

ed will have to be levied this year to meet rising costs and loss of income from several sources, and to pay for a deficit in this year's budget which is expected to be more than \$50,000.

Resignations were accepted from basketball and tennis coach Mike Williamson, from football assistant Paul Pierce, kindergarten teacher Nancy Brackett and third grade teacher Suzanne Franklin. Williamson will be head basketball coach at Gainesville High School and Pierce is entering private business.

Dean Minor, now at Memphis, Texas, was hired as head basketball coach at a salary \$4,000 above state schedule.

Larry Prather, who has been band director at Dimmitt for one year, was hired as band director. The Dimmitt band had a Division I rating last year, and Prather's bands at Tulia High School won Division I ratings and Sweepstakes. He also had high ratings with bands at Spearman, where he was director before going to Dimmitt.

SFA Graduate

Minor, 37, is a graduate of Stephen F. Austin College and Corona, N.M. High School. He coached the last two years at Class A Memphis, where his basketball team was state semifinalist this year, with a 29-4 record, and was district co-champion last year. He also coached the secondary in football and coached district championship golf

At Roosevelt High School in 1977-78 his team had a 22-5 record and was rated fourth in state in Class AA.

With all trustees present, the school board voted to buy a new boiler at a cost of \$7533 to replace a worn-out boiler in the gym. The boiler is considered no longer repairable and also a possible hazard. Another \$7500 or more is needed to replace pipes and accessories to the boiler, but the board decided to wait until later on

so children could get more individual attention. Board President Bob Haney and Supt. Jim Coulston pointed out that the number of kindergarten classes cannot be established for next year until the enrollment figure is determined.

The group apparently had heard that some cutback was planned in the kindergarten program, although they never said so, and school officials said no such plan had even been discussed.

Haney did point out that the district is facing severe financial problems. "We're losing money three ways--on average daily attendance (ADA), on transportation and on inflation, and the local taxpayers have to absorb the loss," he said. Board members warned the visitors that "taxes will be going up, because everyone knows it takes more money to operate anything these days." It was noted that school taxes have not been raised in the last three years.

Commend Board

The parents commended the board for its attitude of making education of the pupils the main objective.

The financial outlook for the district was not rosy. Business Manager David Roberson presented a sheet estimating a possible deficit of \$82,000 at the end of the current year Aug. 31, but Coulston said this was a high figure, and said that hopefully the deficit will be closer to \$52,000.

The school loses on average

daily attendance because the ADA has been declining steadily in Tahoka Schools in recent years. The amount of money received from the state for paying teachers and for other items is determined by the number of pupils going to classes, and state funds next year will be cut by about \$23,000 on this yardstick alone. This and other costs will have to be paid locally, since the school does not plan to cut back basic programs.

Other new costs faced by the district include \$31,000 for the tax reappraisal ordered by the state, several thousand dollars estimated for operation of the new tax office, and major increases in many areas because of

Costs Soaring

Much of this year's anticipated deficit is blamed on runaway inflation which sent costs soaring higher than had been estimated when the budget was made out last year. For example, Roberson said, gasoline costs were budgeted last year at \$11,500, and just through May 1, with four months to go. \$16,710 had been spent for gasoline.

Roberson also said that tax collections, normally at about 98 per cent, have been runing about 94 per cent.

The district also lost about \$45,000 in tax revenue from the new state-mandated homestead and over-65 tax exemptions.

Board members commented that this proves that the so-called "tax relief" a mendment voted by the state actually is relief only for those who qualify for the exemptions, and that the burden of the lost revenue simply is shifted to those who don't qualify.

May I Pour You An Egg? Yes, the "Incredible" egg can be made into surprisingly delicious concoctions to drink, such as an eye-opener for the morning after, a soup for lunch or supper, as a refreshing punch for the patio scenario this spring and, of course, egg nog.

You come out ahead economically, too--because egg supplies are up, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture marketing specialists. Concurrently, prices should be declining, which is traditional after Easter. They usually reach their seasonal low in June.

When you serve egg drinks, you are serving important nutrients. Besides containing high-quality protein, eggs are an important source of vitamins A, D, E, K and B-complex, and minerals, especially iron. This makes them valuable energy-packed pick-me-ups for this more active time of the year.

Get Your Office Supplies At Lynn County News

Here's what those nutrients

do for you: Protein--Enzymes, which control processes that keep the body working, are made of protein. Protein also is part of the hemoglobin molecule in red blood cells that carries oxygen into the system. And antibodies in the blood stream that fight off disease and infection also are protein. Another important use of protein in the body is to build the muscle tissue which holds the bone structure together and provides the strength to move and work.

Vitamin A .- This vitamin plays a very important role in eye function, and in keeping the skin and mucous membranes resistant to infection.

Vitamin D--Without Vitamin D, the body cannot absorb the calcium supplied by food. So the vitamin is very important in building strong bones and teeth-especially throughout the growth period.

Vitamin E--Although its exact role in the body is not fully understood, Vitamin E is known to be essential. A deficiency of the vitamin in the diet of various animals has resulted in muscular dystrophy and sterility.

Vitamin K--Important in the manufacture of a substance that helps blood to clot.

B-Vitamins -- One of the most important roles of this group of vitamins is maintenance of functions of the nervous system and the digestive system. This group also helps maintain normal hemoglobin, the substance in blood which carries oxygen to the tissues; and helps maintain a healthy skin.





Census manager Ms. Jordan, explained that in many rural areas and smaller communities, census questionnaires were not delivered by mail on March 28 to some persons holding post office boxes or with a General Delivery address. Because the Census Bureau uses the 'Enumeration district' or physical area in which a household is located as its basis for counting, all questionnaires must have a code number showing this location. Where it was not possible to pinpoint a residence's location using only the post office box, forms could not be coded or

In those cases where census forms were not delivered by mail, a census taker should have called on the household during this first follow-up operation. Any persons who have not yet been contacted by a census taker, and who did not fill out the 1980 census questionnaire, are urged to call the district census office in Lubbock at (806) 762-7511, giving their name, address and phone number. A census taker will then call to assure that every individual is counted in the census.

A second follow-up phase of the 1980 census begins at the end of May and involves contacting households that returned incomplete questionnaires, additional checks on residence that had earlier been reported as "vacant" and further attempts to reach households not already counted. Because Census Day was April 1, all information given to the Census Bureau should show the status of the household on that date.

Post Office Boosts Stamp Collecting

The Postal Service will launch a new program this month designed to acquaint its customers with the educational benefits of stamp collecting.

Tahoka Postmaster Jim Lummus said the campaign, called "Collect the Spirit of America", will focus on stamps issued in recent years that commemorate various aspects of American life and history. "Our window clerks will be showing our various philatelic products to customers and answering questions about stamp collecting," the postmaster said.

Philatelic products offered by the Postal Service during

the two-week campaign include **Stamps & Stories**, a 256-page book designed to introduce non-collectors to stamp collecting.

Other products include the 1978 and 1979 Mint Sets containing all commemorative and special stamps issued by the Postal Service during those years. New collectors can also obtain several topical stamp collecting kits being offered during the program.

Lummus explained that stamp collecting has become the world's most popular hobby, attracting more than 20 million collectors in the United States alone.
