### Coach, Band Director Hired

#### By DALTON WOOD

Tahoka school board last Thursday night accepted four resignations and voted to hire two faculty members, including a basketball coach and a new band director.

In a busy session that went past midnight, the board also heard from a group of kindergarten-age parents who said they were in favor of continuing the type of kindergarten program now in effect with smaller classes, approved student transfers and an ESEA Title I agreement, voted to buy a new boiler and discussed the budget for next year along with the financial picture for the current year.

#### Tax Boost Due

Hanging over all the discussions was the spectre of a substantial tax increase

which board members agreed will have to be levied this year to meet rising costs and loss of income from several sources, and to pay for a deficit in this year's budget which is expected to be more than \$50,000.

Resignations were accepted from basketball and tennis coach Mike Williamson, from football assistant Paul Pierce, kindergarten teacher Nancy Brackett and third grade teacher Suzanne Franklin. Williamson will be head basketball coach at Gainesville High School and Pierce is entering private business.

Dean Minor, now at Memphis, Texas, was hired as head basketball coach at a salary \$4,000 above state schedule.

Larry Prather, who has been band director at Dimmitt for one year, was hired as band director. The Dimmitt band had a Division I rating last year, and Prather's bands at Tulia High School won Division I ratings and Sweepstakes. He also had high ratings with bands at Spearman, where he was director before going to Dimmitt.

#### SFA Graduate

Minor, 37, is a graduate of Stephen F. Austin College and Corona, N.M. High School. He coached the last two years at Class A Memphis, where his basketball team was state semi-finalist this year, with a 29-4 record, and was district co-champion last year. He also coached the secondary in football and coached district championship golf teams.

At Roosevelt High School in 1977-78 his team had a 22-5 record and was rated fourth in state in Class AA.

With all trustees present, the school board voted to buy a new boiler at a cost of \$7533 to replace a worn-out boiler in the gym. The boiler is considered no longer repairable and also a possible hazard. Another \$7500 or more is needed to replace pipes and accessories to the boiler, but the board decided to wait until later on this.

#### Transfers Okayed

Transfers of six students into the district were approved. Two are from the Southland district, two from Lubbock, and one each from Post and O'Donnell. Also approved was rehiring of eight cafeteria employees.

Beth Huffaker acted as spokesperson for the group of eight parents of children in beginning grades, as the group asked that kinder-

garten classes be kept small so children could get more individual attention. Board President Bob Haney and Supt. Jim Coulston pointed out that the number of kindergarten classes cannot be established for next year until the enrollment figure is determined.

The group apparently had heard that some cutback was planned in the kindergarten program, although they never said so, and school officials said no such plan had even been discussed.

Haney did point out that the district is facing severe financial problems. "We're losing money three ways—on average daily attendance (ADA), on transportation and on inflation, and the local taxpayers have to absorb the loss," he said. Board members warned the visitors that "taxes will be going up, because everyone knows it takes more money to operate anything these days." It was noted that school taxes have not been raised in the last three years.

#### Commend Board

The parents commended the board for its attitude of making education of the pupils the main objective.

The financial outlook for the district was not rosy. Business Manager David Roberson presented a sheet estimating a possible deficit of \$82,000 at the end of the current year Aug. 31, but Coulston said this was a high figure, and said that hopefully the deficit will be closer to \$52,000.

The school loses on average daily attendance because the ADA has been declining steadily in Tahoka Schools in recent years. The amount of money received from the state for paying teachers and for other items is determined by the number of pupils going to classes, and state funds next year will be cut by about \$23,000 on this yardstick alone. This and other costs will have to be paid locally, since the school does not plan to cut back basic programs.

Other new costs faced by the district include \$31,000 for the tax reappraisal ordered by the state, several thousand dollars estimated for operation of the new tax office, and major increases in many areas because of inflation.

#### Costs Soaring

Much of this year's anticipated deficit is blamed on runaway inflation which sent costs soaring higher than had been estimated when the budget was made out last year. For example, Roberson said, gasoline costs were budgeted last year at \$11,500, and just through May 1, with four months to go, \$16,710 had been spent for gasoline.

Roberson also said that tax collections, normally at about 98 per cent, have been running about 94 per cent.

The district also lost about \$45,000 in tax revenue from the new state-mandated homestead and over-65 tax exemptions.

Board members commented that this proves that the so-called "tax relief" amendment voted by the state actually is relief only for those who qualify for the exemptions, and that the burden of the lost revenue simply is shifted to those who don't qualify.

### Gunshot Winds Up Wild Chase Tuesday

A wild chase of a man driving a stolen pickup covered portions of four counties, including Lynn, early Tuesday, with at least eight units of officers trying to catch and stop the man who must have set a new speed record for the distance from Lubbock to Lamesa.

Two sheriff's units and one city patrol car attempted to stop the man, who ignored all lights and sirens and went around at least one roadblock, driving at speeds "well over 100 miles an hour" before finally being halted 18 miles north of Big Spring after officers shot a tire. There were no injuries in the incident.

