for Colorado authorities.

On Feb. 5, Tahoka's Varsity Basketball teams played the Seminole Indians at Seminole.

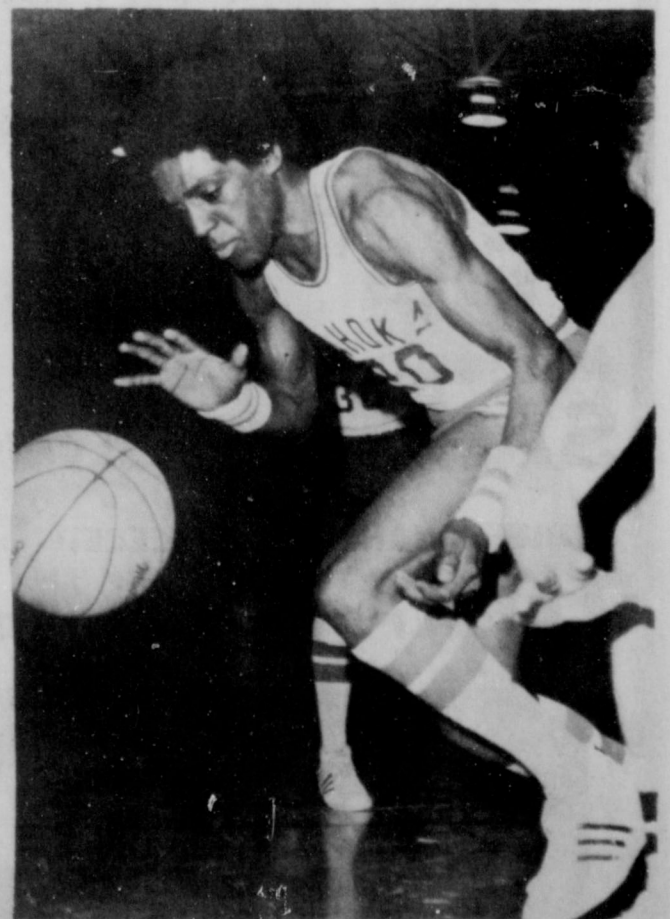
The varsity boys gave Seminole a rough time, leading 26-23 at halftime and raising that to a 40-33 lead at the start of the last quarter. The Indians came back on

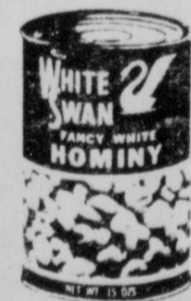

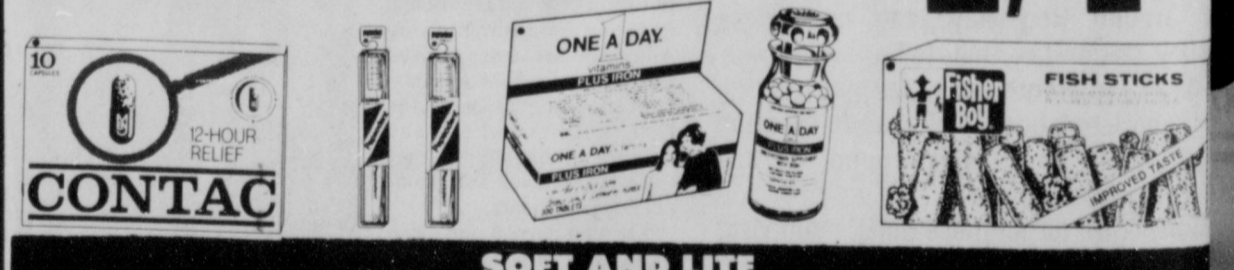

Rudd To Run For Re-Election To Legislature

State Rep. Jim Rudd of Brownfield has announced he will seek re-election to the Texas House of Representatives, District 77. The district encompasses Andrews, Gaines, Hockley, Lynn, Martin, Terry and Yoakum Counties in West Texas.

Democrat Rudd is presently serving as vice chairman for the Security and Sanctions Committee of the House. During the interim he is serving as chairman of several subcommittees dealing with oversight functions of state agencies. One of these agencies which has come under considerable scrutiny from Rudd's committee has been the Commission of Jail Standards. Recently Rudd's subcommittee toured the new and old county jail facilities in Lubbock County, and the county jail in Garza County. "The subcommittee," said Rudd, "will look into some of the standards used by the Jail Standards Commission to determine whether or not they are truly in the best interest of the jails, counties, and prisoners in light of recent federal rulings."

Rudd also serves on the powerful Appropriations Committee where he is chairman of the subcommittee on agency operation. This subcommittee will be looking into various aspects of the appropriation process and how it relates to the employees' functions. Rudd stated that he has enjoyed serving this district

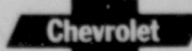

These cookers have a low wattage wrap-around heating element which cooks all day without burning the food. Or cook a sausage casserole all night and have it for breakfast. Most dishes cook from eight to ten hours on low setting.

