The Denver meeting will have done good service if the resolutions regarding railroad transit for stock will be the means of giving confidence to capitalists in the extension of the Fort Worth & Denver railroad to the north to connect with the Denver & Rio Grande coming south.

Our Texas cattle are losing their characteristic quality as rustlers, and although dying in large numbers in the north each winter, form so large a proportion of shipments to the beef markets, as to place them under suspicion of having more lives than a cat, and only die in winter to save rations during the hard times.

The fact that late driven cattle have so little time for recuperation after reaching the maturing grounds as to place them at a disadvantage, is used to cover gross exaggerations when losses are mentioned, for the purpose of covering up losses in native stock, and sometimes it is considered policy if dogs die, to kill them anyway—on paper.

About Dogies.

At this time of year it is customary to kill off the dogies. At this time of year it is not uncommon for the weather to turn cold—severely cold, windy cold. The zephyr which in Montana is called a "blizzard," and in Texas the "norther," is the same species, in fact is the same animal—an expected but unwelcome visitor. Sometimes the norther or "tail end" of the blizzard strikes westward, and sometimes it reaches directly south and is lost in the Gulf of Mexico.
