Lightning, Wind Strike In County

High winds and heavy
rain struck Tahoka and a
broad area of Lynn County
about midnight Saturday,
and the violent thunderstorm
spawned booming thunder, a
lot of lightning, and a
tornado which struck at
Draw. Lightning struck a
farm home about 6 miles
southeast of Tahoka, with
the resulting fire heavily damag-
ing contents of the brick
structure.

The home of Mr. and Mrs.
Mike Orr was struck by
lightning at the height of the
storm. The Orrs were at
home, but were not injured;
however, much of the
contents of the house were
ruined by smoke and water
damage.

The Orrs had returned
home from a sheep sale and
were watching the weather
reports on television when
the bolt struck with a
gigantic blast of sound,
plunging the home into
darkness as the power went
off.

The loud noise woke the
Orrs' son, Scott, 13, and then

Rodeo Slated This Weekend

Two performances of the
Tahoka Rodeo are scheduled
this weekend, with crowning

Edwin Pebsworth, presi-
dent of the Tahoka Rodeo
Assn., said the rodeo has
been sanctioned by the
International Rodeo Assn., a
sanction ordinarily given
only to fully professional
rodeos. The Tahoka Rodeo
also includes amateur riders.

Mike uncovered the opening

Orr said he managed to
call the Tahoka Fire Dept.
before the phone went out of
order, and the firemen
contained the actual blaze to
the attic and roof, leaving the
walls standing. Smoke and
water ruined or damaged
much of the furniture and the
family's clothing, but he said
Sunday that most personal
articles and items of
sentimental value were
saved.

Friends were helping them
sort out salvageable items
Sunday, and the family said
it helped "just to have
friends come around at a
time like this."

A fund for the Orr family
has been started at First
National Bank in Tahoka.

A little further south a
tornado ripped through the
Draw community, destroying
garages and sheds and
taking part of the roof off the
Paymaster Gin and off other
buildings. By some quirk the
gin reportedly was turned on
by the storm and ran until a
breaker was tripped.

Damage was reported to
some homes in the Draw
vicinity, but no homes were
reported destroyed, nor were
any injuries listed. The home
of Ricky Barnes was
damaged at one corner by
the apparent twister.

In addition to taking the
roof off the north end of the
gin, the storm unroofed a
building where gin hands
live during ginning season
and flipped the roof and
walls off a storage building at
the Boyd Barnes home, plus
snapping trees in the
community.

Miraculously the wind
which took the roof and sides
off Barnes' building did not
damage the house or larger
barn just a few feet on either
side of the storage building.

Barnes said there was
about an inch of rain at Draw
after the storm. At the Orr
home, only about .60 was
measured, and in the city of
Tahoka, one gauge measured
1.4.

Considerable damage also
was reported at O'Donnell
Saturday night, when roofs
of several structures were
ripped off or partially lost.

the speaker. Also, a
"mystery guest" will appear
on the program. Harold
Green will be master of
ceremonies. The Museum
will be open, refreshments
will be served, and some
1979-1980 Museum Associa-
tion member will win a \$200
gold charm donated by Dr.
K.R. Durham, Museum

president. Inside the Muse-
um, Mrs. Clay Bennett will
be playing the oldtime pump
organ. Mrs. Madeline
(Pete) Hegi has arranged the
program.

Main event of the
week-end, of course, is the
Pioneer Reunion, to be held
Saturday in the school
cafeteria. Registration will
be in the morning under
supervision of Secretary Beth
Huffaker. People are urged
to come early and spend the
morning visiting with old
friends.

The traditional barbecue
meal will be served at noon,
prepared by "Booger"
Redwine, Maurice Huffaker,
Jim Bob Porterfield and a
large number of assistants.

Following the meal, John
Ed Redwine will be master of
ceremonies for the brief
program including the a-
ward of prizes to the person
coming the greatest distance,
the oldest man, and the
oldest woman who have not
previously won the award.
Also, plaques will be given in
the show window display
contest. Election of new
officers will also be held.

Gattis New Commissioner

Eldon Gattis easily won
the Democratic nomination
for Lynn County commis-
sioner of Precinct 1 in a
runoff race with Melvin
Edwards last Saturday,
getting 260 votes to 130 for
Edwards.

