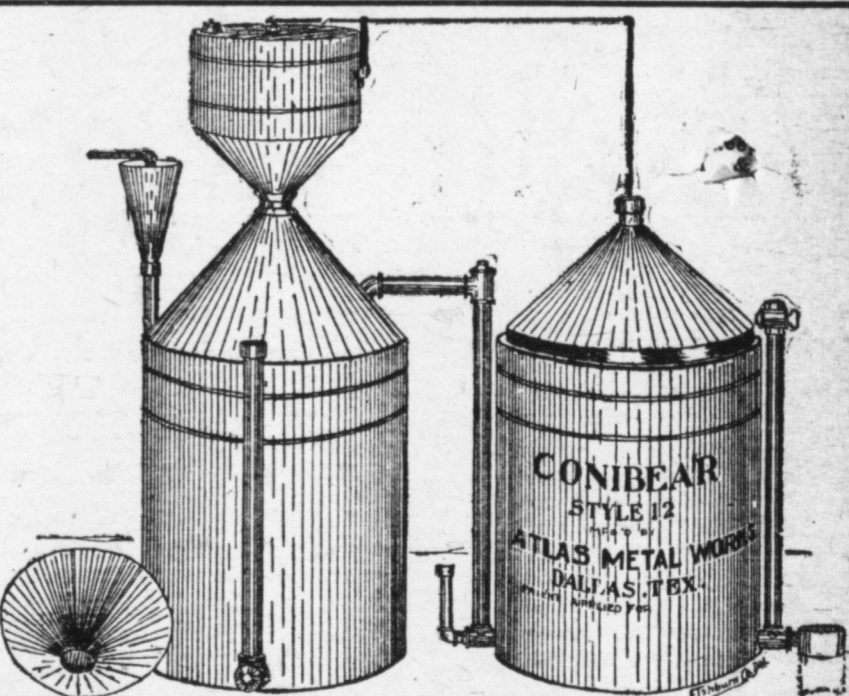

REPORT MADE OF RANGE CONDITION

Little Change Noted During the Past Week

Reports from inspectors to the office of the Cattle Raisers' Association confirm the previous good conditions of the range, weather and cattle. Some rain has fallen in isolated localities, but no general fall has occurred. Frost in the territory, this is light. Three hundred and ninety-four cars were shipped during the week, according to the reports, which follow: Victoria, Gollad, Telfair and Edna—Range good, weather good; have had fine rains all over the section of the country. Eighty cars shipped. Charles E. Martin, Inspector. Beville, Skidmore, Senton and Pettus—Good range; good weather; rain. Fourteen cars shipped. John E. Rigby, Inspector. Llano, Valley Springs and Cherokee—Range good; weather fine and cattle fat. Fourteen cars shipped. Over the deck car of hogs shipped. H. C. Coffe, Inspector. San Angelo—Range good; weather clear and cool; twenty cars shipped. Lee Wilson, Inspector. Midland, Odessa, Stanton and Monahan—Range and weather good; rain on 5th. One hundred and thirty-one cars shipped. W. L. Cahalan, Inspector. Clarendon, Giles and Memphis—Weather fair and cool for the week, with exception of a slow rain Friday. Cattle fat, but no so many as in previous year. Range good. Seventy-one cars shipped. T. M. Pyle, Inspector. Englewood and Beaver City—Range and weather good; no cars shipped. Charles Preslar, Inspector. Kaw Reservation, Fairfax and Pawluska—Weather cool; cattle in fine condition; light frost on the 3d; fair and warm balance week. F. M. Canton, Inspector.

Exterminating the Ticks. SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Oct. 12.—Joseph W. Parker, chief federal inspector in charge of tick extermination in Texas, is back from a trip to both Colorado city and Quanah, where the federal work has been inaugurated. He says that the work of investigating the pastures, the tedious, is being done thoroughly, and that there is no opposition among ranchmen to the work, and that those whose shortcoming is aptly are exhibiting more interest in the work than at its inception. Another matter that should inspire the cattlemen in the twenty-two counties now under special quarantine to a united effort toward co-operation with the federal authorities is the statement by Dr. Parker that in his opinion the ticks in those counties are more plentiful now than they have been at any time during the past five years. Dr. Parker will leave in a few days for Sanderson, in Pecos county, where work is to soon begin under the direction of Mr. Gourley.

Two Texans Appointed

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Oct. 12.—Two Texans have just been accepted by the bureau of animal industry for field work in the state on the tick eradication proposition. One of them is Tom M. Gourley of this city, who served a long period as customs guard in Eagle Pass and who is familiar with every phase of the tick problem about the quarantine line. The other is J. W. Loving of Jacksboro, a son of Abner Loving, one of the leading cattlemen of that section of the state and at present a member of the executive committee of the Cattle Raisers' Association of Texas. Young Loving is a graduate of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, and having been raised on the ranch, is well equipped both by experience and education for making a valuable addition to the force under Dr. Parker. Mr. Gourley will be stationed at Sanderson, and Mr. Loving will join the force at work in and around Colorado City.

Fifty Lost by Fever

ROSCOE, Texas, Oct. 12.—Don Carlisle was here a few days ago from the ranch in the southern portion of the county, and says his father and himself have lost more than fifty head of cattle this summer from fever. Mr. Carlisle gave it as his opinion that ticks were the cause of the fever. He says there are more ticks this season than ever before known in the history of the country, and believes the unusually heavy rainfall has had a great deal to do with their propagation. The Carlisle ranch is located right on the border of the state and federal quarantine line, and is one of the largest and best ranches in this section of the state.
