



#### The Angora Goat.

The valuable little work entitled "The Angora Goat" issued for distribution to Mohair growers by Messrs William Machaughtan's Sons of 79 to 31 Spring street, New York, will be useful to show the prices at which the Mohair product is sold. It gives the details as to various quotations and prices.

In every line of business there are fluctuations in values, and Mohair is no exception to the role. But the fluctuations do not take a wide range. The prices run now from 10 cents for what is called trash to 60 cents for the best combing pure bred fleece, and there has been no material change for some time.

In many conversations about the Angora goat in times past some startling statements have been made, and the writer commencing his investigations into the mystery of Angora raising, did so because of a statement that the fleece was worth a \$1.50 per pound; another statement equally wide of the mark was that the common goat could not be raised to a profitable fleece bearing standard,

To-day the \$1.50 per pound is still spoken of. Only two weeks since a reporter found a man who sold his grade fleece for 75 'cents. The editor promptly cut down the statement of price to 35 cents, which is a good aversge price for mixed grade fleeces. The book gives examples of sales as follows:

Sixty pounds choice, at 55 cents; another lot choice, at 60 cents; one lot superior, at 45 cents; another. 475 gents. To bring such prices the fleece must be from pure bred, or very high grade goats, while inferior clips, second, third and fourth-class sell lower. The fleece selling at 55 cents is equal to any Texas clip throughout, and is probably better than the average. These prices fully justify the assertion that the Angora goat produces a profitable fleece, especially as the high grade goat can be made to produce a fleece averaging over four pounds.

Of the yield we quote from the book as follows:

"The average yield per goat in Asia Minor is about three pounds weight. This includes one-year-old kids and poor bred animals. The fleece of the buck loses fineness with age, and shears from five to nine pounds; the female fleece is finer, shearing from three to five pounds. The fleece of the ewes and kids is in special request for the more delicate fabrics of ladies' wear. At the Cape of Good Hope, where the goats are properly cared for, and to which colony none but the purest bred animals are now exported, the yield is much greater, being from five to six pounds weight, including cross-breeds. The yield entirely depends upon the choice in the first instance of pure-bred, heavy wooled animals, and the care bestowed upon them afterward. There are many choice goats in Asia Minor whose fleeces will weigh from twelve to eighteen lbs. The Cape farmers have found that the breeding of Angora goats is remunerative at even the low prices they have latterly ob-tained for their Mohair, notwithstanding the fabulous prices paid for some of the stud rams and ewes exported to the Cape from Asia Minor. Angoras in our country vary in their fleece from year to year, both in quan-tity and quality, the variation being caused by age and the freatment they receive. A flock of Angora wethers