The total vote of 390 in that
precinct was short of the total
560 cast in the precinct in the
first primary, when Gattis,
with 174, and Edwards, with
157, got into a runoff. Three
other candidates at that time

totalled 229 votes.

Gattis will become com-
missioner succeeding Ed
Stone, who did not seek
re-election, in January. As
there is no Republican
nominee, the Democratic
nomination assures Gattis
getting the job.

With no local races on the
ballot and little local interest
in the three statewide run-
offs, only 131 votes were cast
in the other three precincts.

STARTED IN OCTOBER, 1903

Lynn County News Oldest Business In Nine Counties

When Dalton Wood sold
his interest in the Slaton
Slatonite in April, 1979, he
became the new owner of
The Lynn County News at
Tahoka, the first newspaper
and oldest business institu-
tion in a nine-county area
of the South Plains from
Lubbock south to the Texas
& Pacific railroad and west
and northwest to the New
Mexico line.

Lynn County became the
first organized county in the
same area in April, 1903, and
Tahoka the first town.

Less than six months later,
Otis and Inez Lilly estab-
lished The News with an
"9x14 job press and a
shirt-tail full of type" hauled
in by wagon from Big Spring,
and the first issue came out
on Oct. 9, 1903.

Lilly's health caused him
to sell on Feb. 1, 1904, to H.
M. and J. M. Boyd from
Snyder for \$350.00. Due to a
drouth through the summer
of 1904, short crops, and low
cattle prices, the Boyd

brothers abandoned the
paper on Oct. 8, 1904.

Attorney Tom M. Bartley,
who years later became head
of the Masonic Grand Lodge
of Texas in Waco, Tahoka's
first attorney, influenced an
old friend, Harry C. Crie of
Floydada, to buy the plant
equipment. They renewed
the publication on June 2,
1905. Mr. and Mrs. Crie
were the publishers for 13
years.

Sold In 1918

They sold the paper on
Jan. 1, 1918, to James L.
Dow, then the owner and
publisher of the Lubbock
Avalanche. He sent a long
time employee, R. B. (Bob)
Haynes to Tahoka to operate
the paper, and Haynes and
wife bought The News plant
a few weeks later.

Until Dow and Haynes
took over, The News had
been printed from hand-set
type. Dow had moved from
his Lubbock plant a Model L
Linotype and a Scott press

capable of printing two
six-column pages at a time,
and other equipment. Since
electric power was unrelia-
ble, Haynes installed a gas
engine he could hitch up to
either of three presses and
the Linotype when electric
power was off or low.

Nearly six years later,
Haynes sold The News to E.
I. Hill of Sweetwater, then
district attorney there, who
formerly had augmented his
private law practice as
owner-publisher of The
Roscoe Times, 1914-1920,
where his sons, Frank and
E. I. Jr., had learned the
printing trade.

Hill and sons took over The
News on Nov. 1, 1923, and
began improving the plant.
E. I. Jr. left the business a
couple of years later, and
later became a high official in
the Government Printing
Office in Washington, D.C.,
but Frank remained as
associate publisher.

New Equipment
The Hills first added a new

Model 8 Linotype, bought
new type faces, and still later
new job presses, a Babcock
news press, casting equip-
ment, Ludlow, and increased
the subscription list from 500
to 2,400 copies weekly.

Late in 1939, E. I. Hill Sr.
retired, and Frank became
the publisher. During the 44
years the Hills had the
paper, they trained a total of
19 boys as printers, which
enabled several to work their
ways through college and to
become successful in various
lines of endeavor. Frank's
wife, Mae, served as
advertising manager until
they sold the business.

On retiring in 1967, Frank
wrote in his "Printer's
Ink-lings" column: "During
these 44 years we have
experienced hard times,
break downs, sickness and
death in the family, debts,
a depression, one world war,
a 'police action' in Korea,
a 'holding action' in Vietnam,
help problems, pied type

forms, power failures — you
name the troubles, we've
had 'em."

