



Nail, Ladonia at good prices. Hunter, Evans & Co. sold some corn-fed Texas at \$4.50 to 5; but few grass Texas coming and are quoted at \$8 to 4.10 for fair to choice. Texas and Indian hogs at \$3.70 to 4. Cassidy & Carter of San Antonio, 1,600 fair Texas clipped sheep of 85 pounds at \$3.30 and 150 sheep of 67 pounds at \$3. Texas horses fairly active.

KANSAS CITY MARKET.
KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 13, 1886.

Live stock receipts for the past two days large and the demand for all grades of fat cattle strong with market 10 to 15 cents higher. Fifty-three Texas half bred corn-fed of 1,256 lbs. at \$4.75; 50 Texas corn-fed of 1,182 lbs. at \$4.70; 1 ear Texas corn-fed of 1,000 lbs. at \$4.70. The above were yesterday's sales. To-day 200 Texas corn-fed steers averaged weight 1,124 lbs. at \$4.84; 93 Texas half breeds weighing 1,175 lbs. at \$4.95. The market closed strong with an upward tendency demand for good mediums strong with prices from \$3.50 to 4.50 for fair to good. Hog market closed 5 cents higher.

CHICAGO MARKET LETTER.

Change from Corn to Grass—Canners Waiting for Texans.

UNION STOCK YARDS,
CHICAGO, Ill., May 10, '86.

Regular Correspondence TEXAS LIVE STOCK JOURNAL.
Texas cattle sales this day were at \$4.50 to 5.10 for averages of 920 to 1084 pounds. At the highest point last week these cattle would not have brought more than \$4.60 to 5.20. But few corn-fed Texas cattle are coming in now and they are little if any better than if they had been entirely grass fed, as the change from corn to grass made them very soft. The demand for fat, light and medium weight cattle is now stronger than for choice heavy beefs suitable for London or Liverpool. All this is in favor of Texas and southwestern cattle growers. A very low price for tallow is given as one reason why dealers are showing a preference for fat, smooth, 1600 @ 1200 lb carcasses and even lighter weights, over 1400 and 1600 lb steers. There is undoubtedly something in that, but there is more in the fact that it is not every butcher who can or wants to handle light or medium weight cattle.
The canners are now running at the lowest possible rate, and one or two of the larger establishments are holding out of the trade. They are waiting for Texas cattle to come freely and sell at very low prices. Texas stockmen cannot serve their own interests better than to see to it that their cattle are in good condition to sell better than canning stock. Texas cattle ought to grade higher than last year.
The way the cattle market has bobbed up and down lately, is a caution. During the first week in the month, the strikes and rumors of strikes so thoroughly demoralized trade that receipts were very light. The result was an advance in prices of about 50 cents. The reports flew to the country. Hundreds of wise cattle men thought they would get ahead of other people. Result: nearly 10,000 cattle to-day and more than half of last week's advances gone at one lick. That is the way violent fluctuations work. It takes a week to gain 50 cents advance on continued light receipts, but one day's oversupply will knock half of it, or more. These violent changes are generally beneficial to the few and disastrous to the many. The general hog market is liberally supplied just now, and values are a shade lower than last week. Sales are making at \$3.50 to 4.20, according to quality, and as has been observed before Texas hogs sell right along with hogs from this and adjoining states. In fact, a man sold a consignment of what he supposed to be Missouri hogs last week at the top price of the market; but on returning to the office to look over his mail, found they were Lone Star hogs. The Texas hogs marketed this year have been used to follow: corn-

fed cattle, and have averaged better than ever before.
W. R. Lagow shipped from Dallas, Texas, four loads cattle, which sold from \$4.50 to \$5.10, by Hunter Evans & Co.
Duncan Brothers & Co., of Dallas, Texas, had 1,087 sheep on the market, most of which sold at \$2.25 to 2.50. They averaged less than 70 lbs, being shorn.
The sheep market is not very lively, but prices for good stock hold their own moderately well. The extreme range of rates just at present is \$2.00 to 2.25 for shorn sheep. Texas sheep are saleable at about \$2.50 to 3.25 for very poor to fairly good shearing, while nearly fat 90 pound carcasses would sell at \$3.50 to 4.25.
The general outlook for the live stock trade is reasonably encouraging. In fact, it may be stated as good for good stock. The offerings of stock are lighter than one year ago, and receipts for the year are running decidedly behind 1885 at the market centers. This means that there will be more room for range stock. There are some who think the run of Texas stock at Chicago will be exceedingly heavy this year, but the trails are open; there is not the amount of quarantine restriction that there was one year ago; we are not likely to have a repetition of the Chayenne and Arapahoe scare, and Chicago receipts and Texas cattle may be put down at less than 350,000.

To-day good Texas cattle sold well enough and prices quite decent, all things considered. Buyers operated freely in the face of unfavorable reports from other points. Consignments of 10 to 15 cwt hundred pounds were obtained by them on all grades. Grass Texas are now coming in. Mr. G. B. Withers, of Ft. Worth, Texas, obtained \$3.55 to \$4 per hundred pounds for fair to good fat grass Texas. By no means ship poor grassers to market for it will not pay; there is only loss in such a proceeding. This season undesirable long-horns have not the least show, be the market active or dull.