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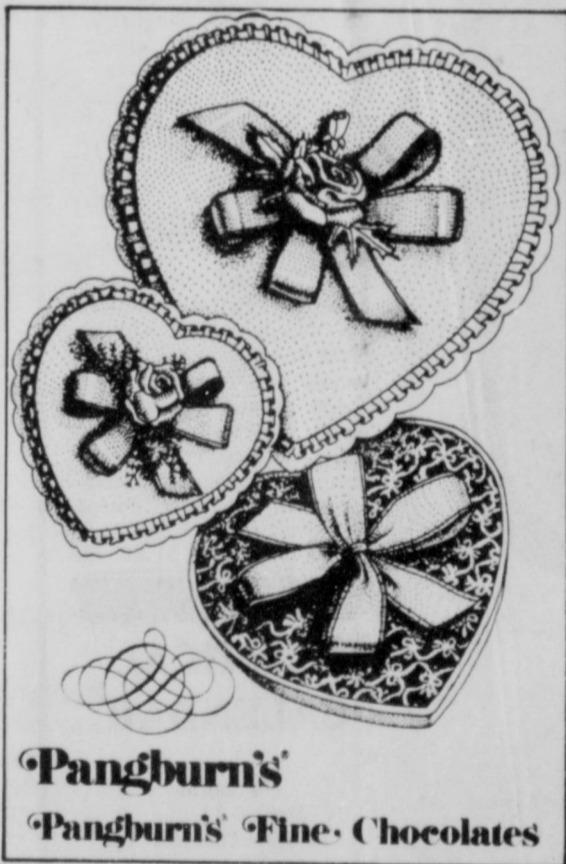

SBA Reports More Disaster Counties

On Jan. 24, the Small Business Administration amended the declaration of disaster loan area #1744 by including Briscoe, Foard, Garza and LaSalle Counties and their adjacent counties within the State of Texas.

The adjacent counties are Swisher, Armstrong, Donley, Hall, Floyd, Motley, Cottle, Hardeman, Wilbarger, Lubbock, Crosby, Dickens, King, Knox, Baylor, Lynn, Kent, Borden, Scurry, Zavala, Frio, Atascosa, Dimmitt, McMullen and Webb.

This action is the result of natural disasters of excessive wind and hail occurring in Briscoe County on Sept. 1, 1979, and Sept. 10 through 29, 1979; drought occurring in Foard County on Sept. 1, 1979 through Dec. 3, 1979; extreme drought and grasshopper infestation occurring in Garza County on July 1, 1979 through Nov. 9, 1979; and drought occurring in LaSalle County on July 1, 1979 through Jan. 4, 1980.

Other counties covered under declaration #1744 are Andrews, Dallas, Deaf Smith, Oldham, Sherman and their adjacent counties.

Filing deadline for Physical damage under #1744 is June 26, 1980 and September 26, 1980 for Economic Injury.

The Small Business Disaster Loan Office in Lubbock will process loan applications for #1744.

Weather Slows Final Ginning

Last week's general ice and snow storm slowed cotton movement from field stored modules to area gins, according to Paul R. Dickson, Area Director for the Texas High Plains Cotton Division offices.

Sample receipts at the four High Plains offices averaged about 11,000 per day this week compared to about 17,000 per day a week earlier Dickson said.

High Plains Cotton Division offices graded 51,000 samples during the week ended January 31. This brought the season's total to 2,304,000, according to USDA's Agriculture Marketing Service. About 1,788,000 had been graded by this date one year

ago. Predominant grades for the week were grade 32 at 21 percent and grade 42 at 39 percent. About 10 percent were reduced one grade because of bark.

Predominant staples were staple 30 - 30 percent, staple 31 - 39 percent and staple 32 - 18 percent.

Micronaire 30 - 32 percent, 27 - 29 accounted for 39 percent while mike 26 or below amounted to nine percent of the samples classed.

Average fiber breaking strength was 84,000 pounds per square inch for the samples tested.

Prices paid growers continued to advance. Mixed lots of mostly mikes 30-32 sold around 1475 points over 1975 loan rates - up about 75 points from a week earlier. Mixed lots of mostly mikes 27 - 29 brought about 1125 points over loan - up about 150 points.

Trading in the Lubbock spot cotton market was moderate to active early in the week

but slowed after mid-week. Gins paid growers \$95 to \$115 per ton for cottonseed.

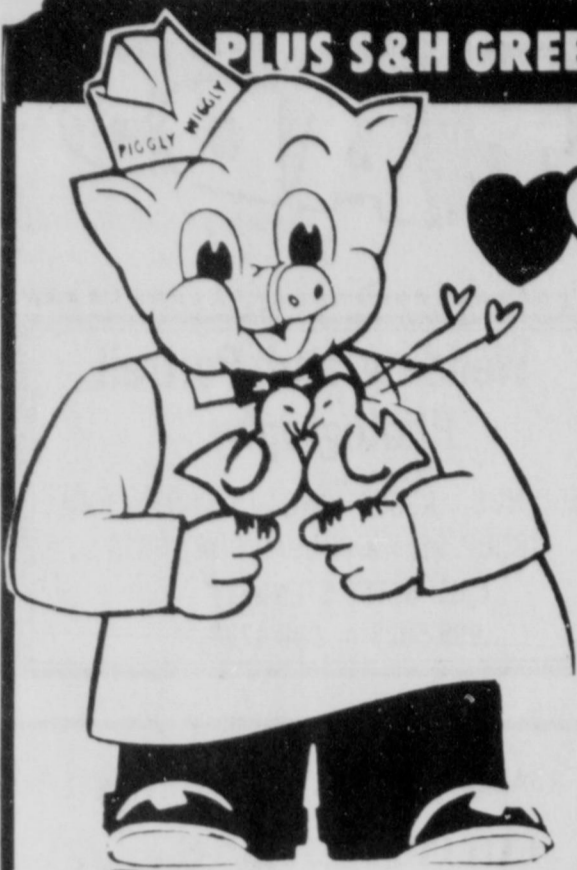