On April 1, 1967, the Hills
sold The News to Wendell
Tooley and associates, own-
ers of the Floydada Hesperian
and other newspaper
interests. Bill Salter, fol-
lowed by Jess Cunningham,
served The News as editor-
publishers. On acquiring the
paper, Tooley went offset
and added other equipment.

Valentines' Day

Tooley sold The News on
July 1, 1969, to Johnny
Valentine and wife, D'Linda,
both reared in this area, but
who had been owners of the
Santa Anna News for several
years. The last few years of
their ownership here, D'Linda
actually ran the paper
while her husband was
engaged in other local
business enterprises.

In March, 1979, Dalton
Wood sold his interest in The
Slaton Slatonite to his

partner, and the latter's son,
Brad Wood then bought The
Lynn County News from the
Valentines effective April 27,
1979.

Wood is a veteran of 30
years in the newspaper
business. After graduation
from high school at Jacks-
boro, he attended North
Texas State University.
Following graduation there
in 1950, he has worked for
Graham Newsfoto, Vernon
Daily Record, Lubbock Ava-
lanche-Journal twice, Dallas
Times-Herald, and has
operated the Throckmorton
Tribune, a Newburgh, Indi-
ana paper, owned with his
step father The Sudan
Beacon-News, and was the
news editor of the Plainview
Daily Herald for seven years
before joining Tooley as
editor-publisher of The
Slaton Slatonite.

Mr. and Mrs. Wood have
two daughters, Mrs. Bob
Sloan of Dallas and Mrs.
Gary Jones of Slaton, and a
son, Terry Wood of Slaton.

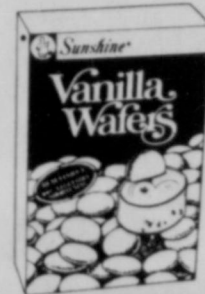

Rain Gives Boost To Area Cotton Crops

Rains Saturday and Tuesday nights gave a big boost to Lynn County crops.

Sunday morning 1.43 inches and on Wednesday morning another .87 inch were measured in the National Weather Service gauge located in west Tahoka.

Saturday night most of the county, except for a large area across the north side, received sufficient rain to help a lot, but the fall was much heavier in some parts of the county than in Tahoka. Rainfall was heavier in some areas, especially in the central and southern sections.

Tuesday night up to an inch and a quarter was reported in some areas of Tahoka. Meager reports received at press time Wednesday indicated that all the county received sufficient rain, in many cases more than Tahoka recorded. Most cotton is up to a good stand.

Sherry Etheredge Says....

One family wage-earner concern is this: "What would my family do if I should die?"

You can take steps to reduce some of this concern - and you should, even though death is not something we like to think about.

Major steps start with telling the family about family finances - and making sure they know about the location of important papers, properties owned and debts owed.

Here's a checklist - both spouses should be able to answer "yes" to these questions:

1. Can you both locate copies of last year's tax returns?

Could each of you support the figures on the return in case of an audit?

2. Do you both know the kinds and amounts of life insurance your family has? Do you both know the names of the beneficiaries on these policies?

3. Do you each have an up-to-date will?

Do you each know the location of the signed copies of each will?

4. Do you both know the names and addresses of your lawyer, insurance agent, banker or other financial advisers?

5. Do you have records of each other's Social Security number? They should be on your tax returns, if you

cannot find them anywhere else.

6. Can you both locate important documents, such as your marriage certificate, family birth certificates, armed services discharge papers, mortgage papers and car titles?

If you answered "no" to any of these questions, you might need to do some planning.

Find the necessary information or papers. Discuss these with each other and, perhaps, another family member.

Develop a written plan which would eliminate the problems associated with the death of any family member, particularly the wage earner(s).

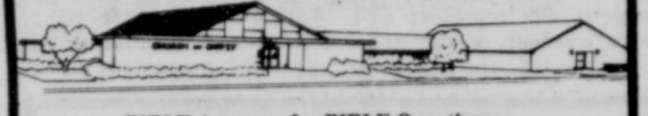

ACCORDING TO THE BIBLE



BIBLE Answers for BIBLE Questions:
 By DOUG CARTER

Question: If the age of miracles has ceased as you have argued, does this mean that God is no longer at work in the world? Would this not mean that there is no reason to pray?