The hog market is not very active and the offerings quite liberal. However, all kind sales at prices ranging in extremes from \$3.75 to 4.10 per hundred pounds for native Texas and Indian hogs. They must be fat to bring the prices. Here are a few Texas hog sales: Cassidy Bros & Co.: J. H. Doman McKinney 67 hogs 206 lbs at \$3.95; 70 hogs 174 lbs at \$3.96; J. H. Campbell & Co.: John Dulin, Caddo, I. T., 80 hogs 250 lbs at \$4.10; 55 hogs 228 lbs at \$4.05; 150 hogs 240 lbs at \$4; 51 hogs 157 lbs at \$3.30; G. W. Bryson, Caddo 317 hogs 288 lbs at \$4.12; 37 hogs 139 lbs at \$4.

Texas horses are selling somewhat slow. There is no active demand except for good mares for breeding purposes, for such there being plenty of orders and only a light supply. Sam A. White, superintendent of the horse department of the national stock yards, wants the fact to be known in Texas that cow ponies, geldings and the like are very dull of disposal and will continue so. Prices range in extremes from \$20 to \$60, the best figure for good breeding mares.



The indications are favorable for a strong beef market for fat cattle. Whenever prices rule strong at Chicago, the receipts are quickly increased, if the country has a strong supply of matured cattle. The receipts of cattle at Chicago during the past week have been not nearly so large as was expected, and it was asserted that no great supply of beef is in the country. On Tuesday last 63 fat, 915-pound steers from Hillsboro sold at \$5.00, and 21 1684 pound cattle from Dallas also sold at \$5.00—45 492 pound grassers from Victoria sold at \$3.50, and 54 extremely poor bulls sold at \$1.624. Some 824 pound corn-fed steers sold at \$4.60. These prices are better than any realized one month ago—and look promising for the June market.

The Cattle Trade.
 Several transactions consummated at Fort Worth during the week show, to use an old saying, that "there's life in the old dog yet." Behind the actual movement there is an inquiry for cattle. Local dealers so report it and say the trade is not over. They say, also, that any advance in prices is resisted on the part of purchasers. We believe—and no one need doubt it—that the prices ruling low will increase the number purchased, while at the same time the weakness of the market is largely due to small lots being offered at low figures, making it easier for the buyer to find leverage for lower figures on large lots. At the price yearlings have sold anyone in Texas could hire pasturage and make considerable money by holding over the stock for two years. There is no need to drive to Montana. At present prices the maturing can be done anywhere. It is not surprising that the only sales of yearlings and twos occur in Texas, but it is surprising that values in Central and Northern Texas are not, as is usually the case, higher than Southern cattle. The only explanation is that the Southern stockmen are in better circumstances and their necessities force no sacrifices.

Association Work.
 In this paper will be found a list of the members of the Northwest Texas Cattle Raisers association. The organization is a strong one, but not nearly so strong as it ought to be. The members pay a fee at entrance of \$10 and \$5 annual dues thereafter, and at the present and usual assessment the annual payment by the owner of 1,000 head of cattle amounts to \$20, making the annual expenditure of \$25; more or less, according to the number of cattle, the amount to be figured at 2 cents per head.

Now the question is: What does a man get for his money? What benefit is the association? We are not prepared to answer the question fully, but will say that in the first place the association makes the appointments for working the range, and publishes the appointments for systematizing the work, regulating the conduct of the cattle business, in the most important features.

Next, out of the funds of the association there is offered and is often paid a reward for the recovery of stolen horses, coupled with the requirements that the thief must be recovered also and put where his pursuits are less congenial, but more regular. This necessitates an expenditure for legal purposes. There are court fees and attorneys' fees, and the cost of following up horse thieves. If the expense was borne by different parties and every man looked after his own, and all the neighbors looked after their own, the expense, trouble and time lost would be greater, and the stock would not be any where so secure as now.

The cattle stealing is not looked after by offering rewards. The association trusts to the employees of the association to find and hold all stolen cattle. To catch stolen beef steers and dry cows, all the markets are provided with inspectors who have a duty to perform. They inspect all cattle entering their markets, and whenever finding cattle belonging to members of the association in the wrong bunch, the inspector takes immediate charge, disposes of the animal, and with due regard for all legal formalities acts for the owner of the stock. So far as the cattle on the ranges are concerned, members knowing who are members, are of themselves a detective force in each other's behalf, and besides this there are inspectors who do nothing else but watch the by-

ways, highways and trails for stolen stock. To such an extent is this detective business carried on that the gauntlet of inspection has to be run several times before cattle are disposed of. The association has satisfactorily disposed of several thieving gangs, and made it impossible to be a profitable dealer in association cattle. The work is not perfect by any means, but it is becoming so nearly perfect, that cattle thieves have to kill the cattle in the woods and bury the hides in order to get away with them, and the order has gone forth that this also must be broken up.

