Mr. Daniel Schaffner died at his home Monday morning at 2:30 after an illness of several weeks. Funeral services were conducted at the family residence and at the First Baptist church by the Reverends Kuck-enbacker of Dallas, Paul Hintz of the Hurnville Baptist church and Will H. Duff, pastor of the Byers church.

Mr. Schaffner was born in Russia in 1862 and was married in 1883. The first year of married life they lived in Hoffenthal, Russia. In 1898 they came to America and arrived on Christmas day and have lived in this community since that time. Mr. and Mrs. Schaffner celebrated their Golden Anniversary on October 27. To this happy couple were born nine children and all survive him. Besides the dear companion, the children, thirty-seven grandchildren, and seven great grandchildren survive him. Mr. Schaffner's death was the first one in the entire immediate family. Burial was in the Byers cemetery with L. Y. Herrin in charge of the burial service.

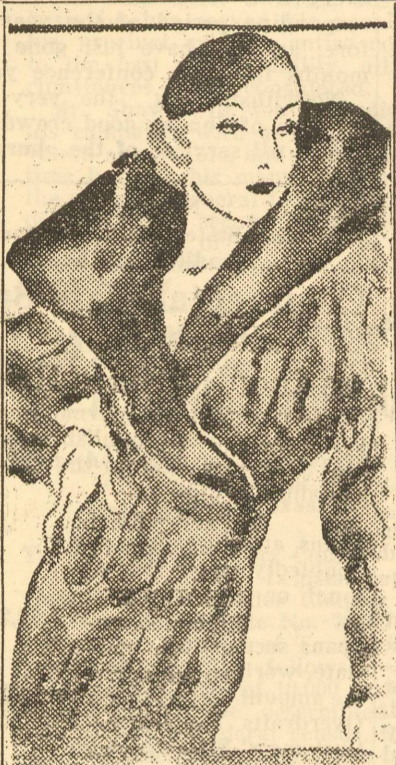

## WATER A NECESSITY OF LIFE

There are many sources from which we may secure water, wells or lakes being the most common. Large cities situated on or near a river or lake usually get their water from that source, but cities or homes which are not near one of these sources get their water from wells. Some farm homes get their water supply from cisterns or springs. There are large cities; New York for instance, which have to collect their water from several mountain streams and pipe it for many miles in order to secure an adequate supply for its population.

A few years ago only those living in a city could enjoy running water, but this privilege is now extended to farmers. Several kinds of pumps are available to those who wish for a modern system of running water. There is the common lift pump for shallow wells and a force pump for deeper wells.

These may be operated with a windmill or a motor. The water may either be stored in an overhead tank or a pneumatic tank from which it is piped to the various parts of the farm. This is a great convenience but there are still many farms which do not have a system for running water. The city homes have the water piped into the house by the city and all the occupants have to do is turn the faucets and pay the bills. Most small cities pump their water from wells into a standpipe. It is piped from the standpipe to the different sections of the city and the gravity forces it through the pipes. The large cities usually have to use force pumps in order for the water to reach the tops of the tall buildings.

Water which is got from wells may have been polluted by impure water running into it. For this reason a well should never be located in a low place near a cow lot or pig pen for water from these places is likely to run into the well. Where water is stored in open tanks bacteria can easily be blown into it by the wind. Some cities get their water supply from rivers which receive a greater part of the cities' waste but of course it is purified before being used. Still other cities get their water from artificial lakes. If the water is to be pure the surface in and around the lake must be free from animal and vegetable waste and be fenced so as to keep out all intruders.

Water may be purified by filtering, distillation, and the use of chemicals. By filtering we mean the process of water running through certain kinds of soil and rocks. To distill water one boils it and catches the steam in a cool container where it condenses into pure

As pure water is very important in order to have good health it should be as pure as we can possibly get. If there is any doubt about the water it should be boiled. We use water in many ways every day and if impure water were used we would be ill most of the time.

Our body uses water to keep it free from diseases and clean. Water regulates body processes and aids in elimination.