Answer: There are at least two ways in which God works, or has worked in the world. These are (1) in miracles and (2) in non-miraculous ways through providence. The story of Joseph contains no miracles, but certainly God was there working (Gen. 50:20). The book of Esther contains no miracles in it but God was most definitely there helping His people (Esther 4:13, 14).

This means that we can pray for God to help us and aid us, but we should not pray for God to help us in a miraculous way, because He has said that they will cease (1 Cor. 13). God will bless our lives in many ways through His providence and through His natural laws. Yes, God is still ruling over the earth and there is still reason and justification for us to pray (Heb. 1:3). Prayer is a sacrifice that God's saints must make to our creator (Heb. 13:15).

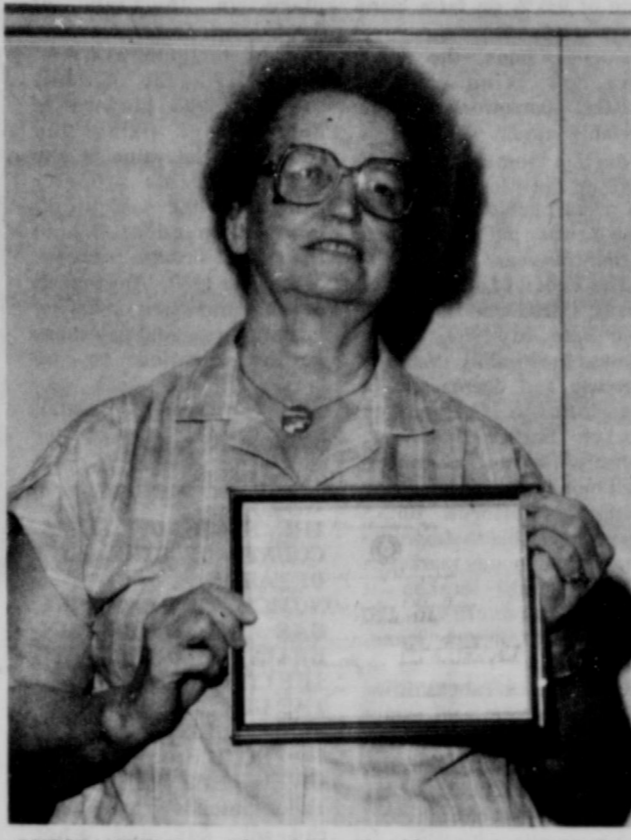
As for modern "faith healers" they are in direct opposition to God's word, and this can mean only one or two things. They have either been duped into believing they are equal to God, and have the power that God used to manifest His power and glory to bring faith (2 Pet. 18:22; John 20:30-31) - or they are trying to "seduce" others with full knowledge of their trickery (Col. 2:8) 1 John 4:1, tells us to "prove" the Spirits, "because many false prophets are gone out into the world."

We must be satisfied with what God has given us today, and not try to reach-out for something that is ungodly. We should be able to believe in Christ and the Bible without having to see a miracle.

Woman Hurt In Assault

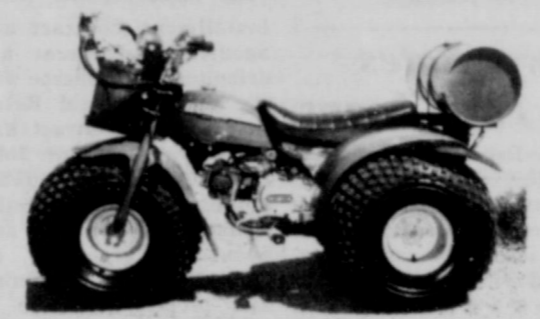

A NATIONAL COTTON COUNCIL SERVICE

EXPORTS HIT 49-YEAR RECORD: High U.S. cotton exports have bumped a 49-year record. That's the report from Harold C. Weeth, a Coalinga, Calif., producer and treasurer of Cotton Council International (CCI). Speaking at the Sixth Annual Cotton Outlook Conference, Weeth said exports will represent well over one-half of the U.S. offtake for the current

season. He reported export commitments as of May 18 at more than 9.3 million running bales for the marketing year ending July 31. Much of the increase in outlets and demand for U.S. cotton was attributed to export marketing programs conducted by CCI in cooperation with Foreign Agricultural Service. Nine countries involved in CCI's programs accounted for a

total of 3.9 million bales, or 63 percent of total U.S. cotton exported last year. CCI is the overseas arm of the National Cotton Council.