The association is now under arrangement whereby names of all joining and belonging to the association shall be published regularly, once each month, and the same publicity given to the withdrawals. A new member shall receive the benefits of the organization immediately after joining and shall be deprived of the same immediately after leaving. This, the secretary says, is for the purpose of bringing the whole time and attention of inspectors to bear upon stock of those who do pay, and to relieve the inspectors from looking after stock of those who do not pay.

The JOURNAL would submit to the stockmen of North and West Texas, that if every man owning cattle was a member of this association and paid his dues, the benefits could be doubled and the pro rata expense could be reduced one half. The association is a strong one, but could be stronger. There are many cattle stolen now that need not be stolen. The thieves don't want association cattle when they can get anything else, and if stockmen would combine as they should do, there would be nothing else.

THE CATTLE TRAIL.
Healing of Old Sores—Saving off Litigation and Commenting Anew.

As published in the TEXAS LIVE STOCK JOURNAL of last week, a conference concerning trail matters was being held at Trinidad, Colorado, between Messrs. F. B. York and Arthur Gorman, representing western stockmen, and Cherokee strippers, and R. G. Head and H. M. Taylor, representing the Texas trail interests. The purpose was to heal up old sores, saw off litigation, growing out of the blockade of last year, and to make such arrangements as would prevent any difficulties of the same nature in the future.

The meeting was held at Trinidad, Colorado, and on Thursday last the following preamble and agreement was entered into and signed up:

Whereas, as F. B. York, of St. Louis, Mo., representing certain parties holding and ranching cattle on what is known as the Dallas trail upon the one side and R. G. Head, of Colorado, certain drovers of Texas cattle on the other, realize that great annoyance, the loss of property and general dissatisfaction, affecting both parties hereto, have resulted in the movement of cattle in previous years over the various trails leading from Texas, and more especially during the year 1885, over what is known as the Dallas trail, which trail runs north from Wichita Falls, Tex., passing through the western portion of the Indian Territory, and from thence through the western portion of the Cherokee strip, thence to a point near the northwest corner of the Panhandle of Texas; and

Whereas, it is believed that cattle from certain sections of Texas in their migration from south to north have impeded or communicated to the native cattle in this trail with which they came in contact, splenic fever, and

Whereas, the absence hitherto of any rule or requirement, by which the movement of such trail cattle might be governed, with a view of respecting and protecting the rights and property of each, has caused much inconvenience and given rise to rumors of general discontent and dissatisfaction, to say nothing of the heavy expenditures of money and losses of property entailed upon all concerned, the interruption of inter-state commerce which has followed,

Therefore, we, the representatives of the above mentioned interests, have formally met and entered into the following agreement, and we firmly believe that by a strict observance of the same, by all parties, each and every interest involved will receive just and adequate protection, that friendly relations will be restored and cemented, and that the general welfare of all concerned will be promoted to a high degree of satisfaction.

The following is the agreement:

1. That all cattle driven or shipped from that portion of Texas lying west and northwest of the following line, which area it is believed is absolutely safe ground and free from contagion or infection, are to be permitted to pass through what is known as the Dallas trail through the Cherokee strip without hindrance or restriction.
2. The following is the line: Beginning at Red River at the northwest portion of Wilbarger county, thence south along the east line of Baylor, Throckmorton, Shackelford, Callahan and Coleman counties to the Colorado river, in the south-east corner of Coleman county, thence with the Colorado river to the south-east corner of Llano county, from thence along the east line of Gillespie county, the east and south lines of Kendall county, the line of Bandera county, the east and south line of Zavalla county, from thence due west to Eagle Pass, in the Rio Grande.
3. All cattle moved from that portion of Texas lying east and south of the above described line and west and north of the following described line, are to be permitted to pass over what is known as the Dallas trail through the Cherokee strip, when driven the entire distance by trail from their native ranges; but when shipped by rail any part of this distance, 45 days must elapse from the date of being unloaded from the cars before an entry shall be made into said Cherokee strip.
4. The following is the line to which these restrictions will apply: Beginning at a point on Red River in the northwest corner of Grayson county, thence south to Dallas, and from thence due south to Waco, thence south following the line of the Missouri Pacific

railroad to its junction with the International & Great Northern at Taylor, thence southwest following the line of said International & Great Northern railroad to Laredo on the Rio Grande.

3. All cattle moved from the remaining portions of Texas east and south of the last described line shall be permitted to pass over said trail through said Cherokee strip after a period of 50 days, when driven the entire distance by trail from their native ranges; but when shipped by rail any portion of the distance, a period of 75 days must elapse before an entry shall be made into said Cherokee strip. In the event of other evidence as to the elapse of time when cattle are driven by trail the bill of sale and inspector's certificate will be accepted as evidence, and where cattle have been shipped by rail the shipper's contract showing date of release from cars will be accepted as evidence. All cattle driven over said trail through said territory shall be confined strictly to the limits of said tract; and further, all cattle so driven shall pass through the chutes or lanes erected along the line of the trail by order of the Dallas convention and the ranchmen for the purpose of enabling ranchmen along the route to cross the trail with their cattle so as to secure freedom from exposure to disease. It is expected and we most respectfully request that Texas drovers will use all possible care in passing over the route indicated to protect the range interest and not permit their stock to mix with the range cattle along the route when it is possible to avoid so.