The man, who gave an Odessa

address, was jailed at Lamesa after the chase, pending charges of several kinds in several places. The 1977 Chevrolet pickup had been reported stolen at Alvin, near Houston.

It reportedly was only about 40 minutes after the suspect was reported somewhere between Lubbock and Tahoka until he was stopped 18 miles north of Big Spring.

The chase began in Lubbock when the man left a service station without paying for some gasoline. It quickly was learned that the pickup was stolen, but by then the man was headed south like the proverbial bat from the lower regions.

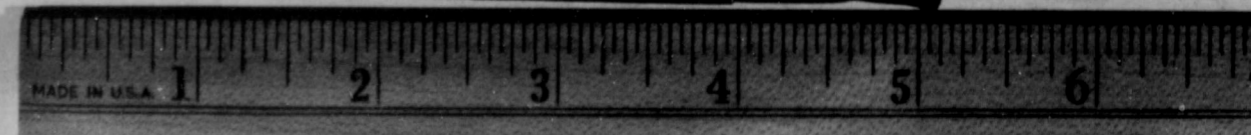

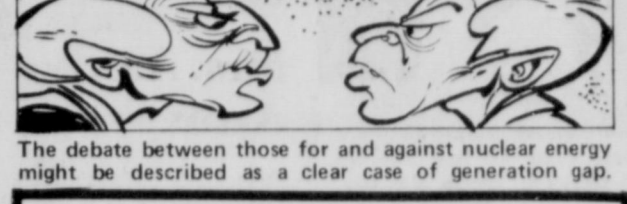

**ACCORDING TO THE BIBLE**



**BIBLE Answers for BIBLE Questions**  
By DOUG CARTER

**Question:** We know according to I Cor. 13 that the "perfect" comes at the "perfect" refer to the second coming of Christ?

**Answer:** The "perfect" does not refer to the coming of Christ. There are several reasons for this. The word *Perfect* in Greek is teleios, which is defined by Arndt and Gingrich's Greek-English Lexicon as "having attained the end or purpose; complete" (P. 816). Thayer's Greek-English Lexicon defines it as "brought to its end, finished, nothing necessary to completeness; perfect" (P. 817). The "perfect" then, refers to the completion of the "part" that Paul mentions in I Cor. 13:9, 10. We can know what the "part" or the "imperfect" is, but we cannot know what the "perfect" is.

The "part" obviously refers to men's knowledge of God's divine revelation. At the time of writing, the only way many people could know God's will was through miraculous giving of message to man by the Holy Spirit.

Now, however, we no longer need such miracles. The "perfect" is here. The perfect then is a revelation to man. His word in written form is the human race (Heb. 2:3, 4; Mk. 16:17; Jn. 20:31). We have that word in the written form of the Bible. We no longer need miracles. The primary purpose of miracles has ceased, and we will discuss that week.