DANGER OF BILLS NOTED: National Cotton Council President Herman Probst recently reported on bills before congress to amend the federal reclamation act. The bills would limit the amount of land a farmer who gets water from federal projects can own or lease. "Breaking up or severely handicapping commercial farms in this country," he said, "not only will rob the farmer of his freedom -- but also reduce agricultural food and fiber production, lower farm income, and drive consumer prices higher." Probst is a cotton producer from Anson, Tex.

EXPERT PEEKS INTO FARM MACHINERY FUTURE: What does the future hold for farm machinery? Calvin C. Peterson of Deere & Company says there will be fewer, but larger, more productive and more dependable major farm machines. He predicts diesel fuel efficiency will increase from the current 35 percent to nearly 50 percent by the turn of the century.

"In the area of electronics," he said, "future applications may well include automatic control of the vehicle engine, transmission, and function according to performance desired from the particular machine, whether that be maximum productivity, minimum energy requirement, or minimum crop losses in the case of harvesting machines." **AND COTTON YESTERDAY** Fiber and boll fragments found in caves in Mexico's Tehuacan Valley indicate that cotton was cultivated there 7,000 years ago.

rate of 9 3/4% on farm loans and 10 1/2% on rural residence loans, the same rate now being charged existing borrowers on the variable rate. This is a reduction from a 12% fixed rate on farm loans and 14% on rural residence loans which was put into effect earlier this year.

The Federal Land Bank of Texas introduced the variable rate in 1969, which allows the billing rate to increase and decrease with variables in the money market. Earlier this year, faced with unprecedented high money cost, a fixed rate loan was offered on a temporary basis. Improvement in the money market in recent weeks makes it possible to return to the variable rate on new loans, House said.

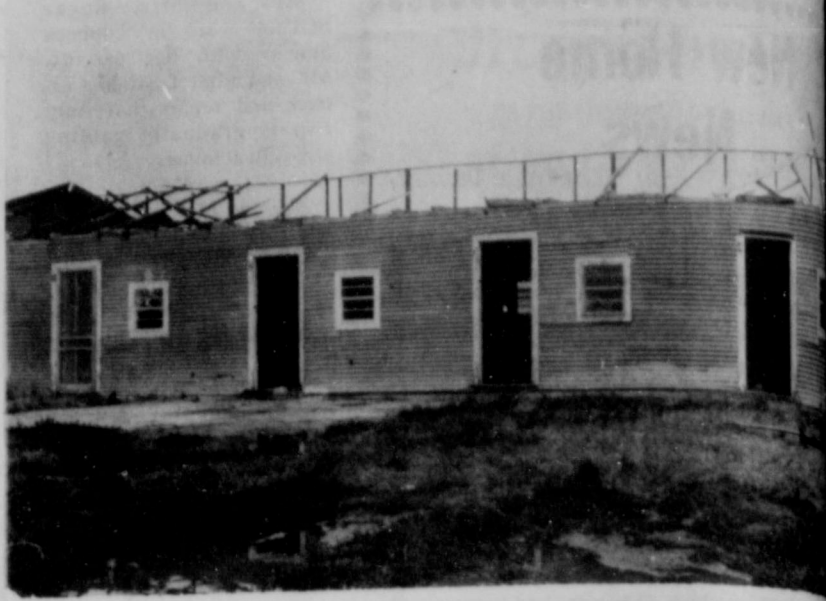

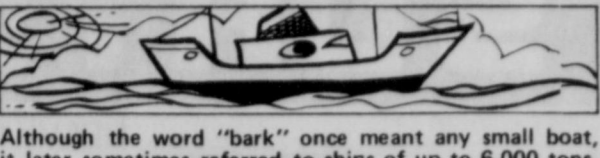