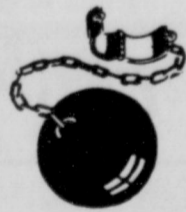

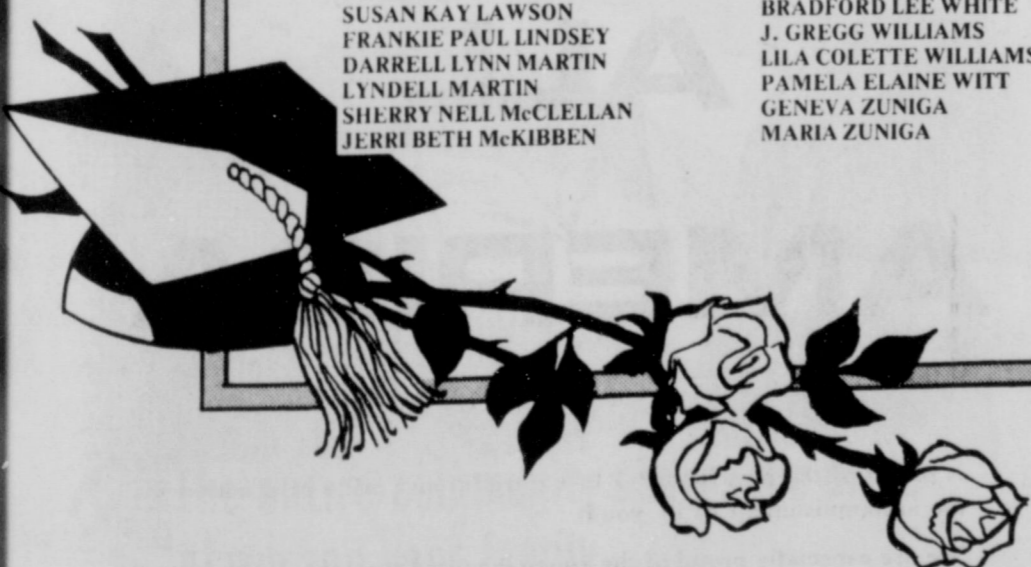

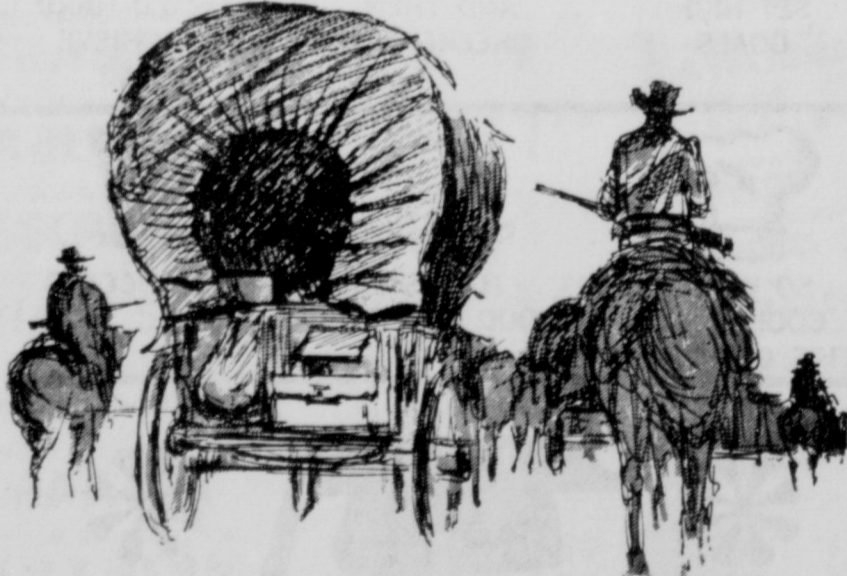

## Census Follow-Up Starts

Census takers in this district are completing the first follow-up operation of the census, which involved

contacting households that had not returned their census questionnaires by mail to the census office.

According to Mitzi Jordan,

district census office manager, census enumerators in each county have been gathering the necessary information from households where the Census Bureau did not receive a mail response. This includes those which did not return their census questionnaires by the April 11 mail deadline as well as some households that did not receive a census form in the mail.

Census manager Ms. Jordan, explained that in many rural areas and smaller communities, census questionnaires were not delivered by mail on March 28 to some persons holding post office boxes or with a General Delivery address. Because the Census Bureau uses the "Enumeration district" or physical area in which a household is located as its basis for counting, all questionnaires must have a code number showing this location. Where it was not possible to pinpoint a residence's location using only the post office box, forms could not be coded or mailed.

In those cases where census forms were not delivered by mail, a census taker should have called on the household during this first follow-up operation. Any persons who have not yet been contacted by a census taker, and who did not fill out the 1980 census questionnaire, are urged to call the district census office in Lubbock at (806) 762-7511, giving their name, address and phone number. A census taker will then call to assure that every individual is counted in the census.

A second follow-up phase of the 1980 census begins at the end of May and involves contacting households that returned incomplete questionnaires, additional checks on residence that had earlier been reported as "vacant" and further attempts to reach households not already counted. Because Census Day was April 1, all information given to the Census Bureau should show the status of the household on that date.

Lummus explained that stamp collecting has become the world's most popular hobby, attracting more than 20 million collectors in the United States alone.

South Plains businesses are receiving calls allegedly from the I.B.M. Co. out of Dallas. The company is offering bargain prices on I.B.M. merchandise "Which is going up in price" after this sale. After checking with the I.B.M. Co. here in Lubbock, we found that this is just another paper pirate scheme. It is especially dangerous since the company states they are with IBM when asked and many people to take the company up on its offer.

Local residents are advised to be on the lookout for a mailout from the Church of the Children of the Desert. This group is offering prizes through bingo by mail. The prize depends on the amount donated to the charity. This organization does not meet during the first seven months of the year.

Agricultural economist Kendall Keith told the board that cotton plantings this year could increase as much as 6% above the 1979 planted acreage. He said adverse weather has hampered planting in some areas, but conditions have been better than last year, so actual planted acreage "could easily" reach the 14.8 million acres projected by USDA in April.

Exports Continue High: Exports of 212,300 running bales of upland cotton during the week ended April 27 brought the season's total to 6,567,400, compared with 4,360,200 a year ago. New sales for the current marketing year delivery were 97,300 bales. Sales of 129,400 bales for 1980-81 delivery included 33,200 to China and 21,300 to Hungary.



**COTTON UPDATE GIVEN**

National Cotton Council directors in their spring board meeting this week heard that the unusually large 1979 cotton crop is being balanced by "equally impressive" strength in markets. Dr. Arlie L. Bowling, NCC director of economic and market research, said the 14.6-million bale crop, added to the carryover from 1978, gave the U.S. a supply of 18.5 million bales.

The largest exports in more than four decades and the increased popularity of denim and corduroy fabrics were among the reasons for cotton's continued strength, Bowling said.

"Although the stability of domestic markets in the face of a slowing economy has been encouraging, the export market is most responsible for the close balance in supply and offtake which developed in 1979," he stated.

Reporting on export promotion, Cotton Council International (CCI) President Dan Miller, Arkansas cotton producer, said that trade teams, overseas cooperative projects, the Maid of Cotton, and other programs will extend into 21 countries
